Worth Knowing.

If the tablecloth is quite clean, excepting one or two spots, slip a folded towel between the tablecloth and the padding and on the towel place an empty bowl, having the stain directly over the bowl. 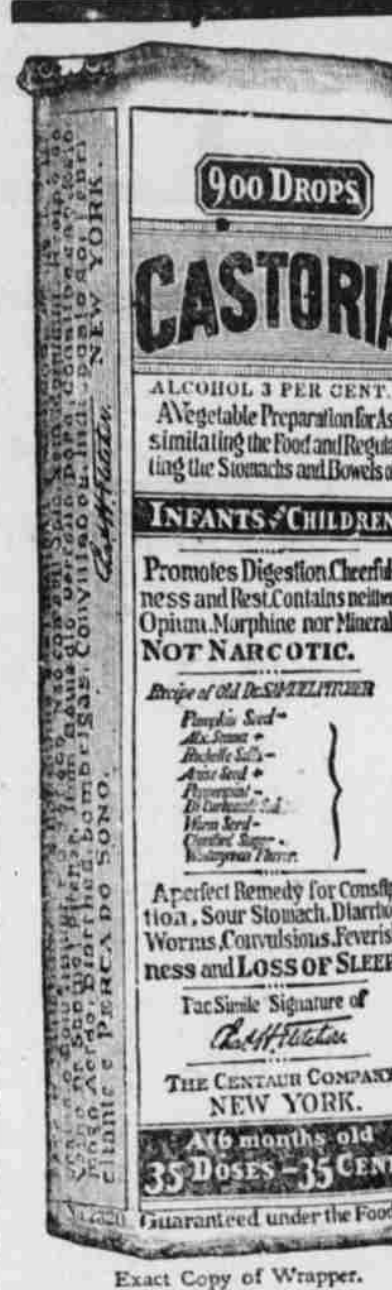
Widowed Bride Whose Father Killed Boy Husband

HAVERSTRAW, N. Y., July 29.—Mrs. Eugene H. Newman, the girl bride, whose eighteen year old husband was shot down by her father when he was about to tell of their secret marriage, has been prostrated by the tragedy and is in the care of a physician. The girl has had nothing to say since the shooting. She

has eaten but little and spends her time locked in her room alone. Witnesses who testified at the coroner's inquest brought out the fact that young Newman was murdered before he was permitted to utter a word in explanation of his actions. William V. Cleary, town clerk of Haverstraw and democratic clerk of Rockland county, will make his defense "the unwritten law," claiming that he thought his daughter had been wronged.

DUCHESS OF WESTMINSTER IS COMING WITH LIPTON

LONDON, July 29.—The Duchess of Westminster will be in the party of Sir Thomas Lipton when he sails for New York August 27 to witness the racing of the Shamrock IV, his challenger for the America's cup. Her Grace is immensely interested in the race and will watch it with the eye of a sailor, having handled large boats and having been skipper in many a brush with yachts. She was born on the shore of the Solent and her experience with sailboats has covered the period of her girlhood and has since been extended whenever circumstances permitted.

This trip follows a new settlement with the duke, which increases the duchess' allowance from \$70,000 to \$80,000 a year. The World told exclusively of their separation one year ago, when papers passed assuring the duchess the \$70,000 income. As the obligation devolved on her to clothe and educate her daughters as becomes their station, she decided recently that she needs more money and applied to the court for an increase of \$10,000. The petition was heard privately, and a compromise was reached last week for an extra \$10,000 a year.

RICH PIECE OF LAND WITHOUT ANY OWNER

SAN JOSE, July 29.—There is a wedge-shaped piece of land two miles long and about a half mile wide at its base in the heart of the most fertile section of Santa Clara county, to which there is no owner. The land has exchanged hands many times. It is planted to fruit trees and the crops will be harvested this year by a man who thinks he owns the land. Irving L. Ryder, a civil engineer, making a plat of the land for prospective buyers, and running the lines of adjoining property, has discovered that the land lies between the government survey and a Spanish grant survey, and that there never has been a deed passed to anyone from the government. The land can be taken up by any one who will make application and settle on the tract.
