Japanese Navy Is Active

TOKIO, Aug. 10.—Considerable activity among the vessels of the Japanese navy followed the announcement of the declaration of war between Germany and Great Britain. The lightships along the Siberian coast have been extinguished.

Argentina Conserves Cash

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 10.—The Argentine government has submitted a bill to parliament providing for a 30 days' moratorium on 80 per cent of expired credits and those about to expire, and suspending during the same periods withdrawals of gold. The bill authorizes the government to prolong this period if it deems such action necessary. It authorizes the Banco de la Nacion Argentina, with a view of helping the situation to utilize as a conversion fund \$20,000,000 now deposited in that bank.

Home Hints and Recipe

Hang Up Brush.
Fasten a piece of tape or string to the end of your scrubbing brush, so that when finished with it it can be hung up and allowed to drain. Instead of the water soaking into the back and loosening the bristles and making them soft. For the same reason do not leave the brush in the pail of water when the floor is being washed.

To Mend Sprinkler.
When the sprinkler bursts a seam, dip the offending part in hot paraffin. This has often been sufficient to repair the break so that it says good indefinitely.

Health and Beauty.
Don't forget that microbes are apt to lurk about the mouth of the milk bottle. It should be carefully wiped before the milk is poured out.
When the eyes are tired and dulled, as after motoring, use either an eye lotion bath or one made of water to which a little boracic powder or witch hazel has been added. Keep the eyes open in the water. This both strengthens and brightens them.

The following is a recipe for a simple home made ointment, which is excellent for applying to cuts and bruises: One teaspoonful each of olive oil, turpentine, spirits of camphor and coal oil. Of course, any amount desired may be made, but the proportion must be as given here.

Wires to China Silent.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—China is cut off telegraphically from Europe except Russia, beyond which country no messages can be forwarded, according to information received at the legation. Communication still remains, however, by the Pacific cables between China and the Pacific slope. It is supposed that the British government has taken possession of the extensive system of cables which con-

nect the far west with Europe by way of the Chinese waters, the Indian Ocean, the Red Sea and the Mediterranean, and that they are closed to commercial usage.

BOSTON, Aug. 10.—Mayor Curley, his family and friends dined sumptuously off a twenty-six pound salmon, sent by an unknown friend in Quebec. It was a very fine fish.

After the meal, the mayor looked again at the parcel in which the fish arrived in the hope of finding some clue to the name of the mysterious sender. He learned that it was addressed, not to the mayor, but to "Major" Higginson, head of the firm of Lee, Higginson & Co.

The mayor sent his regrets to the "Major" but the fish was already eaten.

Sailboat Crosses Ocean.

BLUE POINT, L. I., Aug. 10.—Captain James Cassels, of Glasgow, Scotland, and John C. Maloney, of Ennis, County, Clare, Ireland, who are at the Warner Hotel, declare that they crossed the Atlantic ocean in a 32-foot auxiliary sailboat in 7 days.

According to their story, they left Glasgow on March 14, and Queenstown on March 20, arriving at Halifax, N. S., on June 25, after 95 days at sea.

GETS \$35 FOR TEETH KNOCKED OUT BY AUTO

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—The State Industrial Accident Commission ruled in the case of Louis Day, an employee of the Lincoln Sightseeing Company of this city, who lost two teeth through being hit by the unruly crank of a big "rubber-neck" wagon, that he was entitled to compensation for the damage, as he was working at the time. He was allowed \$35 for the two false teeth he had to purchase.

NETHERLANDS TO CASH CHECKS FOR YANKES

THE HAGUE, Aug. 10.—(via London.)—Henry Van Dyke, United States minister to The Netherlands, made arrangements with The Netherlands government for the cashing of American checks and drafts, endorsed by him under the authorization of the United States state department. The minister was instructed to endorse drafts necessary to supply the absolute necessities of traveling Americans.

FIRST EFFECT OF WAR CLOUD, RUN ON BERLIN SAVINGS BANK



This was the first effect Berlin felt of the war cloud which hung over Europe just before the Kaiser broke with Austria. It is a picture taken at the time Austria's assault on Ser-

bia indicated the whole of Europe would be involved in a war. It was taken in front of the city savings bank, one of the larger institutions of Berlin, and is the first war photograph to reach the United States.

Runs on other banks have followed, not only in Germany but over Europe, till many of the bankers are in a dangerous condition.
