Home Hints and Recipe

Loose Handles.
To tighten the handles which have become loose on cupboard doors or bureau drawers warm some powdered

Health and Beauty.
Wash the face daily in very hot water. Use plenty of soap, lathering the face and neck with soap jelly and rinsing it off afterward with a bath hose. Let no soap remain upon the skin, but be sure that it is removed by using as many waters upon it as the face will tolerate. After the thorough washing, the skin must have a little cream or a little skin food massaged into it.

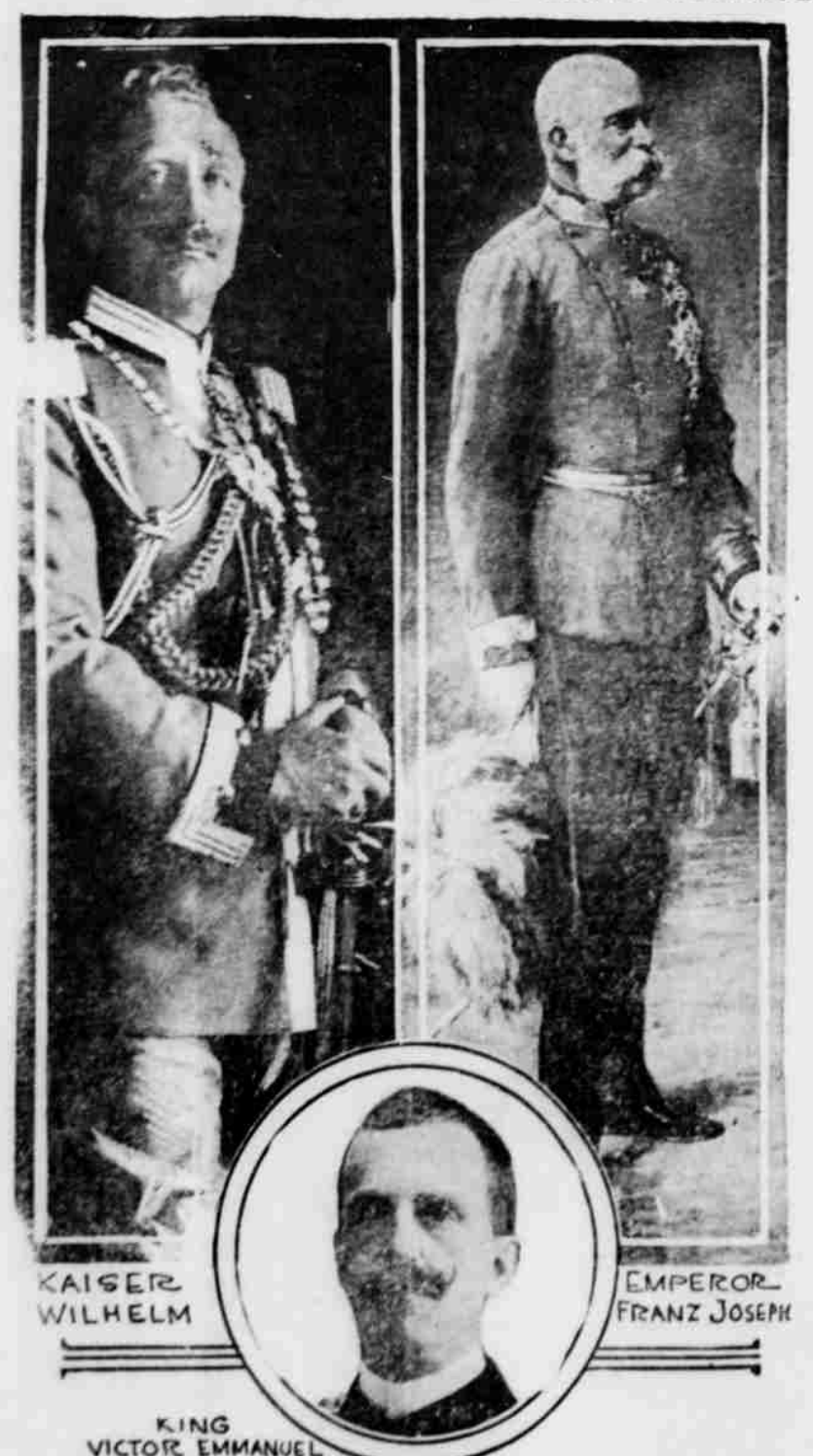

COUNTIES URGED TO FORWARD TAX MONEY

State Treasury Needs the Cash to Pay Warrants and Avoid Interest; \$150,000 Promised.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—Deputy Treasurer Ryan stated that he had the promise of \$150,000 from seven counties the first week in August and that amount should pay all warrants until the first of September.

The treasury department has been for some time urging counties to make tax payments as rapidly as possible so that it will not be necessary to defer payments on warrants, with the result that interest will be attached, and the counties have been responding liberally.

Deputy Ryan will at the next session of the legislature urge an amendment to the existing statutes relating to the payment of tax money into the state treasury. It is his belief that the taxes should be made in three payments, April 1, July 1 and October 1. This plan, he says, will help the state and work no hardship on the counties.

Pardon for Convict Hero

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Aug. 1.—As a reward for saving the life of a baby, Gov. Major has pardoned an old convict, William Schulte, sent from St. Louis for ten years on a charge of murder in the second degree. He has been in prison since early in 1910.

Schulte was a "trustee," working on the prison farm, and rescued the infant daughter of Eugene Johnson, a railroad switchman, from a burning house several months ago. The baby's mother was fatally injured in the fire and Schulte was severely burned in an effort to rescue her after he had saved the little one.

The husband and father has been untiring in his efforts to secure a pardon for Schulte ever since and presented a petition bearing several hundred names asking for his release.

France will come to the assistance of the czar.

"Then England will throw the weight of her army and navy in against Germany."

Great Fleet Put to Sea.
"The first division of the British war fleet has put to sea," he said, "It is perhaps the most powerful fleet that has ever cleared from any harbor. It is my opinion that it will cruise in the vicinity of the Kiel canal."

Captain Mackenn believes that another immense English fleet will be stationed at the entrance to the Baltic, and may enter that sea to meet a German fleet coming out. Still another mighty squadron will guard the north passage between Norway and Scotland, he says, while part of England's Mediterranean fleet will join with the French navy in guarding the entrance to the English Channel.

"Thus Germany will be bottled up," he declared.

A great battle will ensue, Captain Mackenn believes. "And it will not be the English navy," he added.

England's sea fighting force is the greatest the world has ever seen, Captain Mackenn believes.

With regard to the operations on land, Captain Mackenn is equally certain that Germany will fare badly.

Kitchener to Head Army.
"It is my opinion that Kitchener will lead in France with between 400,000 and 500,000 men, the flower of the English army," he said.

"The hero of the upper Nile will then take command of the combined French and English forces and march toward the Rhine."

"To add to the troubles of the Kaiser," he said, "there is no question in my mind, but that Denmark, remembering the lost province of Schleswig-Holstein, will throw her army in against Germany."

Captain Mackenn believes that the termination of the war will see Russia in possession of Constantinople, the French boundary moved to embrace Alsace-Lorraine once more, and, perhaps, Schleswig-Holstein restored to Denmark.
