Home Hints and Recipe

Home Helps.

When filling cracks in the wall with plaster of paris, the plaster will not set so quickly if one part flour is added to three parts of the dry plaster. Thoroughly mix before wetting.

To save time and work, we should follow the example of the Japanese and eliminate all useless things in the house. A profusion of things in the room detracts from the feeling of space and makes endless care and dusting necessary.

At this time of year it is a good idea to look over the old blankets and cut out the best parts of those that are the most worn. These pieces wash and sew together to make the desired thickness. Then cover with alkali or satin and they make warm covers.

When cleaning the store room, it is a convenience to have a lead pencil tied to a string which is tied around the waist; then when you have put something away in a box you have the pencil at hand with which to mark the name of the article on the outside of the box, thereby saving time when you come to hunt for it.—Dallas News.

Baked in a Box.

If you would like your picnic cake to arrive unbroken, try baking it in one of the five and one-half inch by eight and one-half inch tin water boxes. If the box is filled half full of cake dough it will rise nearly even with the top, leaving just enough room for icing. The cover can then be put on and the cake will arrive in perfect condition. A good recipe for the above sized box is the following: One cupful of sour cream, one cupful of sugar, one half cupful of crushed walnut meats, a level teaspoonful each of soda, baking powder and salt, one well beaten egg and enough flour for a stiff batter. Spice to taste. The cake should be baked in a slow oven until it doubles in size, then the heat should be turned on to finish.

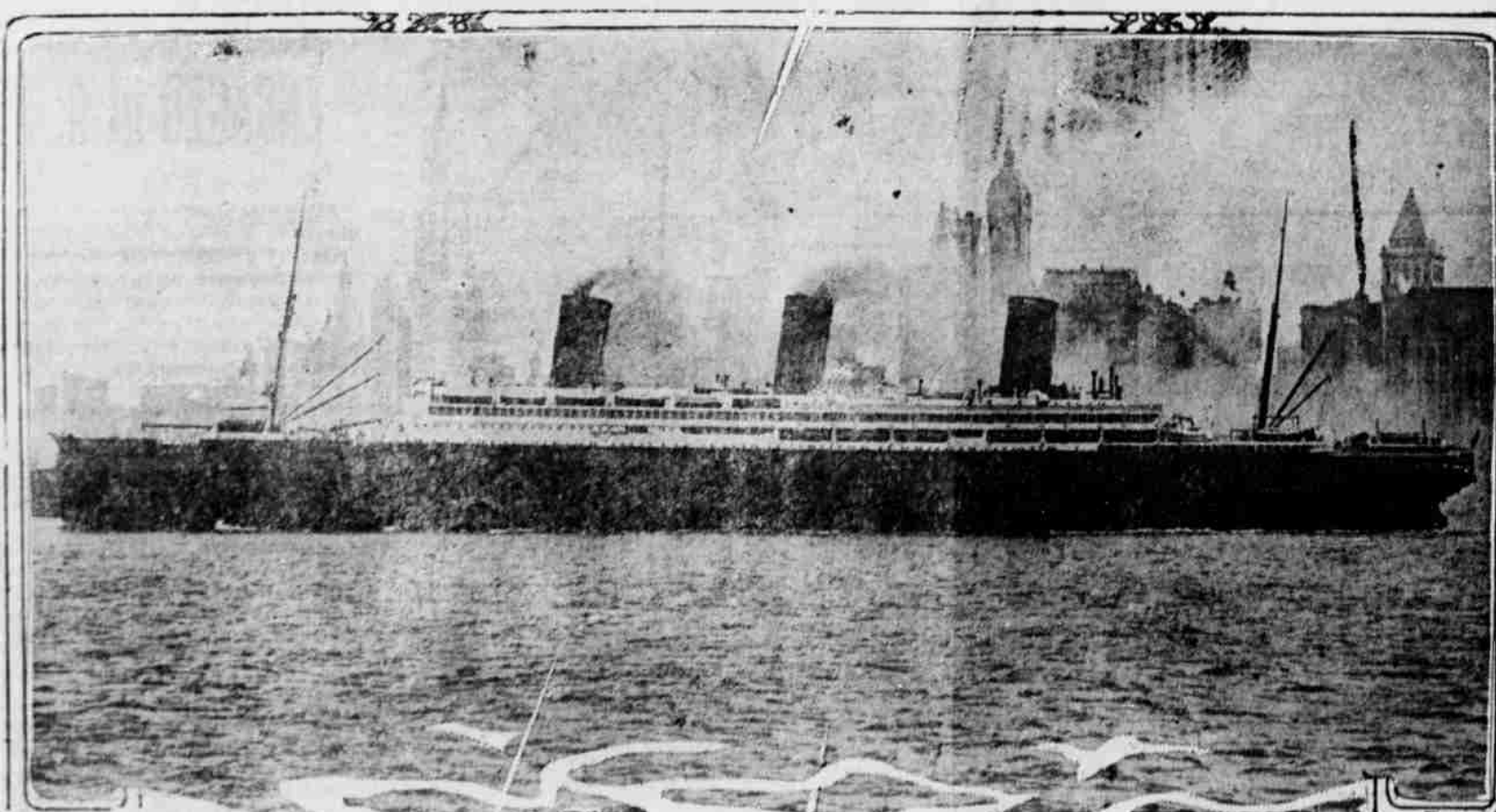
War Calls Airboat Pilot.

MARQUIS MUST PAY FOR HOTEL LARK

LONDON, Aug. 6.—In order to the Marquis of Queensberry to pay the management of the Benfleet hotel \$750 for damage to furniture, etc., handed down by the Middlesex sheriff's court, has disclosed a lively lark in which the Marquis figured that has set all London talking. Clad in nothing other than a vivid waistcoat, the evidence shows, the Marquis rushed down stairs at 4 in the morning "kicked furniture apart, burst open doors of private rooms, broke windows and acted like a mad man." Finally, having acquired no more clothing than when he started, the Marquis rushed out of doors and down the street. He was captured by porters and taken to the work house hospital. One witness said the Marquis was afflicted with delirium tremens at the time of the rumpus.

OAKLAND CITIZENS ARE OPPOSED TO ANNEXATION

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 4.—Thirty-two thousand signatures to the petition which has been circulated here for the proposed amendment to the State constitution with reference to city and county annexation within county lines were secured in time to insure the measure being placed on the ballot for the coming election, although only a few days were given to getting the signers. The measure is designed to offset the attempt of San Francisco to force Oakland into consolidation with that city. That Oakland citizens are practically a unit in opposition to any annexation move that would make this city a part of San Francisco, was shown by the quick response to the announcement that the anti-annexation petition was ready for signatures. No trouble whatever was encountered in getting the necessary number.

Stockton and San Diego had similar petitions, and both were signed by thousands.

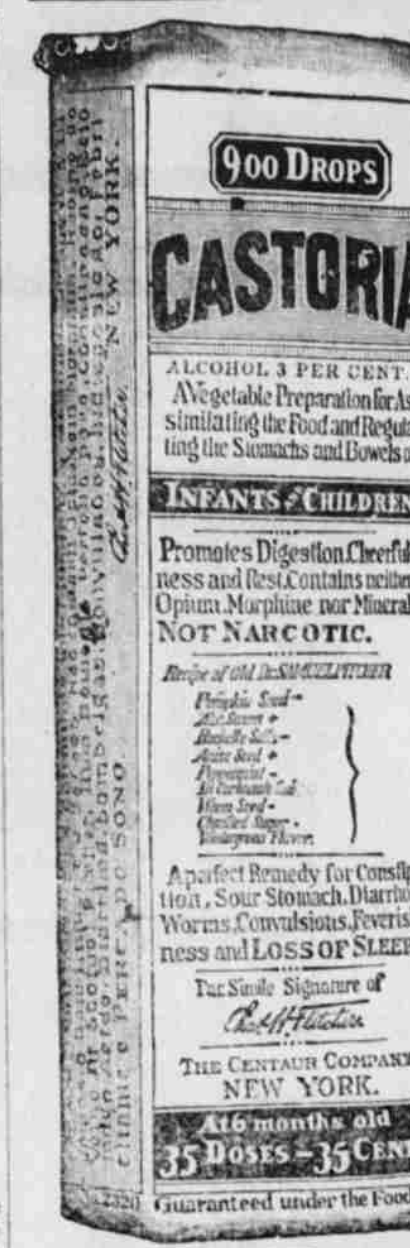

CZAR CALLS FOR DIVINE GUIDANCE IN EUROPEAN WAR

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 6.—Emperor Nicholas issued a manifesto in which his majesty outlines the events leading up to the declaration of war by Germany and then says that "Russians will rise like one man and will repulse the insolent attack of the enemy."

The text follows:

"By the grace of God, we, Nicholas II, emperor and autocrat of all the Russias, King of Poland and Grand Duke of Finland, etc., to all our faithful subjects make known that Russia, related by faith and blood to the Slav peoples and faithful to her historical traditions, has never regarded her foes with indifference.

"But the fraternal sentiments of the Russian people for the Slavs have been awakened by the perfect unanimity and extraordinary force in these last few days when Austria-Hungary knowingly addressed to Serbia claims for an independent state.

"Having paid no attention to the pacific and conciliatory reply of the Serbian government and having rejected the benevolent intention of Russia, Austria-Hungary made haste to proceed to an armed attack and began to bombard Belgrade, an open place.

"Forced by the situation thus created to take necessary measures of precaution, we ordered the army and the navy put on a war footing, at the same time using every endeavor to obtain a peaceful solution. Four parliaments were begun amid friendly relations with Germany and her ally, Austria, for the blood and the property of our subjects were dear to us.

"Contrary to our hopes in our good neighborly relations of long date and disregarding our assurances that the mobilization measures taken were in pursuance of no object hostile to her Germany demanded their immediate cessation. Being rebuffed in this demand, Germany suddenly declared war on Russia.

"With a profound faith in the justice of our work and with a humble hope in omnipotent providence in prayer, we call God's blessing on Holy Russia and her valiant troops.

(Signed) "NICHOLAS."

OREGON GUARDSMEN ARE WATCHING WAR

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—Officers of the Oregon National Guard in Portland are following the progress of the European conflict at the O. N. G. headquarters, in the Morgan building, on a large war map, on which different colored pins and buttons represent the troops and fleets of the countries at war.

The position of the pins are changed as fast as telegraphic advices indicate movements on part of troops and ships, while engagements are recorded with slips of paper.

A roomful of interested officers testified to the fascination of the game this morning.

WHITE SLAVERY A MYTH.

BERLIN OFFICIAL SAYS

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—There is no such thing as white slavery, in the sense in which the term is usually employed, according to Dr. Kopp of the Berlin police department, who appeared as an expert witness in the prosecution of Samuel Lubelski, charged with decoying girls over the Russian border and sending them to resorts in South American and other cities. Dr. Kopp says:

"There is a widely held impression by the public that innocent girls, by force or trickery, are placed in houses of ill repute and held there against their will. As a matter of fact, a case of that nature has never occurred. Even the various associations organized to prevent white slavery have up to this time been able to point to a single case of this kind."

Dr. Kopp declares that the testimony against Lubelski must be weighed in the light of the general public's erroneous conceptions which had unquestionably influenced the witnesses against the defendant. There were, indeed, agents who secured commissions by placing women of ill-repute in resorts, but this was the sole foundation for the delusions concerning the existence of a white slave trade.

Nearly a year ago another prominent criminal authority of Germany declared that not one case of forcible detention of an unwilling girl in a brothel had ever been established in Germany. There was a chorus of protests at the statement, led by the organizations engaged in fighting the alleged evil. The expert answered by inviting them to submit proof of a case of the kind. They have not yet done so.

CLUBMAN SAVES GIRL AND MAN IN RIVER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—Walter Schulken, member of the Olympic club and amateur boxer, proved his skill as a swimmer recently when he rescued from drowning Miss Edna Belmont, a pretty girl from Fort Three.

Miss Belmont was taking a plunge in the Novato river when she went beyond her depth and sank. Schulken dove from a 50-foot trestle to rescue the girl and George Sweeney, who became exhausted trying to save her.
