OHIO IS IN MIDST OF A GREAT CAMPAIGN

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 7.—Ohio is in the midst of the greatest political campaign in its history. The first state-wide primaries to be held August 11 furnish a starter. Then woman suffrage, anti-saloon and liquor forces will file their separate petitions to place constitutional amendments before the voters at the November elections. The regular state, senatorial and congressional campaigns will come as a matter of course.

Woman suffrage workers, defeated two years ago when voters refused to write a "vote for woman" clause in the state constitution, are back this year with an initiative petition to place a constitutional amendment providing equal suffrage on the ballot in November. This state will be one of the seven to vote on woman suffrage this fall. The national organization is concentrating its strength here because Ohio is the largest state and is the most eastern. Suffragists believe if Ohio adopts equal suffrage, New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and New Jersey will follow its lead when they vote on the question next year. Anti-saloon forces planned to place a constitutional amendment providing state-wide prohibition before the voters next year. Their plans were changed when liberal forces initiated an amendment which would repeal the present county option law and prevent a vote being taken on state-wide prohibition. The "dry" immediately circulated petitions to place a state-wide prohibition amendment before the voters at the same time—at the November election. Attorney General Hogan has ruled in case both amendments should carry, the one receiving the largest number of affirmative votes would be written into the constitution.

The primaries have attracted the attention of politicians throughout the country because of the entrance of former United States Senator Joseph B. Foraker, of Cincinnati into the republican senatorial race. He seeks to "come back" and is making his fight as a "stand patter." Showing much of his old time vigor that won for him the name of "Fire Alarm Joe." Foraker is campaigning the state giving his explanation of the now famous "Standard Oil Letters."

His opponents are Warren G. Harding, of Marion, former lieutenant gov-

ernor, and former Congressman Ralph D. Cole, of Findlay. Harding always has been known as a staunch supporter and friend of Foraker. He jumped into the fight after a conference with the former senator. What was discussed at that meeting has not been told. Cole is making his campaign as a protectionist. In the democratic senatorial race, Attorney General Timothy S. Hoag, is opposed by former Congressman John J. Lentz, of Columbus, who is advocating government ownership of telegraph lines and John L. Zimmerman, of Springfield, who is making a quiet campaign. A. L. Garford, Elyria manufacturer, is the progressive candidate. He has no opposition at the primaries.

SPARKS FROM THE TELEGRAPH

The first four days of the maneuver camp of the Michigan National guard, which got under way at Grayling, are to be devoted to company field firing problems under the direction of Maj. M. J. Formal invitations for the fifth international conference of the American republics at Santiago, Chile, have been issued for Nov. 23, by the Chilean government. Secretary Bryan plans to attend. A bronze statue of Baron Steuben, the drill master of the revolution, was unveiled at Utica, N. Y. It stands at the entrance of the new parkway and is an imposing monument. The ceremonies were under the auspices of the German alliance.

Fire caused a loss of \$200,000 to the state fair grounds plant at Milwaukee the grand stand at the race track and a dozen near by buildings being destroyed. The first test of an ocean-going steamship in the Panama canal will be made in the water way by the steamer Christobal. The steamer will start with a full cargo and a large number of passengers from Colon. Joe Pent, a coal miner, of Farmerville, Ill., shot and killed three men and then escaped. A posse is in pursuit. The dead are: B. Frank Walker, miner, 60 years old; James Walker, 22 years old, son of B. Frank Walker, and James O'Neill, 54 years

old, coal miner. The shooting was the result of a feud, said to have sprung from a "blind pig" kept by Pent.

Home Hints and Recipe

BEAD CHAINS

Interesting new chains of beads are shown, made to wear with silk waists. The beads are on a string about thirty inches long, and where the two ends are fastened together a long silk tassel is attached. When the chain is put about the neck the tassel hangs in the front, forming a deep V line on the beads.

Any woman could make such a chain to wear with any of her waists or frocks. For use with a plain taffeta waist of blue, green and brown there is a chain made up of blue and green beads, of dark shades, about as big as a pea and of flat, amber colored beads, each three-quarters of an inch long.

Three blue beads are strung, then three green, then a yellow, then a green, then a yellow and then three blue again, and so on until the right length is made up. A yellow silk tassel about four inches long is used.

Various color schemes can be worked out to go with various waists or frocks.

Shakers to Sell Out. HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 6.—Elder Walter Shepard, a trustee of the Shaker colony in the eastern part of the town of Enfield, confirmed the report that the Shaker property—hundreds of acres of valuable tobacco land—would probably be sold within a few days to a syndicate of Hartford and New York capitalists.

Shepard, last of the elders of the northern settlement of Shakers, said his remaining followers would go to the Shaker colony at Lebanon, N. Y., as the sect is fast dwindling in numbers because of strict marriage laws. The property is valued at about \$250,000. Proceeds of the sale will be devoted towards rehabilitating the Lebanon settlement.

Shackleton's Ship Sails. LONDON, Aug. 6.—The antarctic ship Endurance, which is to carry the expedition headed by Sir Ernest Shackleton to Weddell sea, from which point the explorers will attempt to cross the south polar continent, left the Thames river. The vessel will visit several English ports before proceeding southward.

Montreal May Sice Vessels. MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—No steamships will be allowed to leave Montreal without special clearance papers and any ship sailing without these papers will be liable to seizure or destruction. Such is the notification given to masters and owners of vessels by R. S. White, collector of customs, who issued the new shipping order today.

To Cool Boat on High Seas. NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Aug. 5.—Although clearing for Fray Bentos, Uruguay, under orders, according to trustworthy information, the Norwegian steamer Thor, Captain Huun, which departed suddenly with about 1000 tons of coal and stores, will meet a German cruiser, said to be the Dresden, off the Atlantic coast between the Virginia capes and New York and transfer her supplies to that vessel.

Detail Welland Canal Guard. TORONTO, Aug. 7.—Orders were received from Ottawa to detail sufficient troops to guard the Welland canal and locks.
