## Home Hints and Recipes

### Health and Beauty.

A cupful of strong coffee will remove the odor of onions from the breath.

One in a faint should be laid flat on the back, the clothes loosened and left alone.

A cupful of hot water drunk before meals will sometimes relieve nausea and dyspepsia.

It is not practical to wash the hands too often during the day, neither is it advisable to use hard water; either makes the skin hard. But should the hands get hard, use olive oil or cocoa butter.

The best time to bathe is just before going to bed, as any danger of taking cold is thus avoided and the complexion is improved by keeping warm for several hours after leaving the tub.

Much of the nausea connected with castor oil is caused by its thickness. It will solidify when kept in a bottle. Before giving, therefore, heat it for a moment by placing it in hot water or holding over a candle. It soon becomes perfectly liquid. In its pure liquid state infants and young children will take it easily if a little

brown sugar is sprinkled on its surface. For elders, it is best to beat it up in a cupful of milk, either warm or cold. The former is better, as it aids in its work. It should be beaten until it is frothy and sweetened with a lump of sugar. Few children fail to swallow or keep down castor oil when prepared as recommended.

### News of the Shops.

Motor veils of yellow and burnt orange are shown in various sheer filmy stuffs. Usually the veil is two yards or more in length and if of chiffon is hemstitched.

Slippers with a high pointed tongue and rounded strap across the vamp come in patent leather as well as in the leather in combination with suede.

The silk sweaters which come with loops for holding the sash girdles in place as to be had in gray, heliotrope, canary, rose turquoise, green and serge blue, as well as in black and white.

### Use Meat Scraps.

What to do with small scraps of beef and fowl is a common household question. The fragments may be collected and made into timbales, hash or shepherd's pie for lunch, with boiled rice or sweet potatoes as an accompaniment.

### PLANT AT KALAMA MAY BE REBUILT

KALAMA, Wash., July 27.—It is practically assured from what can be learned that the plant of the Mountain Timber company, destroyed by fire will be rebuilt. President Drake is now in Nebraska looking after interests there, and it is probable that until his return no definite plan of action will be announced. The fire which destroyed the mill and its machinery also burned one dock, doing damage to the amount of \$100,000. Half of the loss is covered by insurance. The dock north of the mill was saved by the San Ramon which was loading lumber there. The mill proper employed from 80 to 100 men.

### SHIPOWNERS HURRY TO UTILIZE CANAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 27.—Right on the heels of the government's announcement that the Panama canal will be ready for commercial traffic on August 15, there came announcements of plans for its immediate utilization by Pacific coast ships.

The American-Hawaiian Steamship company officials have started out to make their big Missourian the first westbound steamer through the canal with a domestic cargo. The Missourian was due to leave New York August 1, but the plans were changed to make the departure August 4 and the route via Panama instead of Magellan.

## SERVIANS IN U. S. READY TO RETURN FOR WAR DUTY

THOUSANDS ON THE COAST ENTHUSIASTIC FOR HOSTILITIES.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27.—Thousands of Servians of San Francisco are anxiously awaiting a declaration of war between their native country and Austria. They are longing for the opportunity to take arms against their ancient enemy and declare the time is opportune for a "final suppression" of Austria.

All day the leading spirits of the local Servian colony held informal conferences. The latest phase of the European situation were eagerly discussed. Probabilities of war were greeted with smiles and hearty hand shakes.

It was the opinion of those who gathered at the Servian headquarters that in event of hostilities a formidable force of enthusiastic Servians could be recruited quickly in this city and that Servians from throughout the state would come to San Francisco to join the volunteers.

The Servians of San Francisco also indicated they would raise funds for the transportation of the volunteers to the fatherland. This spirit of patriotism was equally manifest among the women of the local Servian colony. Many of them offered to assist in the collection of funds and the preparation of extra clothing for the volunteers.

M. Yevitch, editor of the Servian Herald, who was the center of enthusiastic groups of his fellow countrymen clamoring for the latest news was of opinion there might not be war. "Russia would be forced to back up Serbia," said Yevitch, "and Germany would naturally take up the cause of Austria. Russia is growing, and is today one of the most powerful nations of Europe. The defeat of Germany would mean the partition of Austria, and Austria does not want to lose her identity as a nation."
