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THREE CORNERED RACE FOR PLACE OF COMMISSIONER

Indications are that there will be a three cornered race for the office of county commissioner at the November election. J. M. Ashworth of Weston who lost the republican nomination only by a few votes, is seriously considering becoming an independent candidate for the office, according to advices from his home town.

H. M. Cockburn, of Milton, present commissioner, is the republican nominee to succeed himself but he won out over Ashworth only by a very narrow margin. Louis Hodgson of Freewater, is the democratic candidate.

Ashworth claims that he is constantly being importuned by friends to enter the race independent of party, and has received one petition from as far away as Hernalston. He declares he is about to yield, according to reports.

would seek out his new father-in-law who had for fourteen years been the democratic boss of his neighborhood, and ask forgiveness. Instead the town clerk shot him to death. The young widow was prostrated, as was her mother, and the relatives of the boy husband.

Her father is now charged with murder in the first degree. His defense may be insanity.

All Red Cross chapters in the United States are being notified.

German Vessels Driven Off.
COPENHAGEN, Aug. 1.—Preparations for the mobilization of the Danish army were completed. The cabinet has decided to issue a declaration of neutrality in conjunction with a similar declaration issued by the governments of Sweden and Norway.

Both German and English warships were observed in Danish waters.

Two German torpedo boat destroyers steamed close to the fortress of Middelfund, a few miles from Copenhagen. The warships retired only after being commanded to do so by the commandant of the fortress, who threatened to resort to force if they did not leave.

A big German naval fleet was observed off the south of Holland.

BANKERS TO MEET TO CONSIDER WAY TO AVERT A SCARE

Financial Conditions of the United States Will Be Protected in Case of European War.

PRICES ALREADY AFFECTED

Secretary McAdoo Issues Call for Monday—Embargo on Exportation of Foodstuffs May Be Declared—Congress Ready to Remain in Session for Indefinite Time.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Secretary McAdoo has called a conference of bankers of the New York, Chicago and St. Louis clearing house associations here for Monday to discuss ways of protecting the financial interests of the nation in the event of a general European war. Bankers in other reserve cities will be invited later to attend a second conference.

The department of agriculture predicted war prices for food will prevail in the United States in case of a general clash. An embargo on the exportation of foodstuffs is suggested as possible but it was said such action will be taken only as a last resort. The foreign demand already is causing food prices to soar.

That congress will remain in session indefinitely in the event of a general European conflict is predicted. Leaders advised the president that congress is ready to remain in session as long as necessary. The house considered the half a billion dollar emergency currency bill which was passed by the senate yesterday.

RELATIONS SEVERED.

Important Conference Held.
BERLIN, Aug. 1.—The foreign office this afternoon announced an important conference will be held between the German ambassador in Paris and the French foreign office. It is expected the result of the conference will be announced at seven p. m.

General Strike Planned.
ROME, Aug. 1.—Socialist headquarters announced a general strike has been definitely decided on unless Italy maintained strict neutrality relative to the war situation.

All Depends on England.
LONDON, Aug. 1.—The French ambassador to England gave the following statement to the United Press today: "Everything depends on England. If she informs Germany her navy is prepared to strike there will be no war. Otherwise the situation is hopeless."

Denmark Seeks Explanation.
COPENHAGEN, Aug. 1.—Denmark has asked Germany to explain the stopping of two Danish vessels off Langeland. Both vessels were searched.

UMATILLA SHEEP AMONG BEST IN WHOLE COUNTRY

Proof that Umatilla county can compete with all other sheep sections of the United States in the raising of mutton lambs is furnished in the form of a letter received today by Dan P. Smythe, local sheepman, from C. L. Buel of the commission firm of Evans, Snider & Buel of Chicago. The letter is relative to the shipment of lambs made by Mr. Smythe to the Chicago market a short time ago. "One of the best and fattest and heaviest bunches of lambs that have been received here this season," is the way Mr. Buel characterizes them after a personal inspection of the shipment. In view of the fact that the Chicago market receives about 25,000 lambs and sheep each day from every range of the United States, the statement is a most gratifying tribute to Umatilla county.

Smythe Bros. shipped 2000 Ayrshire winter lambs from their summer range in the Wenaha reserve a short time ago to Chicago. They were sold to R. N. Stanfield as they were being loaded at Gibbon and taken by him east. Though they were "hammered" two days before shipment and spent seven days in making the trip to the eastern market, the lambs were in better condition than those sent from ranges near Chicago. Mr. Buel writes that they averaged in weight 78 pounds which makes the shrinkage for the trip about eight pounds to the lamb.

**WOMAN SENTENCED; 2 MORE
CHARGES AGAINST HER**

With the city council back of the proceedings, Mrs. Jean White Orey, sometimes known as Mrs. J. C. White, who has been frequently before the police magistrate, today was summoned into court again, given a jail sentence on a previously suspended case and was booked on two more charges. And when the city gets through with her, it is probable that the state authorities will take a hand. The house which she has been running on Bluff street has become so obnoxious that the officers are determined to put an end to her lawless career.

Only two weeks ago Mrs. White Orey paid a \$100 fine for running a bawdy house. On April 18 she was booked on the same charge and on another of selling liquor illegally. She paid a \$100 fine on the latter charge and sentence was suspended on the former pending good behavior. It was this case that was reopened today. Judge Fitz Gerald sentencing her to 20 days in jail without the option of a fine. She has appealed to the circuit court and pending the appeal is out on bonds of \$300 furnished by Peters & Morrison.

The two new cases against her, that of conducting a bawdy house and of living in a bawdy house, will go over until Tuesday. Her alleged husband, James Orey, also faces a charge of vagrancy.

**\$4,000,000 GOLD IS
ORDERED FOR ENGLAND**

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—A total of \$4,000,000 was ordered for shipment to England, of which \$2,500,000 was taken from the clearing house vault. Renewal of the gold movement was followed by a rise in call money rates to 5 per cent.

Another sharp advance was reported in the rate on gold shipments asked by marine insurance companies.
