Health and Beauty

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

KLAMATH FALLS, July 17.—Phillip J. Sinnott of Oregon City, and Miss Florence Bowen of this city were married at the Church of the Sacred Heart at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning. The couple left on the morning train for California, where they will remain several weeks.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the O-W-R & N company, is expected back tonight from his vacation trip which he spent in Alaska. Though he was absent only about two weeks, sailing from Seattle by the inside passage, he had expected to visit all the ports of southeastern Alaska and look somewhat into the interior. He was accompanied by Mrs. O'Brien.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 17.—The state prohibition question will be decided by ballot this fall. Secretary of State Howell, completing his check of the initiative signatures, certified that there are 70,182 valid names on it. In addition there are about 25,000 names which are ruled out only because they had not been checked up by the registration officials in the various districts. The 14,000 names obtained in Seattle came under this class.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 17.—When little Jewel Killian, the 18-months old daughter of Ed Killian, a resident of Centralia, wandered away from home Tuesday and decided to lie down and rest on the Northern Pacific tracks, northbound passenger train No. 414 was brought to an abrupt stop. The engineer applied the tot between the rails barely in time and for a few minutes the train was held up while the child was carried to safety.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 17.—Two alleged burglars were captured early this morning in the store of the Stewart Hardware company by City Marshal Carson. The men, who have given their names as C. Jones and John Smith, were discovered in the office of the store.

Night Officer Smith was notified and several belated participants in the demonstrations following the victory of the road bonds surrounded the building. Marshal Carson made his way into the store and caught the men. They were given a hearing and bound over to the grand jury.

BRYAN DECLARES FOR VOTES FOR WOMENKIND

WILL ASK NO POLITICAL RIGHT HE DOES NOT ACCORD TO WIFE.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Secretary Bryan in a formal statement issued tonight, came out for woman suffrage. He declared that he would ask no political right for himself that he was not willing to grant his wife, and announced his intention of supporting the proposed state constitutional amendment extending the franchise to women to be voted on in Nebraska next November.

Women, Mr. Bryan said, had proved herself equal in every responsibility imposed on her, and would not fail society in this emergency. Above all other arguments in favor of giving her the ballot he placed the right of the mother to a voice in the moulding of the environment of her children.

Dies "Poor"; \$5000 Hidden

NEWTON, Wash., July 17.—Charles Perrine, 73 years old, died in a hospital here a few days ago, apparently in poverty, but his two sisters, Mrs. Georgia Ann Miller of Girard, Ill., and Mrs. Emily Waggoner of Valley, Wash., have discovered more than \$5000 in money in a dozen hiding places about the cabin in which he lived for forty-three years. They also find themselves heirs to Perrine's farm, valued at \$12,000.

Four Die in Boating Accident

BRANFORD, Ore., July 17.—In a boating accident Thomas Garnet, a wealthy farmer, his two children and a maid, lost their lives on the Grand river. The other occupant of the boat a farm hand, swam to the river bank and gave the alarm, but the boat and its occupants had disappeared before aid arrived.

STUDENT CUT IN DUEL DIES FROM LOSS OF BLOOD

MARBURG, Germany, July 17.—A student of the university here died to death after a duel with a fellow student. His jugular vein was severed by a sword.

RIVERBANK, July 17.—The Larunas, stationed at Riverbank and employed by the Santa Fe railroad, staged a number of Indian dances here, including the Comanche, Apache, Eagle, Enemy, Farewell, and Green Corn.
