Home Hints and Recipes

News of the Shops.

Very attractive is the silver deposit lemon squeezer. It gives a dainty touch to the summer luncheon table.

Hanging perfume bottles fitted into a wicker case will delight any woman who likes the dainty toilet accessories.

Silver plated racks fitted with half a dozen individual peppers and as many salt shakers come in a variety of patterns.

The latest thing in window shades is those of chintz. The material is glazed so that the wearing qualities of the material are enhanced.

The traveler who likes to read at night finds comfort in a portable bedside light. It costs \$5. It consists of a leather case within which is a standard, a bulb to screw into it, fifteen feet of cord and a shade.

A tall jug that is just the thing for the porch in hot weather is fitted with two covers, the inner one perforated. This inner cover prevents the cracked ice, fruit skins or mint slipping into the glass as the beverage is poured.

A small medicine and accident case of some sort is a convenience. One that is useful contains scissors, bandages of various sorts, antiseptics and some screw top bottles, in which medicines or remedies of any sort may be packed.

One dollar is the price of a compact buttonhook and shoehorn—the shoehorn, naturally, the handle of the buttonhook. It takes up little more room than each article separately, but it can be packed in the flap of the traveling case with ease.

Table Polish.

A simple and efficacious method of removing stains from a dining table of dull finish mahogany or other wood is as follows: Put a small quantity of powdered pumice stone—about two tablespoonfuls—in a piece of cheesecloth and tie securely so as to form a hard wand. Saturate this with olive oil and rub it briskly over the table surface, using a dry piece of cheesecloth to polish with afterward. This will keep any dull finished wood surface free from spots and looking like new.

Police Seized As Burglars.

ROCKVILLE CENTER, N. Y., July 28.—One-half of this town's police force of six men are accused of burglary by warrants issued. Two of the three men—Patrolmen Amos Veritman and Henry Wickes—were arrested on post. The third, Rufus Peterson, on his vacation, is believed to be at Holyoke, Mass. The Holyoke police have been requested to apprehend him.

Mr. Husser recently identified some of his stolen property worn on the street by negro residents and obtained information which resulted in the arrests.

FRANCE MAKES READY FOR WAR

PARIS, July 29.—The French government and people appear to be quietly preparing for war. The government is simply awaiting the decision of Russia.

Troop trains are ready and representatives of the army are on duty in the telegraph, telephone and postoffices. Large posters on the bulletin boards in the postoffices, city halls and other public buildings will apprise the soldier citizen of exactly the hour when his instructions become effective.

Cabinet Receives Reports.

The cabinet met late yesterday and received reports from ministers. If any decisions were reached they have been kept closely guarded. Abel Ferry, under secretary of foreign affairs, who took part in the cabinet council, is on his way to Dunkirk to meet President Poincare and Premier Viviani, who will arrive there.

According to what is believed to be responsible opinion, there remains the possibility that when Austria has occupied some Serbian territory she will in a day or two announce her intention not to proceed further, but to hold what she has taken until Serbia gives competent guarantees that she will observe Austria's wishes.

Austria and Russia Treating.

Russia would not then be likely to intervene. It is argued, except diplomatically, and negotiations appear to be going on at the present time between Austria and Russia.

On the announcement of war last night Paris became animated. There were patriotic demonstrations in the capital and many other cities throughout the republic, but there were also demonstrations against the war.

Fly Doomed by Borax.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The doom of the germ-carrying fly is seen in a new discovery announced by the department of agriculture. Its use is declared to assure the complete extermination of the common household pest that is largely blamed for spreading typhoid.

Arm Bound, Man Drives.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 29.—D. McDonald, a local merchant, drove an automobile the 26 miles from Sandy Flat to the city with his right arm, possibly broken, bound to his body and his little son working the levers for him. They had been out for a day's fishing. He sustained the bruised arm when he fell on a smooth boulder.

"I hoped that we would overtake someone who understands automobiles but it was our bad fortune to travel the entire distance without meeting anyone who could handle the machine. 'If anyone wants a harrowing experience, just let him drive a big car over a bad road with one of his arms giving him fearful pangs at every bump.'"

Almon Lost in Clouds.

GENEVA, SWITZ., July 29.—The greatest Alpine flight on record with a passenger was accomplished by the Italian aviator, Achille Landini, who was accompanied by Dr. Lampugnani. They left Novara, Italy, at 5 a. m. and traversed the Monte Rosa range, 15,217 feet in height. They landed safely at Viala at 7:30 o'clock, thus taking nearly three hours to cover a straight 160 miles, but they lost their way in the clouds and suffered greatly from the cold.

The Swiss authorities gave an official reception in celebration of the event.

Socialist Editor Resigns.

GIRARD, Kan., July 29.—Fred D. Warren, for 14 years editor of the Appeal to Reason, a socialist newspaper here, resigned because of ill-health. Louis Koehling, at present managing editor, will succeed Mr. Warren, and Walter H. Wayland, son of the late J. A. Wayland founder of the paper, will hereafter be sole owner and publisher.

Van's Vote to Cost \$100.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 29.—Charles A. Wilson, who lives at the Lethmus, Catalina Islands, intends to vote at the approaching state primary election, thereby making himself the most expensive elector in the state. Wilson is the only man in his precinct. The Lethmus is 12 miles from Avalon, the only town on the island.

Three voters will be sent from Avalon and with Wilson as a fourth, will constitute the election board. The expense is estimated at \$100.

SAYS CARMAN GUN DISAPPEARED AFTER SHOOTING

FREEPORT, N. Y., July 28.—The discovery of clues that indicate that a 28-caliber revolver was in the Carman home just prior to the murder of Mrs. Louise Bailey may lead to the cancellation of the manslaughter indictment against her and the indictment of Mrs. Carman on a first degree murder charge. Detective William J. Burns declares. This link is one of the strongest in the chain of circumstantial evidence being welded around the accused woman by District Attorney Smith. Burns says he can prove the presence of a revolver in the Carman household just prior to the shooting and that it disappeared shortly thereafter.



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Oranco Abandons Revolt.

MEXICO CITY, July 29.—General Pascual Oranco, Jr., has abandoned his independent revolutionary movement and intends shortly to leave for Canada, according to messages intercepted here. He is said to have notified his wife, who has been in Canada for some time, that he will join her soon.

The government peace delegates received their final instructions from the acting foreign minister, and expect to leave by night for San Luis Potosi.

Missing Sheepman Dead.

LAKEVIEW, Ore., July 29.—The body of William K. Barry, 65 years old, a prominent sheepman of Lakeview, was discovered by a searching party. Mr. Barry, who had large holdings in sheep, went to the camp a few days ago and from there started to the range. Later his driving team was seen with part of the harness and his riding horse was found dead. His friends sent a party Monday to search for the missing man. He was found near the camp. Indications were that he was killed by lightning.

Mr. Barry was an early resident of Lakeview. A widow and a son, Philip, in Lakeview, and a son, Mike, in Ireland, survive.

Bondair Big Hides Bomb.

NOTTINGHAM, England, July 28.—Irene Casey, a militant suffragette, was sentenced to 15 months' imprisonment on a charge of being in possession of explosives with the intention of committing a felony.

Miss Casey, who is the daughter of a London physician, was arrested during the king's recent visit to Nottingham. She was carrying a dressing bag containing four boxes full of a high explosive besides detonators, fuses, benzine, a chisel, pliers and glass cutters.

Huerta Will Go to Spain.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 29.—General Huerta, the ex-Mexican dictator, decided to await the arrival this week of a large party of refugees from Mexico, in whose company he plans to proceed direct to Spain. He will leave here as soon as he can complete his arrangements.

Dumps Dynamite Into Lake.

CHICAGO, July 28.—Acting City Custodian George M. Lorenz, went five miles out in the lake with a police motor boat and dumped three pounds of dynamite into the water. The explosive was found by the police about a month ago in a vacant house in Austin. Since that time it has been held in a vault in the city hall.

Hundreds of Sheep Burn.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., July 28.—Fire, which broke out in the sheeppen of the Bourbon Stockyards here caused damage estimated at \$600,000. Hundreds of sheep were burned.

The S. P. Co. is putting 600 cars of gravel ballast on its Coos Bay line.

ACTRESS MUST PAY WRONGED WIFE \$25,000



NEW YORK, July 29.—In less than 25 minutes Mrs. Elizabeth L. Armstrong, wife of George B. Armstrong, a comedian, earned \$25,000. On the strength of the testimony she gave during her 25 minutes on the stand in her alienation suit against Miss Pearl Abbott, the sheriff's jury, which heard the suit, awarded her the verdict and the \$25,000 damages. Miss Abbott, an actress, put in no defense. She is said to be traveling in Europe.
