The first of the dangers that lie in wait for the cardinal is a shock or a fall, his friends say, the second a severe cold on the lungs.

VOLUNTEERS ARE EAGER FOR CALL TO FRONT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—Representatives of the Austro-Hungarian and the Serbian colonies in San Francisco prepared yesterday for what they are informed will be certain war between those countries.

Milut Yefich, as secretary of the Serbian national fund, of this city, received the following telegram from the Serbian consul general of New York City, Professor M. L. Pupa of Columbia University:

"It seems that a war is inevitable. Organize the committee for collecting funds. Act energetically."

The other officers of the Serbian national fund of this city are L. L. Dropp, president, and A. Goyun, treasurer.

Little doubt of the intense war spirit among Serbians in this city was possible yesterday to those who witnessed the crowds of loyal Serbs, who assembled at the J. I. Mitrovich building, at 1636 Golden Gate avenue, the headquarters of the Slavonic, Serbian, Croatian and Dalmatian organizations of San Francisco. Crowds of young men were gathered there, eager for the latest news from the fatherland, all anxious for a chance to return to take the field against their ancient enemy.

Proclamation by Consulate.

That there was even greater activity among the Austrians in this city was shown when the Austro-Hungarian consulate of San Francisco issued the following proclamation, based on urgent dispatches received from the mother country:

"In Austria-Hungary a partial mobilization has been ordered by His Majesty."

"Those subject to military duty, who have to report on this account, will be notified by special summons."

"Traveling expenses will be reimbursed to those called into service."

"Whoever is unable to defray the traveling expenses will have to report to the nearest Imperial and Royal Consulate and, upon presentation of his summons, will receive financial assistance."

"To the others the traveling expenses will be refunded afterwards, according to the prevailing schedule."

"Amnesty has been granted all those having failed to comply with their military duty, and to deserters, who, upon summons or of their own volition, immediately return to their native country."

Mobilization Only Partial.

This does not mean that orders have yet been received to send all available men from this country. Only partial mobilization has been ordered. Direct mobilization, according to Acting Consul Karl Ruiz de Raxas, will be necessary before fighting men are sent from this country to Austria-Hungary.

There are, according to rough estimates from 40,000 to 50,000 Austro-Hungarians in California, and from 5,000 to 7,500 in this city alone. The number of available soldiers in this population is unknown.

Although activity for war was noted in Austria and Serbian circles, the consulates of Russia, Germany, Italy, France and Prussia in this city yesterday all reported no excitement—merely "watchful waiting."

KEEP SECRET THEIR WEDDING FOR MONTH

Attorney McInturf of Marshfield and Mabel Wellborn Eloped to Portland July 1, From Salem.

SALEM, Ore., July 31.—Employees at the state capital were surprised to learn of the secret marriage in Portland, July 1, of Miss Mabel Wellborn, a popular stenographer of the state house, and J. W. McInturf, an attorney of Marshfield, one of the greatest track athletes Willamette university has ever had. As a runner McInturf distinguished himself in several meets in 1911-12 and 1912-13. He graduated with high honors from the law department in 1913 and recently located at Marshfield. Mrs. McInturf left last evening for Marshfield.

WEDDING JOINS WRENS AND NIGHTINGALES

OAKDALE, July 30.—Miss Eva Louise Wren on Sunday became the bride of John M. Nightingale, son of M. J. Nightingale, a banker and merchant of this city. Miss Wren is the daughter of Mayor George J. When of Modesto. The ceremony was performed at the Presbyterian church, the Rev. J. H. McCartney reading the service. Miss Wren is a graduate of the Mills Academy and the bridegroom of the University of California.

WATSON WOULD BAR CONCERN FROM STATE

Commissioner Asks Attorney General to Find Way to Put National Mercantile Co. Out of Business in Oregon.

SALEM, Ore., July 31.—Corporation Commissioner Watson has asked Attorney General Crawford for determination of the appropriate procedure to bar the National Mercantile company of Vancouver, B. C., from doing business in Oregon. He alleges its operations are unlawful. There is some question as to whether the injunction proceedings in the circuit courts of Multnomah county should be invoked or the question taken direct to the supreme court on quo warranto proceedings.

Watson states that in the state of Washington the company has been restrained from engaging in business by means of injunction proceedings and bench warrants, on charges of contempt.
