Child Heiress is Drowned.
 PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 21.—Two year old Nancy Carpenter, heiress to millions and niece of United States Senator Henry A. DuPont of Delaware, was drowned in a shallow pool on the estate of her uncle Pierre E. DuPont, at Kennett Square, near here.

The child was the daughter of R. M. Carpenter, a banker of Wilmington, Del. The accident happened during a brief absence of the child's nurse.

GOVERNMENT SEEKS TO RECOVER THREE MILLIONS FROM WESTERN FUEL CO.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—The government will seek to recover \$81,578.95 from the Western Fuel company in a suit soon to come up in the federal court here. According to United States District Attorney Preston, more suits are to follow to a total amount approximating \$2,000,000.

The suit already on file represents the full value of some forty ship loads of coal sold by the company to the government, mainly for the army transport service. The government asserts that the coal was underweight. The law allows it to confiscate such cargoes and as the coal is no longer available, Preston asks the money instead.

While the government charges that when the company sold the coal it did not give as much as the recorded weights indicated, it charges also that in importing it, the corporation brought in more than the weights it gave, thereby defrauding the customs. These payments, together with heavy penalties, are what Preston will seek to recover through later suits. As a result of criminal trials involving the same transactions, General Manager James B. Smith, Superintendent Frederick C. Mills and Weigher Edward M. Mayer of the company were convicted and their cases are pending on appeal. The concern's higher officers set off on the ground that they did not know their subordinates were cheating the government.

Calliopes Stop Girls' Work.

BURLINGTON, Ia., July 21.—When the calliopes on excursion steamers play tango music the 200 girls employed by the Mississippi Pearl Button company refuse to work. This is the basis for an injunction filed by Mir Bros. to stop calliopes on steamers during working hours. The plaintiffs also seek damages in the sum of \$500 for loss of the services of young women employees.
