Home Hints and Recipe

Refrigerator Dishes.
Covered glass dishes made especially for the refrigerator and sold at reasonable prices have a two-fold value for the housewife. In the first place, she can see at a glance what they contain; in the second, all danger that one article of food will absorb some of the properties of another is removed. Butter becomes tainted merely from standing in close proximity to meat or vegetables. If it is not actually spoiled it loses its purity and sweetness.

Delicate desserts lose their flavor simply from standing overnight in the refrigerator uncovered. These glass dishes come in different shapes and sizes. An oblong glass butter dish, similar in style to the old fashioned ones once used on the table, costs only 25 cents. There are flat round dishes with high covers especially suitable for meat and deep dishes with flat covers in which to place vegetables or stewed fruits or whatever one has on hand.

Silk Shirts.
To launder silk shirts which have the tucked bosom that cannot be ironed proceed as follows: After washing the shirt, wring and fold in a Turkish towel, roll up solid and let it lie a while. Then from the shirt except the bosom, which you place over a bosom board and pin firmly to it and place where it will dry, and it will look as good as new.

Dictates of Fashion.

"White Wolf" at Large.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—White Wolf, the Chinese bandit leader, once reported dead, is active again and troops sent against him have been forced to retire, according to official reports to the state department made in connection with the appeal for the arrest of the revolutionist general, Huang Hsing now in San Francisco.

Between 10,000 and 20,000 government troops were repulsed by the rebels. Consular reports from Hunan and Honan, where White Wolf has been operating, state that the revolutionists have reorganized with money sent from Kiangsu, where the outbreak of 1912 occurred. Revolutionist propaganda in San Francisco is said to be inspired from the same source.

Baby Chair for Senator.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The "property man" of the senate should supply it with a high chair, Senator Weeks of Massachusetts says.

The senator came to this conclusion after two days' effort to get off a comparatively brief speech. Weighing about 275 pounds, Senator Weeks would rest himself every time he was interrupted, which was about once every fifteen minutes, by sitting on the arm of his chair. He did not dare sit down, because that might lose him the floor and with it the right to finish his speech. So he thinks a high chair, for a 275-pound baby, would be about right.

Woman Leads Political Convention.
DENVER, Aug. 5.—A new chairman of the democratic state central committee probably will be elected to the called meeting of that body which opened sessions at a local hotel today. Mrs. Gertrude Lee, the first woman state chairman of a big political party in the history of the United States, succeeded temporarily to that position from the vice chairman ship last spring when Chairman George T. Bradley resigned. With a new campaign coming on a new chairman must be elected. Many predict that Mrs. Lee will be chosen to succeed herself.

WHY MARCONI GOT THE VICTORIAN GRAND CROSS

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Inventor Marconi got the Grand Cross of the Victorian Order instead of the Order of the Bath or the Order of Merit (the distinctions usually conferred on scientists) in consequence of the political situation.

The order bestowed on Marconi is the only one in King George's own gift. Either of the others could have been conferred only with the advice of the ministers, and the king chose not to consult them in view of the present state of party rivalry.

This act illustrates the bitter animus of the Unionists toward Lloyd-George. There was reason to fear that if the ministers had been consulted the Unionists would have taken occasion to revive the exploded Marconi scandal and make the situation uncomfortable for all concerned.

Marconi is the third Italian to receive the Victorian Grand Cross. The others were the Duke of the Abruzzi and Marquis San Giuliano, formerly the Italian ambassador here.

T. R. to Plead Justification.
OYSTER BAY, Aug. 5.—Col. Roosevelt will meet every allegation in the libel complaint of William Barnes with a plea of full justification. In such a defense the colonel in answer will have to state clearly each fact that he proposes to prove. There is little doubt that the evidence gathered during the Albany county inquiry of 1912 will be utilized to the fullest possible extent.

This telegram from Gov. Johnson of California, who was the candidate for vice president on the progressive ticket two years ago, was made public today:

"De Young's (San Francisco) Chronicle and Otis' Los Angeles Times carry story this morning of disagreement between you and me. I am denouncing story as a base fabrication. I wire you simply that you may be kept advised of how my opponents in this state, chief of whom are De Young and Otis, are resorting to everything foul and disreputable, and this morning's story is in accord with their policy."

8000-ACRE GAME PRESERVE IS OFFERED TO NEW JERSEY

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Ernest Napier of East Orange, president of the state board of fish and game commissioners, announced that Charles C. Worthington, pump manufacturer and owner of the largest private game preserve in New Jersey, has tendered the use of 8000 acres of mountains, bordering on the Delaware river, to the state.

If it is possible for the state to accept the land, Mr. Worthington will dedicate it outright for perpetual refuge for all wild animals and birds. The preserve consists of heavily wooded mountains.

Along the river road large herds of roan antelope are seen. Through the preserve is an ancient county road known in history as the "Nine Road," built by the Dutch in the seventeenth century for conveying copper from the Buckwood mountain to Esopus on the Hudson.

Woman Leader Opens Campaign.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Mrs. Carrie Catt, chairman of the Empire state campaign committee of equal suffragists, recently returned from abroad, today opened the New York women's campaign to enforce recognition at the republican and democratic conventions at Saratoga. One of the plans being worked out is to find one woman for every man who attends these conventions. These women will interview each delegate and learn exactly how he stands on the question of equal suffrage. The women will actively campaign in the interest of all those who are favorable to the cause.

Frisco Drydock Begun.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—Work on San Francisco's new \$2,000,000 naval drydock at Hunter Point will start before the end of this month, according to President J. A. McGregor of the Union Iron Works. The intention is to have it completed and ready for use before January 1, 1917. By the terms of the company's arrangement with the government, the dock will be capable of handling the largest dreadnoughts which can pass through the Panama canal. In turn, the last naval appropriation bill guaranteed rentals for it amounting to at least \$50,000 annually for six years.

MINIMUM WAGE FOR GIRLS EFFECTIVE IN WASHINGTON

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 5.—The minimum wage of girls over eighteen and of women employed in industrial occupations in the state of Washington, after today will be \$3.90 a week. A ruling of the industrial welfare commission to that effect having gone into operation today. The commission also ordered that \$6 a week shall be the minimum wage for minors of both sexes employed in factories.

Quarantine on Maine Spuds.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—New regulations of the department of agriculture regulating the shipment of potatoes from Maine, which the presence of "powdery scab" in potatoes of that state necessitated, went into effect. The quarantine regulations are especially strict regarding seed stock to prevent the spread of the potato scab disease in other states.

BELGIUM VOTES FUND TO DEFEND ITS HONOR

BRUSSELS, Aug. 5.—King Albert of the Belgians presided over a joint session of the Belgian senate and chamber of deputies today in an address his majesty delivered never since 1830 had a graver situation confronted a neutral nation. He said it was imperative that every Belgian should do his duty and resign himself to whatever fate may be necessary in order to prevent the violation of Belgian soil. Immediately after the chamber passed a bill appropriating \$40,000,000 for defense. The king said:

"Our fatherland is in danger. Let me make an appeal to you, my brothers. At the supreme hour, the entire nation must be of one mind. I have called together the two houses of parliament, so that they may support the government in declaring that we will maintain unshaken the sacred patriotism of our fathers. Long live independent Belgium!"

A scene of stirring enthusiasm followed. Deputies and senators stood and shouted in chorus and the closing words of King Albert's speech.

Premier de Broqueville then made a statement as to Germany's ultimatum in Belgium and the reply of Belgium, declaring that the government would not sacrifice the country's honor and that the nation would resist by every means in its power all encroachments on its rights.

German troops crossed the frontier at Gemmenich, near the junction of the Dutch, Belgian and German frontiers.

A special train carrying all the securities of the National Bank of Belgium left here for Antwerp during the night.

Germany declared war on Belgium yesterday.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Aug. 1.—The seventh annual tournament of the Union Printers' National Baseball League was opened here today with teams participating from nearly every large city in the country. The final game will be played August 7. Other athletic events were on today's program.
