Kansas Primaries On.
TOPEKA, Kans., Aug. 6.—More than 150,000 women of Kansas were expected to cast their ballots at the state wide primaries. Although there are more than 200,000 women of Kansas who now have full citizenship, less than three fourths of that number registered up to July 20 when registration books closed.

POLISH CITIES ARE CAPTURED

BERLIN, Aug. 6.—German troops invaded Russian Poland and captured the three cities of Chensstova, Bendzin and Kalisz, all important manufacturing centers.

The first troop to cross the frontier was the first battalion of the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Infantry, with a machine gun company. The infantry was quickly followed by the First Regiment of German Uhlans, known as the Emperor Alexander III of Russia's Uhlans.

Slight Opposition Met.
The German troops met with but slight opposition, as the territory had not yet been occupied by Russian troops.

Chensstova is a city of some 50,000 inhabitants situated on the River Waethe near the Silesian frontier. It is noted chiefly for its manufactures of woolen and cotton cloths and paper. A picture of the Virgin in a noted convent there attracts thousands of pilgrims annually.

Bendzin is a coal and zinc mining center. It has a population of slightly over 20,000 about half of whom are Jews.

Kalisz is the capital of the province of the same name. It is the most westerly city in Russian Poland. Its population of 20,000 is engaged in various manufactures.

NEW LINE STEAMSHIPS TO RUN TO NEW YORK

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 4.—The International Mercantile Marine company, one of the largest of the world's steamship concerns, has notified the Oakland authorities that early in 1915 a new line of steamships, to be called the Panama-Pacific line, will be established between New York and the Pacific coast, Oakland to be its western terminal.

Four steamships will be put on at first, with an increase in the number as soon as the passenger and freight business warrants it. Each vessel will be of 22,000 tons displacement, being 500 feet in length and with a 60 foot beam.

The steamships will be first class passenger and freight boats, capable of carrying many hundreds of passengers. Special provisions will be made for carrying automobiles as excess baggage.

Six Jail Prisoners Escape.

WATERLOO, Iowa, Aug. 5.—Six prisoners effected delivery from the county jail here by sawing through steel bars. Police officers and deputy sheriffs have organized posses and are scouring the county.

FRENCH AIR FLEET REPELS ZEPPELINS

PARIS, Aug. 6.—The first attempted aerial attack on Paris was frustrated on Monday when four German military aeroplanes crossed the frontier flying in the direction of the capital and were driven back by the Rheims air squadron.

A Rheims telegram says that wireless messages received fully confirm reports of the aerial sortie.

Air scouts discovered the oncoming planes shortly after daybreak. The warning was flashed by wireless to the remainder of the corps in the tented hangars in Rheims. Immediately the remainder of the French corps took the air, their machines laden with contact bombs and explosive shell, high power rifles.

German Aeroplanes Flee.
With the first flutter of the French flock of flying machines the German invaders swung around and returned across the border with the Frenchmen in full pursuit. The French aviators sought altitude to give them advantage in the impending battle in the air. This maneuver gave the Germans an advantage in their straight away flight and they escaped.

Meanwhile, at Eiffel tower the military wireless operator had caught the warning out of the air and quick firing guns were immediately made ready to repel aerial invaders.

A danger which the French government has taken every measure to ward off, if possible, is a raid by Zeppelin airships.

Leaving their stations on the frontier at nightfall, the Zeppelin levitators of the air could be over Paris within a few hours, drop bombs on the capital and return to Germany.

Searchlights Range Sky.

Every night between Paris and the frontier the sky is a literal network of high power lights from which no invader can escape undetected. The great beams from the searchlights are coming the sky from a dozen different stations between here and Rheims.

Immediately a Zeppelin is sighted military airmen will be sent up to drop special projectiles on them. If this has no effect, the airmen's orders are to ram the airship. Such a heroic exploit means certain death to the airmen, but each of the corps accepts the order with a smile.

Aeroplanes stationed in the Buc aerodrome near Paris have been specially constructed for this work. The pilots include Pegoud and Vedrines, widely known for their daring.

Sectional Tennis Matches On.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—Under the auspices of the National Lawn Tennis association, the sectional national doubles championships started here on the courts of the Ontwenia club.

WHY GERMANY SEEKS TO CROSS BELGIUM

The vital importance of Belgium in a war between France and Germany lies in the fact that unless Germany may move across Belgian territory, neutralized by treaty, an invasion of France would have to be through the heavily fortified French frontier proper. The entire northeastern frontier of France is roughly 440 miles in length. For a distance of about 250 miles this frontier line separates France from Belgium and Luxembourg. The remainder, about 190 miles, separates France from German territory.

With the neutrality of Belgium observed the scene of action would be reduced to the splendidly fortified Franco-German frontier proper. This line of defense runs, broadly speaking, from Verdun to Nancy, to Epinal to Belfort and to Besancon. Each one of these cities is the center of a group of fortifications extending northwest and southeast, and all facing the German border. Each has its outposts and flanking protection and the line is said to be virtually continuous for the greater part of the entire distance between Luxembourg and the Swiss border.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 6.—Since the trading of Greg to the Red Sox it has been persistently rumored that Lajoie the veteran second sacker, will be the next to go. Manager Chance of the Yankees is known to have been making strenuous efforts to secure Larry for his team and since that player has outlived his usefulness as a Nap, as his 225 batting average would indicate, it is probable that he will soon be let out by the Cleveland management. RAPIDITY OF EVENTS IN EUROPEAN CAMPS, COURTS

How a spark struck in little Serbia swept in one short week through the combustible firewood of all Europe is shown by the following calendar of the week just past:

Saturday, July 25.—The Austria-Hungarian minister presented a note to the foreign office at Belgrade stating that Serbia's reply to Austria's ultimatum was unsatisfactory, and, with his staff, quitted the capital. The Serbian king and his staff left Belgrade.

Sunday.—The Russian ministry officially announced: "Russia cannot remain indifferent in the crisis between Serbia and Austria-Hungary." An order for a partial mobilization of the Russian army was proclaimed.

Monday.—Premier Asquith of England and Sir Edward Grey, minister of foreign affairs, vainly attempted to persuade the nations to adopt mediation. Only France and Italy consented.

Tuesday.—Belgrade was attacked by Austrian troops. The British fleet sailed from Portsmouth under sealed orders. France's active army was reported to be concentrating upon the frontier.

Thursday.—Germany sent an ultimatum to Russia demanding within 24 hours an explanation of her intentions with regard to the mobilization of her troops. Russia's reply was that "the mobilization is only partial and cannot be stopped."

Friday.—Germany, by imperial decree, was declared "in a state of war," and martial law was proclaimed in the empire. Stock exchanges throughout the world including those of London and New York, were closed indefinitely. German merchant ships in transatlantic service were ordered to remain in port until further orders.

Saturday.—Germany declares war on Russia and the German ambassador quit St. Petersburg. A general mobilization of the French army was ordered.

Three-cent Fares an Issue.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Aug. 6.—A special election is in progress here to decide on the proposed \$8,000,000 bond issue for the purchase of the street railway system and its allied utilities—the power, gas and heating plants. Labor organizations are behind the project and the voting today followed a spirited campaign of preliminary appeals to the people. The street car company several months ago refused to lower its fares to three cents even though the city council so ordered. The council consequently held up the franchise grants and the controversy remains in litigation. The election today will either close or reopen the three-cent fare issue.
