Home Hints and Recipes

Dictates of Fashion.

Black moire coats continue to be great favorites.

Hats are still being made altogether of taffeta.

Wide brimmed hats make a softening shade for faces which have lost their first freshness.

The white hat has supplanted the black straw one. In Paris, instead of the chequered of blackness which marked the early spring season, the favorite headgear is of cream or dead white moire, satin or straw, trimmed only with an egret or silken flower, also of white.

The smart veil of the moment is of fine white tulle, dotted with black chenille spots, and worn only across the upper part of the face. It veils the eyes and leaves the mouth uncovered, and has a quaint effect when the lower half of the face is partially obscured by a director's neck frill, very full and very high.

The "casquin," as the French call the middle blouse, half open in front with a yoke about the shoulders, will be popular this summer and is made of a material of a different color from that of the skirt. Sometimes it is worn opening over a chemise of cream batiste or linen, and often with a wide leather waistbelt.

Needlework Notes.

A very handsome centerpiece for the dining table may be made by using old curtains. If they have a heavy or conventional design in the borders, cut out the medallions or figures, apply to linen of any size you wish for your dolly, and if the curtains have heavy edges use that for outside edge. If you have a pair of Russian net curtains, take the figures from one border, fell them on the linen at regular intervals, join them with a narrow scroll cut from the edge of curtain and edge the centerpiece with the lace taken from the front edge of the curtains, and you will have a handsome centerpiece for your dining table.

MATHEWSON CELEBRATES THIRTY-FIFTH BIRTHDAY NEAR TOP OF LEAGUE

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Old Master Mathewson, idol of the fans and as great a pitcher as ever faced a batter, celebrated his thirty-fifth birthday today. Despite his "age"—thirty-five is pretty old for a ball player, and especially so for a pitcher—Big Six after thirteen years of pitching in the big towns, today stands close to the top of the heap among National league pitchers.

The Cards today were to finish a three-day invasion of New York, and as Matty has an old grudge against this rejuvenated bunch from the west it was expected McGraw would send him into the box. Only once has Mathewson been beaten on his birthday. That was in 1912 when Matty went in as a relief pitcher against the Cardinals after they had whaled the life and a bunch of runs out of McGraw's first selection.

In 1913, on his birthday Matty went to the relief of Art Froomie after the Giants had a two-run lead over Brooklyn and Froomie had begun to wobble. He held the Superbas safe and won. On August 12, 1911, was fortunate that Matty didn't pitch against the Phillies, for on that day Chalmers held the Giants scoreless and beat them. Matty had a day off August 12, 1910. On his natal day in 1909 he blanked the Cubs with four hits, and he pitched the Giants into second place August 12, 1907, when he beat the Pirates.

GEN. JOFFRE, FRENCH COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF



Gen. Joffre, commander-in-chief of the French army, has gone to the front to check the advance of the Germans—or to lead his forces on to Berlin in answer to the cry of the Parisian mob the night Germany declared war on Russia.

Since most of the fighting seems to be in Belgium it was considered likely that he would march in with the French army headed to help King Albert maintain his wonderful stand against the determined and relentless attack of the Germans on Liege.

TROOPS CHEER AS WILHELMIN AS BARE IS HELD UP TO THEIR VIEW

THE HAGUE, Aug. 12.—Cheer after cheer went up from the regiments of Dutch troops marching past the palace when Queen Wilhelmina's daughter, the little Princess Juliana, was held up to their view. The Dutch soldiers were marching on their way to meet the German troops which have invaded their territory. The queen, standing on the palace balcony, sang with the soldiers the national anthem.

GREAT BRITAIN LISTS CONTRABANDS OF WAR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Great Britain's contraband of war proclamation was cabled to the state department by Ambassador Page.

It placed arms, ammunition and all distinctly military supplies on the "absolute" contraband, and designated food, grain, money, horses and general supplies as "conditional" contraband. Everything under the latter head becomes subject to seizure when intended for the use of a power with which Great Britain is at war.

The proclamation follows the usual lines, and those issued by other powers involved in war probably will be virtually identical.

It names the following as absolute contraband:

- (1)—Arms of all kinds, including arms for sporting purposes and their distinctive component parts.
- (2)—Projectiles, charges and cartridges of all kinds and their distinctive component parts.
- (3)—Powder and explosives, especially prepared for use in war.
- (4)—Gun mountings, limber boxes, limbers, military wagons, field forges and their distinctive component parts.
- (5)—Clothing and equipment of a distinctly military character.
- (6)—All kinds of harness of a distinctive military character.
- (7)—Saddle, pack and draft animals, suitable for use in war.
- (8)—Articles of camp equipment and their distinctive component parts.
- (9)—Armor plates.
- (10)—Warships, including boats and their distinctive component parts of such a nature that they can only be used on a vessel of war.
- (11)—Aeroplanes, airships, balloons and air crafts of all kinds and their component parts together with accessories and articles recognizable for use in connection with balloons and aircraft.
- (12)—Implement and apparatus designed exclusively for the manufacture of munitions of war, for the manufacture or repair of arms or war materials for use on land and sea.

The following will be treated as contraband of war:

- (1)—Foodstuffs.
- (2)—Forage and grain suitable for feeding animals.
- (3)—Clothing, fabrics for clothing and boots and shoes suitable for use in war.
- (4)—Gold and silver in coin or bullion, paper money.
- (5)—Vehicles of all kinds available for use in war and their component parts.
- (6)—Vessels, craft and boats of all kinds, floating docks, parts of docks and their component parts.
- (7)—Railway material, both fixed and rolling stock and materials for telegraphs, wireless telegraphs and telephones.
- (8)—Fuel and lubricants.
- (9)—Powder and explosives not specially prepared for use in war.
- (10)—Barbed wire and implements for fixing and cutting the same.
- (11)—Trenchshoes and shoeing materials.
- (12)—Harness and saddlery.
- (13)—Field glasses, telescopes, aneroidometers and all kinds of nautical instruments.

Sweden is Planting Muds

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—The Swedish consulate here received word that instructions should be posted with the proper parties notifying all shippers that muds were being placed in Swedish territorial waters and that no vessel should risk entering a Swedish port without the services of a Swedish pilot.

GERMANS ANGRY OVER WAR NEWS

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Incensed at continued reports of French and British victories, which they declare are manifestly impossible, while persistent silence from Berlin and other German sources leave them undeniably prominent Germans in the United States are straining every effort to open up the channels of communication through which the German side of the story may be put before the public.

The cutting of the German cable and the complete isolation of Berlin leaves Germany practically incommunicado, most of the war news coming from French and Belgium sources through London.

German leaders here declare that most of the reports attributing success to Germany's enemies are untrue and could not be by any measure of possibility be possible.

Repetition of Sedan.

As proof of their contention, they point out that two days before the fall of Sedan in 1870, American newspapers were printing articles—cabled from London or Paris—in which the complete defeat of the German army was described a dozen times over.

Perlin then, as now, was rarely heard from, and then only when the German Emperor sent reports of his success to the Queen.

"News dispatches in the New York English press are not only highly colored, but they describe victories for the French arms that are utterly impossible to anyone who knows the country," said Victor J. Riddle, editor of the "Staats-Zeitung." "Papers here are printing them without the slightest attempt at verification. Often they put the German army in two or three places at once."

"Because communication with Germany or friends of Germany is cut off, there is no opportunity to print both sides of the story. In July, 1870, conditions were almost the same. Every day the newspapers here carried columns of dispatches from Paris telling of the way Germany was at fault, how French prisoners were ill-treated, how a mere handful of French had defeated whole squadrons of Germans and how the French fleet was sweeping the seas."

Herman Riddle, owner of the "Staats-Zeitung," said reports of victories in stiff battles by the French were impossible on their face, since the German army has not been mobilized yet and has not really begun its campaign.

RAISE \$1,425,000 FOR RELIEF

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Although it was opened only on August 7, \$1,425,000 has already been subscribed to the Prince of Wales fund for the relief of the poor during the war.

The provincial cities are still to be heard from.

One of the first subscriptions was \$90,000 from the Princess regiment, the First Life guard. Among those who contributed to the fund were: George Costes, the manufacturer, \$250,000; Lord Ashton, \$75,000; the Rothschilds, \$50,000; King George, Sir Ernest Cassell and Sir William Hartley, each \$25,000, and dozens of other persons, \$5000 each, including Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt.

The queen mother, Alexandra, has appealed for funds for the Red Cross society, and Ladies Paget, Lowther and Churchill, and Mrs. Harcourt, American women who married Englishmen, have formed a committee and will arrange a plan whereby Americans can "manifest in some way their sympathy with England in her present emergency and offer some useful aid to alleviate the sufferings of her sailors and soldiers."

FEDERAL TROOPS HAVE EVACUATED CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—The peaceful transfer of the reins of government at Mexico City from the Carral administration to the constitutionalists actually began yesterday, according to advices to the state department from Consul Sillman, now en route to the capital with Carranza.

The federal troops evacuated the capital the consul said, leaving the city in charge of municipal police, who by mutual agreement were to be regarded as neutral. The federalists withdrew from the city to a nearby point, there to await an announcement of amnesty from General Carranza. Should guarantees be refused, officials here do not doubt that a counter revolution will be immediately set in motion.

The Brazilian minister to Mexico, who is caring for the interests there of the United States and Governor Iturbide of the Mexican federal district, and a commission of two others, left during the day for Tula, north of Mexico City, where General Obregon, commander of one of the three big divisions of the constitutionalist army, has headquarters. General Carranza is expected to go there at once.

WRITER GETS \$264 FOR DAMAGE DONE BY DOG

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—Miss Marion Walcott, writer and circulating manager of "Everywoman," was given a judgment by Justice of the Peace Conlan for \$264.50 against Waldemar H. F. N. De Bille, connected with the Panama-Pacific Exposition company.

The judgment was for rent owing on Miss Walcott's flat at 437 Walnut street and damage done to the furnishings by the De Bille dog, "Bob." De Bille did not appear.

Miss Walcott testified and was corroborated by her brother, Earl A. Walcott, president of the Civil Service Commission, that De Bille owed \$46.50 rent and that his dog ruined a sewing machine, photograph and typewriter, all worth \$215.
