Library News

A new magazine has been placed on one of the library reading tables that not one person in a thousand will be able to read even though it is in the English language.

It is the Mathilda Ziegler magazine for the Blind and it often contains illustrations, a map of the St. Lawrence river and vicinity being found in the July number.

Money for the publication of this unique magazine was furnished by Mrs. Mathilda Ziegler of New York City and it has been published monthly for the past eight years in both the New York Point and the American Braille types.

As the American Braille is taught in the Oregon Institute for the Blind, that edition is being sent to the Pendleton Library. The magazine is given free of all charge to any library or person asking for it even though it is an expensive magazine to print. The United States postoffice assists by sending all material for the blind postage free through the mails.

As soon as possible the library hopes to get in touch with all blind residents of the city and county so as to help them get acquainted with the magazine and the method of reading.

Home Hints and Recipes

Perfume Holders

One of the newest of the fine bouquet perfumes is put up in flat blot-ques which have cameo cut corners and the stopper also cameo cut in flower design.

For fine extracts there are some very attractive perfume bottles that have lacquer gold caps over the ground glass stoppers to prevent the escape of the aroma.

A very odd little perfume burner resembles something between a chafing dish and a Greek incense burner. It has a tiny lamp under the main part, a pearl side handle and lacquer-gold cover.

Kneading Cloth

A kneading cloth is more convenient than a board. One can easily make one of three fourths of a yard of heavy white duck or drilling. Hem the edges and then sift on right side about a quart of flour, rubbing in well. Then it is ready for use for pastry, biscuit, cookies or doughnuts, after spreading it on table or shelf. The dough will not stick, and if care is taken not to spill liquids upon it, it need not be washed frequently. After using it should be folded, flour inside, and placed in a box.

PITTSBURGH, July 11.—Election of officers for 1915, the selection of next year's convention city, committee and board meetings today closed the annual sessions at the Hotel Schenley here of the National Association of Real Estate Exchanges.

Stops Mad Horse; Saves Life.

CHICAGO, July 14.—Lusty cheers went up from hundreds of throats when Patrolman Charles M. Johannes made a spectacular stop of a runaway horse in West Jackson boulevard. The sidewalks were crowded with persons on their way to luncheon and many women and girls were endangered. The officer could stop the maddened steed, Johannes, who is attached to traffic squad, was at South Clark street and West Jackson boulevard when the horse became frightened and started east. The animal was going directly against the traffic and men and women screamed and fled to safety.

Johannes ran into the street and leaped at the horse's head. He clung to the bridle until the animal's speed was checked. The officer had one leg badly injured, his hat was broken and his clothing much arranged. The crowd cheered him and it was with difficulty that he escaped from the throng. He was able to go home after making an official report. The horse and wagon belonged to Nick Kaehavon, 2964 Prairie avenue. A bridle broken when the horse took fright at an automobile.

Stock in Old Trunk \$100,000.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 14.—Corporation stock now said to be worth \$100,000, found by Miss Juanita Reeves in rummaging through an old trunk a year ago, was issued in 1842 and 1855 to her grandfather, John G. Shelton.

The mass of folded and wrinkled papers included forty-nine shares of Ohio & Mississippi railroad stock, thirty shares St. Louis Gas company, fifty shares in Missouri Wine company and Pacific railway tax certificates exchangeable for stock.

According to an attorney to whom the stock has been turned over, the estate of Mr. Shelton, who died in 1899, will have to be reopened to divide the value of the stocks among ten heirs. The estate was closed in 1875. Some of the heirs reside in St. Louis. The others are Miss Ada Campbell and Thomas Campbell of Chicago and Mrs. D. N. McCleary of Pawhuska, Okla.

More Allies for White Wolf.

PEKIN, China, July 14.—White Wolf, the bandit leader, after looting Nanchaohsien in the province of Honan, has proceeded to the Matienling mountains in central Honan. A part of the 8th division of the Chinese army, stationed at Suchow, was sent against him. One thousand revolutionists, calling themselves the 2d revolutionists, having defeated a part of the 2d division of the Chinese army near Hsientaochen, in southern Hupeh, are preparing to join White Wolf.

Voters Don't Know He's Dead.

MACON, Ga., July 14.—W. J. Mosley, who died ten years ago, was elected a member of the Bibb county democratic executive committee in the recent county primary. Two thousand voters cast ballots for him without knowing that for a decade he had been in his grave. A relative, who had read in a newspaper of Mosley's election, informed officials of the error.

DOZEN COUNTRIES IN TOWN PLANNING CONGRESS

LONDON, July 11.—Experts on town planning and housing reform from a dozen countries met here today for the first congress of the International Garden Cities and Town Planning Association, to which are affiliated most of the important housing and town planning bodies of the world. The countries represented were Great Britain, United States, Austria, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Poland, Russia, Spain, Denmark and Holland. The first session is being held at the Hempstead Garden Suburb, in northwest London, but to enable the delegates to inspect the garden cities of which England is the home, the remaining sessions will be held at Birmingham, Port Sunlight, Liverpool and Letchworth successively. Housing by municipal authorities, by public utility societies and by private individuals and companies will also be inspected and the principal town planning schemes recently put forward in various countries will be explained by the authors.

Food Bad? See the Landlady.

TOPEKA, Kans., July 14.—Persons who provide unwholesome food, which "makes their guests, boarders or employees sick," are liable for personal damages, according to a decision of the Kansas supreme court.

The decision was handed down in the case of J. D. Malone, a farm hand who brought suit for \$15,000, alleging his employer served meat that made him ill. The lower court gave him a verdict for \$1,000. This decision was upheld by the supreme court.

Order Scares His Audience.

LEEDS, Eng., July 14.—Sir William Osler, regius professor of medicine at Oxford university, startled the large audience attending the conference of the Association for Prevention of Consumption by saying that almost all the persons in it were tuberculous. He said:

"If, with the aid of radium and a microscope, I could look at the chests of the audience I am addressing, in 90 per cent of you I should discover a small focus or area of tuberculosis."
