SPARKS FROM TELEGRAPH.

Deported through an error of the immigration bureau at San Francisco, three Chinese youths were transferred from the Pacific mail liner Manchuria 699 miles out at sea, to the steamship Nile of the same line, homeward bound. A wireless message made known the mistake.

At a special election the citizens of Cincinnati refused to change the manner of running their municipal affairs by declining to adopt a new charter. The charter had been prepared by a special committee of fifteen and embodied many reforms. Edgar Murphy, a young farmer of New Albany, N. J., confessed, say the authorities, that he was the murderer of Herman Fisher, 17 years old, shot and killed while he was returning from a visit to his sweetheart, Ida Wilhelm.

Fifty thousand dollars worth of coal belonging to the Chicago & Alton railroad was consumed in a fire believed to have been started by sparks from a passing engine at Brooklyn.

James Bailey, a negro, accused of the theft of three mules, was hanged by a mob near Lake Cormorant. Bailey was taken from an officer on the way to the jail at Hernando in an automobile.

Benton McMillin, the American minister and Foreign Minister Gazzani signed an arbitration treaty at Lima to cover all questions which may arise between the United States and Peru.

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—Miss Mary Gaven, 382 East Thirty-first street, was overcome by the heat near Fourth and Washington streets Saturday. She was taken to a drug store and afterwards removed to the Good Samaritan hospital by the Ambulance Service company. She was still in a semi-conscious condition at a late hour last night. Her condition is not considered serious.

PORTLAND, July 20.—Yesterday

was a day of river tragedies. Edward M. Childs, 20, treasurer of the Empress theater, and W. H. Ewing, 21, and son of Dr. W. H. Ewing, of 875 East Taylor street, were drowned in Columbia Slough, and Arthur D. Dix, recently of the Second field artillery, lost his life at Bundy's bathing pavilion.

KELSO, Wash., July 20.—A very serious fire began burning in the timber of the Eastern & Western Logging company in the western end of Cowitz county Friday and for a time threatened the company camp. A great amount of the concern's timber was destroyed. The entire crew fought the flames and the donkeys have been pulled out to a place of safety.

GENESEE, Idaho, July 20.—After being carried 12 miles on a stretcher, Jesse McMahon, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William McMahon, was brought here from the Salmon river country with serious wounds in his hip from a .44 caliber gun. The boy was shot several days ago when his hunting companion dropped a gun and it was discharged accidentally. It was impossible to get a doctor into the Salmon river country, although efforts were made for several days, and when the boy's situation became critical men volunteered to carry him out.

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 20.—A jury in the circuit court Saturday returned a verdict of \$250 in favor of Charles S. Anderson for false arrest against B. F. Retherford, N. G. Hedlin and A. G. Horberg. Anderson charged that on July 9, 1913, Retherford and Anderson swore out a complaint against him before A. G. Horberg, justice of the peace at Boring, for his arrest on a charge of

larceny for the purpose of compelling him to release a certain lien which he held against the property of Retherford and Hedlin. Anderson testified that he was arrested and taken to jail.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—The first case of trichinosis to appear in Portland in several years is now under treatment at St. Vincent's hospital. J. B. Sutherland, an employee of the St. Helens Lumber company, is the victim in Portland. Two other men, Fred Hanson and Gordon Elliott, exhibited slight symptoms of the disease a week ago, but they recovered.

A report to the state board of health shows that the case is being treated by Dr. S. C. Slocum. He conferred with Dr. Robert G. Benson, professor of pathology in the University of Oregon, about the case. Large number of trichinae were found in Sutherland's muscles.
