PARIS, July 20.—Genevieve Henriette Caillaux, after months of waiting goes to trial on July 20 for the murder of Gaston Calmette editor of the Figaro. Several cabinet convulsions have already been caused by the sensational murder, easily one of the most far-reaching in its effects ever committed in France. There are about fifty witnesses for the prosecution and about twenty for the defense. Maitre Labori, one of the most famous criminal lawyers in France has been retained to defend the murderers.

HERMISTON PLANS HOG AND DAIRY SHOW

DEMISE OF DISTRICT FAIR CAUSES INCREASED SUPPORT FOR ANNUAL SHOW.

HERMISTON, Ore., July 20.—(Special.)—Active work has been commenced on the Hermiston annual dairy and hog show. At the last meeting of the Hermiston Commercial club the general committee reported that local support of the show was strong and that the outside demand was better than last year. The business men of Hermiston and the breeders of registered stock as well as the owners of dairy herds are much in favor of the annual show, as it was demonstrated last year beyond doubt that it could be maintained and was a great impetus to the industries represented.

Grounds were secured in January for a permanent building. The ground is 50 by 200 feet and about two blocks from the postoffice and near the railroad track. It was donated by the Maxwell Land & Irrigation Co. The building as designed by Architect Hinebaugh will cover the entire ground space and a part of it will be built early this fall in due time for the show. Last year the managers of the show were granted the use of the large stock tent belonging to the county fair association and this will be needed this year in addition to the main building and several large stable tents.

The standard of stock for which premiums will be offered will be raised somewhat and the gates will be thrown open to all comers. Since the regular annual county fair will not be held this year at Pendleton it is hoped to make the Hermiston show a much bigger event and the entire county in particular will be welcomed to exhibit and attend. The show will be held for two days instead of one as last year.

Since last year a large number of registered hogs and bulls have been bought by West End people and the breeders have learned more of the art of making a good exhibition. The west end of the county is rapidly developing the dairy industry through the aid of the creamery at Hermiston. Alfalfa has been demonstrated as the quick money maker of this irrigated belt and with this as a basis the cows and the hogs are the sure way to success.

Guard Old Player's Piano. PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 20.—Plans of the councilmanic committee in charge of the Stephen C. Foster memorial to have installed in Foster's music room the handsome old piano on which he first played "The Swanee River" and "My Old Kentucky Home" were blasted when the trustees of Carnegie Institute notified Robert Garland, the chairman, that the piano must remain in Carnegie museum.

The piano was given to the institute by Henry Butterfield of Boston and the request that it be moved to the Foster homestead was referred to him. He wrote the trustees that because of the danger of fire he preferred to have it remain in the museum, a fireproof building.

Equip Militiamen With Bolos.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Recognition of the bolo, usually associated with fierce Philippine campaigns, as a weapon for more peaceable pursuits is reflected in a war department circular providing for the issuance of these broad-swords to militia gun companies.

The bolo became part of the regular army equipment after the Spanish war. Although it was used with deadly effect by the Filipinos in warfare, it has always been the principal industrial instrument in the islands. It was used not only in cutting through the jungle, but in the harvesting of such crops as were included in the primitive agriculture of the natives.

As it has proved to be such a good all around implement, its use has been extended to the militia, since it is especially adapted for use in clearing camp sites and in pitching tents.
