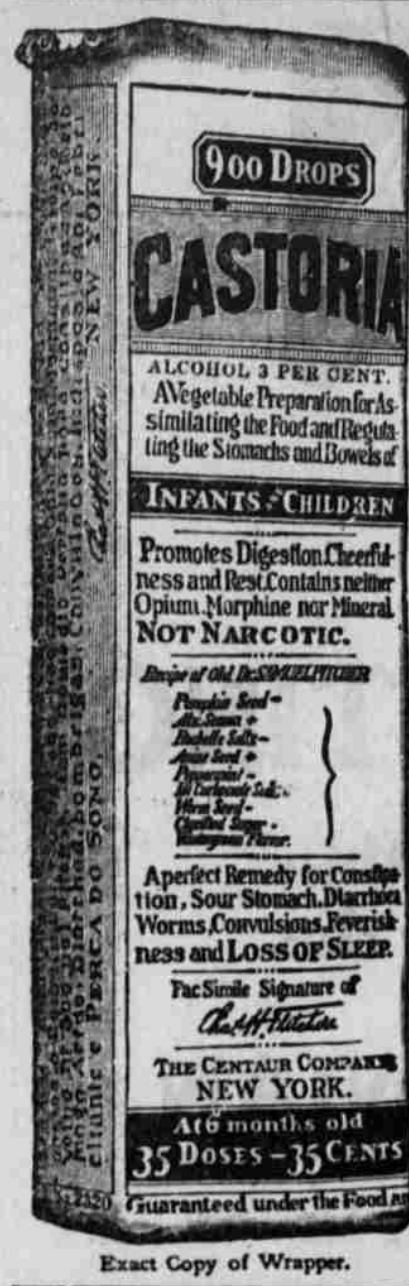

Home Hints and Recipes

Health and Beauty.

Many cases of neuralgia of the skin result from that most common malady, dyspepsia; in that case this disorder must be conquered before relief may be expected. As the physical condition improves the pains or numbness will gradually lessen.

For tan or sunburn a simple but effective remedy is to pour some peroxide of hydrogen into the palm of the hands and distribute it evenly over the affected parts. Let it dry without rubbing. After it is dry apply any good lotion. This will rapidly

bleach the complexion without injuring the most delicate skin.

To eat an apple last thing at night is a splendid thing for preventing decay in the teeth. The acid in the apple cleanses the teeth of all impurities, and also aids in the prevention of the accumulation of the deadly tartar, which is at the bottom of nearly all dental ills. Eat the apple just before going to bed, chewing it thoroughly, so that the acid will have an opportunity of getting into all the tiny crevices between the teeth.

One of the precautions which must be taken by the woman who is subject to freckles or sunburn is the application of cold cream to the skin at frequent intervals. In fact, every time she goes out into the open air the beauty seeker must wash her face in warm water (not hot), dry it gently, always remembering to rub up, not down, and then rub into the pores a good cold cream, so that the skin is slightly coated. Then fluff on some powder, smooth this over the complexion, and she is ready to meet the sunlight unafraid.

FARM LAND SINKING NEAR MOUNT LASSEN

REDDING, July 16.—Eight hundred acres of land four miles north of Whitmore, a town twenty-four miles northeast of Redding and a like distance northwest of Mount Lassen, is sinking. Barbed wire fences are being rent at different points. Great oak trees are toppling over and pine trees are leaning and threatening to fall at any moment. Water is oozing from the ground in hundreds of places and threatening to inundate the entire area. The barn on the old Whitmore ranch has been shot up repeatedly to keep it from swinging out of shape. A fissure 2000 feet long runs through the center of the ranch. In places the land has sunk from two to ten feet. The sinking of the land was observed on June 15, the day following the first violent eruption of Mount Lassen. Robert Williams, the present lessee of the Whitmore ranch, is contemplating abandoning the property.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The Hay bill, organizing a special aviation service in the signal corps of the army, was agreed upon in the house and goes to the president. The bill provides a service of sixty officers and 250 enlisted men to have charge of all the army's aviation work.

Chicagoan Wins Sea Air Race.

LONDON, England, July 16.—The aeroplane race from London to Paris and back was won by Walter L. Brock, the American airman, who recently carried off the aerial derby round London and the London-to-Manchester air race.

Brock arrived at Hendon aerodrome just outside London at 4:48 o'clock, having taken exactly three hours and a half to fly from the Buo aerodrome outside Paris.

As his flying time on the westward journey from Hendon to Paris was 1 hour and 33 minutes, the total duration of his double journey was 7 hours and 3 minutes and 3 seconds. The distance in a direct line is 502 miles.

On his arrival Brock received a great welcome from the huge crowd assembled in the aerodrome. He has become very popular in England since his arrival from Chicago two years ago.

OHIO COLLEGE GIRLS HOLD MANY RECORDS

PAINESVILLE, O., July 16.—If the mistaken impression prevails that the only real girl athletes in the United States are schooling at Vassar, Smith and Wellesley, it should be corrected, according to girls at Lake Erie College here. These girls hold seven world's records and are striving for more. Vassar holds five world's records.

Architects are drawing plans for a huge gymnasium to replace the inadequate quarters in which Lake Erie girls have been forced to train for their field events. The new building will cost nearly \$100,000 equipped and will furnish quarters for over 400 girls.
