BEEF IMPORTED FROM ARGENTINE IS DROP IN BUCKET TO UNITED STATES

With porterhouse steak at 50 cents a pound retail as an imminent fact, the beef-eaters of the world are getting somewhat worried, especially those who happen to be domiciled in the United States. Argentina is supplying some of her product, but when the enormous total of Uncle Sam's consumption is taken into consideration the quantity imported is not even as much as the proverbial drop in the bucket. Where can we look for more meat? Is the all-absorbing question.

In this connection it is interesting to note an article in the July number of the Monthly Bulletin of the Pan American Union, Washington, D. C., in which, under the title of "Uruguay as a Cattle Country," some interesting details as to the live stock industry of this rich little republic of South America are given.

Something over a hundred years ago the hacendados (ranchmen) of Uruguay complained to the government that over 450,000 head of cattle were being killed annually for their hides alone. The carcasses were thrown to the dogs, or left on the rolling prairie for the vultures to devour. Beef in Uruguay was so plentiful that it was something of a nuisance evidently. Of course that day has passed, but they still have cattle enough down there to convert some 700,000 head into 113,000,000 pounds of jerked beef in one year, most of which is sold to Brazil, Cuba, Porto Rico and other tropical countries. Think of the juicy tenderloins of 700,000 head of cattle going into jerked beef!

Again there are many thousands of Uruguayan cattle annually converted

into extract of beef. Perhaps but few people know that the first great factory for the production of beef extract known to the world was established at Fray Bentos, a little city on the Uruguay river about 100 miles above Buenos Aires, the cosmopolitan capital of Argentina, and that it is still doing business "at the same old stand." Although the "stand" has grown enormously larger since the time it became the pioneer in the beef-tea industry. The world-wide reputation of this concern is perhaps largely due to the high grade of the cattle of Uruguay, as well as to the cleanly and scientific manner of the preparation of the product. The writer of the article in the Bulletin says: "Fray Bentos has been called the greatest kitchen in the world. On some days 2,500 head of cattle are slaughtered, then treated so as to get the finest meat from them, the bones and ribs, the intestines, tails, sinews, hocks, and other parts being reserved for their various uses. But this special meat is subjected to scientific preparation; it is cooked, to be sure, in a real kitchen, and with the best possible attention to detail. There are chemists, laboratories, engineers, and authorities on technical matters, all engaged in cooking the beef so as to turn it out in the most acceptable form as the well known and popular extract. The company is organized with a system of help to the employees for improving their physical, material and moral welfare. It maintains an almost model city around its factory, and has a reputation for enterprise and fair dealing which gives it an enviable place in the business world."

Health and Beauty.
Plenty of sleep and plenty of fresh air will do all the necessary doctoring for the tired nerves. Old Mother Nature is very kind to her children unless they fly in her face. For disobedience to her she metes out severe punishment, but to her obedient daughters she is the best of nurses. And sleep and oxygen will freshen up and rejuvenate the tired body.

Many and varied are the directions for the sister who is thin. Much sleep, exercise in the open air, plenty of fresh circulating air in the sleeping chamber, a nap in the middle of the day and a glass of milk and egg, or better still, malted milk, if it is liked, will certainly add nourishment and give but little trouble to the digestive organs. Above all, do not worry; that will pull pounds from the stout one.

There is a simple remedy for headache which can be concocted with half a lemon, a glass of water, a small teaspoonful of sugar and an eighth of a teaspoonful of baking soda. Put the lemon juice and sugar in a glass of water, stir well, then add the soda, stir again and when it foams nicely drink the mixture immediately. This is an agreeable as well as a very excellent remedy for some kinds of headache, and certainly is one of the most harmless.

To Freshen Cloth.
If you would keep your tailored suit always fresh and the skirt equally worn with the coat, do not wear the skirt indoors. The skirt will grow shabby long before the coat is worn out. Cloth should be pressed only when absolutely necessary. A simple way to freshen material which will not stand frequent pressing is to hang it over steam. An excellent way to freshen serge that has grown shiny is to brush it against the nap with a cloth or a soft brush dampened in ammonia and water.

Loop Now Flower Garden.
CHICAGO, July 24.—The Loop district, often characterized by the jealous inmates of other cities as "dark" and "gloomy" and "smokey," has undergone a transformation which will put a quietus on any such libel. The Loop is today a veritable flower garden.

NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The following postmasters have been appointed: Alma, Lane county, Rose E. Gold, vice Eliza J. Luce; Skullspring, Malheur county, Samuel W. Gould, vice Xenoe Littlefield, resigned.

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 24.—The big suspension bridge across the river here was built 25 years ago, but it was not until the first of this week that it was discovered that an entire series of heavy bolts was omitted. Men are installing the bolts. The lack of the bolts caused the bridge to sway when an automobile or heavy load passed over it. The error was discovered when general repairs were begun.

SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Rev. T. J. Woodcock, pastor of the Central Congregational church here, is dead, following an operation for stomach trouble, with which he had been troubled for years. He had been pastor here for 21 years. He was married in 1895 to Margaret Blythe. Last year Rev. Mr. Woodcock was secretary of the ministerial association. He was popular here. HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 24.—In the suit brought by the taxpayers of Hood River county, through their attorney, John Baker, to restrain the county treasurer from collecting the interest and penalties due on the last one half of the taxes as imposed by law, Judge W. L. Bradshaw overruled the demurrer filed by Judge Derby, county attorney, and the decision now restrains the treasurer from collecting interest and penalties on delinquent taxes in Hood River county.

SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Word has been received in Salem by Attorney W. T. Slater from Los Angeles to the effect that the judgment for the sum of \$69,339 in the case of A. B. Spencer against Levene S. Barnes of Salem has been affirmed in the district court of appeals of the state of California. Spencer secured a judgment in Salem on the California judgment several months ago and the judgment was sustained by the supreme court of Oregon. The amount for which judgment was gained is Spencer's share of a partnership existing between the two men in question as brokers for the sale of mining property.

TROUTLAKE, Wash., July 24.—The first fire to get beyond control in the Columbia forest in several years is now burning near Dead Horse Ranger station, six miles west of this place. Rangers have drafted several men to help fight the flames, which are burning in dead timber. It is hoped it will not reach live timber, as much of value in fine fir and pine is in that locality.

The fire started a week ago and was caused by lightning. Huge old dead cedars were torn to pieces by the lightning where the blaze started. Forest employees believe the fire will soon be controlled.

U. S. Agents Under Arrest.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Five government agents are under arrest on the Friboll Island in Bering sea and grave charges connected with their conduct with natives are under investigation by order of Secretary Redfield.

A. H. Proctor, agent on St. George's island, P. L. McCleeny, a naval wireless operator on St. Paul's island; Dr. C. J. McGovern, former physician there; P. R. Hutton, agent, and L. N. Tongue, storekeeper, are defendants to charges made by Mr. and Mrs. Alvin G. Whitney, teachers on St. Paul's.

Deputy Fish Commissioner Jones is in charge of the investigation and on his recommendation the navy has supplied McCleeny with another operator. The department of justice is considering the charges from civil and criminal aspects. Unlawful killing of seals, debauching of natives and other grave charges have been made.
