Concerning Women.
Chorus girls are organizing a union and already 200 of the 1,500 in New York city have joined.

Ten young women recently acted as billposters to advertise a suffrage mass meeting in Philadelphia.

The state of Minnesota has received an inheritance tax of \$52,535 from the widow of Charles G. Gates.

Over 1,500 girls have gone on a strike in London because their employers are hiring child labor.

Religion is taught the pupils in the public schools of Italy by an association composed entirely of women.

Pasadena (Cal.) women have asked the city council to pass an ordinance prohibiting tobacco chewing in the street cars.

Over 5,000 boys and girls assisted Mrs. Edith W. Pierce, inspector of streets in Philadelphia, to clean up the city.

A woman is the patentee of a coffee pot in which the grounds are kept away from the spout by a vertical perforated partition extending to the top.

Wyoming where women have had the full ballot for forty-five years, has the smallest proportion of unmarried women to its population of any state in the union.

Dainty Pin Cushion.
It is pretty, it is easy to make, and it is just the thing to hang on the dresser at the side. It is not more than four inches square and is covered with pink or blue silk. Two crocheted medallions are then made, whipped together, with only one end open to form a little case, and then the pin cushion is slipped into the case, the opening is basted fast, a loop of ribbon is put upon one corner and the cushion is hung diamondwise from the side of the dresser mirror. The pattern is a very simple one of Irish crochet, with a raised crocheted rose in the center of the cushion and a border of shells in treble crochet. These little cushions are used when there is too much upon the dresses to think of cluttering it still further with a pin cushion. The loop attached to the cushion is slipped over one of the mirror supporters, and is so held up out of the way.

ILLINOIS WOMEN HAVE FIRST REAL TEST IN COMING CAMPAIGN

CHICAGO, July 23.—The women of Illinois will undergo their first real test as a political factor in the coming campaign. In the April elections they voted only for city officers, but on Nov. 8 they will have the additional privilege of voting for county state and national officers.

The officers for whom the electorate of the whole state will vote are state treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, clerk of the supreme court, three trustees of the University of Illinois and United States senator. All counties and several cities will provide several offices to be filled.

The municipal elections last spring afforded little opportunity for professional politicians to get a line on the women's voting strength, as one alderman was elected from each ward and women voted for different candidates, even when voting for the same party. The fall campaign, which is just getting under way, will permit the women to combine in support of certain candidates, and it is very probable their votes will decide the fate of many aspirants for the various offices.

CRYSTAL PALACE

The first public assemblage in Crystal Palace, London's famous show place, was held 50 years ago, the great building was formally opened by Queen Victoria. The palace was constructed of the materials used in housing the great exhibition of 1851. The edifice which was dedicated to the late Queen, has never been profitable, and on several occasions it has been threatened with destruction, but a movement recently set on foot promises to save the historic pleasure resort to the European nation.

The building occupies 16 acres, with 100,000 square feet of exhibition grounds, and is surrounded by a park of 200 acres. Ten thousand tons of iron and 500 tons of glass were used in its construction. Great football and cricket contests are held within its walls before 100,000 spectators.

GERMAN MONEY FLEES TO ESCAPE TAXATION

BERLIN, July 23.—Notwithstanding the sharp punishment threatened against tax-dodgers by the war-tax laws passed by the reichstag last year, it is evident that much German capital has fled the country to escape taxation. The matter has just come up for discussion in a committee of the Prussian house of lords. It was claimed, and the government admitted, that very large amounts of capital had gone to Switzerland. It was said that a big bank in the west had established in that country a trust company with nearly \$4,000,000 capital, whose sole business is to take charge of German moneys. It was added that Swiss banks have flooded Germany with circulars offering to take deposits, and that already not less than 120 banks and other concerns have been established in Switzerland either with German money, or for the purpose of taking charge of German deposits. The government representatives finally informed the committee that amendments to the tax laws would later be proposed in order to make it possible to tax more effectively German property held in foreign countries.

MARRIED MAN AND WIDOW MEET ON STREETS DESPITE ACTING RECORDER'S ORDERS

ATLANTA, Ga., July 23.—Neither his wife's requests nor the mandate of Judge Preston have proven successful in keeping young C. W. Holmes of 135 Spring street, from walking on the streets with Mrs. J. Williams, a pretty young widow.

Mrs. Holmes recently had her husband and Mrs. Williams arrested, objecting to his attentions to the widow. Judge Preston let the two off that time when they promised not to be seen on the streets together again.

When Holmes and the "lady of his fancy" were seen walking together near the postoffice building Friday by his mother, she remonstrated with her son for violating his pledge to Judge Preston. It is stated by the police that the son's wrath flamed up and that he caught his mother roughly by the arm and shook a walking cane at her. Then he was again arrested by a policeman.

Mrs. J. Williams, at the time of the wife's objections to her husband paying her so much attention, was living with them at 154 West Baker street.

BUSCH WIDOW GIVES \$50,000 TO HARVARD

BOSTON, July 23.—In order to insure the completion of her husband's plans for the new Germanic Museum at Harvard, Mrs. Adolphus Busch of St. Louis has offered \$50,000 to the institution. Mr. Busch was the largest individual donor to the museum fund.

SLUR ON ALGEBRA IS PAINFUL TO BOSTON

Professor Declares Women Who Study It Lose Souls.

BOSTON, July 23.—Boston was shocked by the declaration of Dr. Francis of Los Angeles that women who study algebra lose their souls.

Had he libeled the sacred codfish or said unkind things of beans he would still have retained some of the many friends he had here until today, but now none of them will ever look in his direction after what he said of algebra.

Gallen Vinton Bowditch, who for seventy-five years has never gone to bed without having spent an hour working out algebraic problems, is in favor of lynching Doctor Francis.

"For a Boston woman algebra is not only harmless but necessary," he said. "How shall she estimate otherwise the capacity of the bean pot which is to satisfy the needs of husband and children; how derive the number of thermal units which shall bake those beans to just the proper point?"

"I have done a lot of figuring on lost souls with spiritualistic friends, but have never heard from one, male or female, that blamed algebra for what had happened."

DISTILLERIES TO CUT OUTPUT OF WHISKY

LOUISVILLE, Ky., July 23.—More than half the distilleries of Kentucky, according to information made public here agreed to join in a movement that will reduce the 1914 output of whisky 20,000,000 gallons, on account of large stocks and overproduction during the past five years.

Ohio, Indiana and Illinois distillers also are said to be taking like steps and instead of beginning their 1914 manufacture November or December will postpone operations until January and then will make only one-half the usual output.

Distilleries are pointing out that decreased demand is not responsible for the proposed curtailment. They say statistics show consumption of whisky has increased from 20,000,000 gallons to 35,000,000 gallons in the past four years and that in the same production has jumped from 20,000,000 gallons to 45,000,000 gallons. "The idea," said one distiller, "is to let the demand catch up with the production."

SOUTH FRESNO TO GET HUGE GRAIN ELEVATOR

FRESNO, July 23.—The Sperry Flour company will construct a nine-story grain elevator in South Fresno, the first of the kind in this part of the state. Application was made to the city building inspector for permission to build on a site on the Frant branch of the Southern Pacific, where it intersects the Hamilton avenue electric line. The plant will cost \$25,000.
