LOWER INSURANCE RATES TO BE INSISTED UPON

COMMERCIAL ASSOCIATION TO
SEND A COMMITTEE TO
CITY COUNCIL.

A matter of vital importance to
Pendleton business interests as well
as citizens in general will be brought

up before the city council this evening by a committee of three from the Commercial association and it will probably mean that a demand will be made and insisted upon for a re-adjustment of insurance rates in the city in view of the installation of the new fire alarm system, the purchase of a new fire truck and the near completion of the gravity water system. The city is entitled to a reduction in the rates on the strength of the new fire alarm system alone, it is said, but the insurance companies

have not been entirely willing to make the reductions at this time. Some favorable action will be asked for from the council so that advantage may be taken of lower rates and as the new water system is completed, a complete readjustment of the insurance companies can be insisted upon later. It is probable the council will act favorably so as to force a speedy action in the matter. The committee which will go before the council this evening will comprise A. J. McAllister, Clarence Bishop and J. V. Tallman.

BROTHERS SPEAK 15 YEARS OF SILENCE

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 15.—Robert and Joseph Miller, brothers, spoke to each other this week for the first time in fifteen years. All of this time they have lived in the same house, eaten at the same table, slept in the same room and been partners in the produce farm which they own. They are well-to-do.

Fifteen years ago when their stock in trade consisted of a run-down little truck garden they had a falling out over who did the most work and Joseph vowed that he would never speak to his brother again until Robert spoke first. Pride prevented each from being the first to break over.

When they had anything to say to each other they did it through the medium of the third person.

"Ask Joe if he is going to town today or whether I shall go," Robert would say to a hired hand, even though Joseph were within a few feet of him.

"Well Bob I am going because there is some private business I want to see about," Joseph would reply through the same medium.

Venezuela Names Envoy to U. S.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 15.—Santos A. Domínguez has been appointed minister from Venezuela to the United States, succeeding the late Minister Rojas. Señor Domínguez now is minister to Great Britain, Germany and Belgium. He was president of the Venezuelan National university under former President Castro.

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

BAKER, Ore., July 15.—Promoters here are busy with a proposal to build a streetcar system in Baker and to Eagle Valley, a rich farming community, 45 miles out of the city in the northeastern part of the county.

Joseph Kries, of Portland, conferred with prominent men Monday relative to forming a company to back the scheme. Mr. Kries is said to have among his backers John B. Yeon, of Portland, and others connected with the Eagle River Electric company. The farmers have already been sounded on the proposal, and have welcomed it heartily.

Prominent bankers and other leading citizens of Baker who have conferred with Mr. Kries were inclined to regard the project as feasible and the backing to be sound.

WALLOWA, Ore., July 15.—Charles Williams was killed outright and June Mason was fatally injured in a runaway of a logging train on the line of the Nibley Minnaugh Lumber company, on the Whisky creek branch this afternoon. The cause of the runaway is not known. All of the train crew jumped.

Williams and Mason, however, did not jump in time and were caught by the falling logs. Williams was killed instantly. His brother saw him mangled by the falling logs. Mason probably was hit by logs, but his injuries are confined to his head, the skull being fractured in three places and his face badly gashed. He was brought to Wallowa hospital immediately, but doctors hold out no hopes for recovery.

An inquest was held tonight over the body of Charles Williams. The dead man and his brother are from Utah and are unmarried. Mason has a wife and six children.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—Carroll D. Hurlbert, in charge of the mailing department of the First National bank, with which he has been connected for about seven years, is missing and his wife, relatives and bank officials are at a loss to account for his whereabouts.

SALEM, Ore., July 15.—Declaring that the ballot title prepared by Attorney General Crawford for the proposed amendment to article 11 of the constitution, providing for proportional representation in the legislature, is not true nor impartial, T. H. Burdard, of Portland, filed suit in the circuit court here today to require Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott to substitute another title for the amendment. This is the first suit of this nature ever brought.

SALEM, Ore., July 15.—The first fatality in a hazardous occupation since the workmen's compensation law became effective was reported to the State Industrial Accident Commission by Porter Bros., of the Grant-Smith company, of Glenada, railroad contractors. They wired that a man had been killed while doing railroad work but did not give his name.

Under the law a widow of a victim of a fatal accident is entitled to \$10 a month and \$6 a month each for her children, if she has less than four until they are 16 years of age. The widow's pension ceases if she remarries.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 15.—While riding last Wednesday night during a hard electrical storm, rounding up his sheep, Steven Cantrall, a well known sheepman of the Tule Lake district, was struck by lightning. The bolt passed through his body and killed him. The horse's skull was crushed. That the bolt struck Cantrall was shown in an examination by Dr. Gibbons of Tule Lake, who was called when Cantrall staggered home. The lightning went through his hat, passed down his nose, burning off the eyebrows, went down the chin and arms, burning off all the hair on his arms, through the finger tips down the reins to the animal's head, which was crushed.

Bombs Found on Vagrants.

BEAUMONT-SUR-ORSE, France, July 15.—A package in the possession of two Russians, who were arrested on the charge of vagrancy, was found to contain two bombs containing a high explosive. The police say one of the men admitted he was an anarchist.
