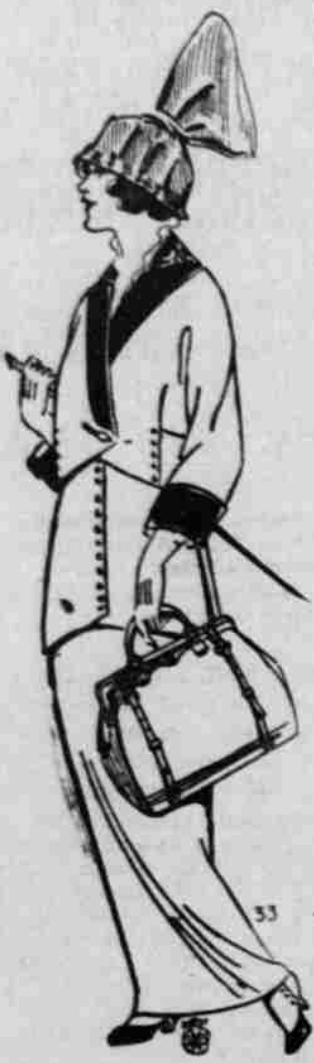

Home Hints and Recipes

THE VACATION TRUNK.

(By Mary Lee in Chicago News.) The woman who is packing to go away on a vacation will be grateful to Dame Fashion for so curtailing the quantity of material in her garments that two will now pack into the space formerly occupied by one. The styles are so plain and the trimmings so flat that dresses are much easier to pack and come out in better condition.

Again, an extensive wardrobe is no longer considered necessary. People do not dress two or three times a day as formerly. Two or three gowns well chosen will be sufficient for a short vacation, and, in fact, a long one, if taken away in quiet country, or, indeed, abroad. Any number of women take a vacation abroad carrying a suitcase only, and manage to look attractive always, but, of course, the outfit is selected with the greatest care and taste.

But in some cases it is, of course necessary to take a large trunk, and not every woman knows the best method of packing. The first thing to do is to gather everything together that is to go into the trunk in one place, and that nothing may be forgotten, it is a good thing to begin with underwear and work outward until the hats come last.

Pack heavy articles first, as shoes, filling them with anything breakable, previously carefully wrapped in something soft, as stockings, for instance. If a heavy wrap is taken this goes in next. This is folded like a man's coat laid flat, the outside up. The sleeves are turned back at the elbow, then the front edges of the coat are brought together in the middle of the back and the coat folded over once.

Lay everything as flat as possible, because it will pack more tightly this way, and take up less room than when rolled into small bundles, as some women do when packing.

The underwear comes next. Then press down contents to see whether there are any lumps that should be smoothed out or spaces that might be filled in with something.

Separate waists, also the one-piece gowns, carry best when laid on hangers, the sleeves stuffed with tissue paper and laid one over the other. A waist will lie flat in the trunk front upward, and in the case of a dress this also may lie flat covered with tissue paper and the skirt turned up. A roll of the paper should be laid in the fold of the dress to prevent a crease.

It goes without saying the better dresses go at the bottom and the lighter ones at the top.

Hats are easy to pack nowadays, since the sole trimming is apt to be a stick-up. This is removed for packing and replaced at the end of the journey. Hat, trimming and accessories will carry in the tray of the trunk.

To Pick Up Glass. Instead of picking up pieces of broken glass, wet a woolen cloth, lay on the floor over the fragments and pat lightly. The tiny particles will stick to the cloth, which may be burned.

MONK IS STABBED BY WOMAN.

Fake Beggar Thrusts Dirk Into Body of Friend of the Czar.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 18.—Details were received here today in a dispatch to the Courier of a probably fatal attack on the mystic lay monk, Gregory Rasputin, whose influence over the emperor is said to be great. Rasputin, who has been one of the most prominent figures in Russia in recent years, was visiting his native village, Bokrovsky, in the province of Tobolsk, Siberia, when a woman, a stranger, approached him pretending to be a beggar. After accosting him she stabbed him in the abdomen with a long dirk.
