ROUND-UP PROMISES TO BREAK RECORDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12.—Prospects for a bigger and more thrilling Round-up, to be held September 21 to 26 at Pendleton, this year than ever before, are indicated by reports to the O. W. R. & N. Co. from its agents throughout eastern Oregon and Washington. Special train service will be a feature of the annual wild west carnival.

Reduced rates will prevail from most points of the northwest, and the plains are being scoured for the most reckless backwoods and wildest steers, that the battle of brain against brute may be the most thrilling.

New features this year will be pony express races and a thrilling event in which cowboys and Indians will participate. This will supplement the endurance contests between man and horse and the cattle that will be secured from far and near.

The broncho busting events are expected this year to surpass those of 1913 in number of entrants.

Foreigners Meet; 25 Hurt. GLOBE, Ariz., Aug. 12.—Twenty-five were injured, none fatally, in a battle between Austrians and Serbians here. Forty Serbians and 20 Austrians took part in the fight, using rocks, clubs and their fists.

Officers who were rushed to the scene quickly stopped the fight and placed 21 of the rioters under arrest. Members of many nationalities are making their way into the city tonight and further trouble is feared by the authorities.

But the hard fighting of the Belgians has given time for the French troops to come up, and it is expected Great Britain will land soldiers. In

some German manoeuvres the horses which haul the cannon are removed. They would not stand the strain of fighting, and in such cases the heavy guns must be moved about by hand.

CITY OF LIEGE LOOKS MUCH LIKE PENDLETON

SURROUNDINGS OF BELGIAN FORTRESS ARE COMPARED TO THIS CITY.

Local people who have been straining their imagination to picture the battle about Liege will be greatly assisted by the knowledge that the beleaguered city of Belgium has a natural resemblance to Pendleton. This at least is the statement of a Portland man who has been there and here. A Nibley of the Metropolitan Investment Co., who spent four and a half years in continental Europe, is quoted as having the following to say about its topography:

"The country about Liege," said he, "is hilly and rolling without being mountainous. The people of Oregon can get some idea of what it looks like by comparing it to the country around Pendleton. The hills are wooded and furnish cloaks for the movements of troops. I did not go near any of the forts but they are, of course, placed on commanding hills."

"Between Germany by way of Verriers, the route followed by the Germans, the country is all hilly. It is pretty much the same southwest toward Luxembourg and down the River Meuse toward Namur and France. As you go toward Brussels the hills grow smaller until the face of the country becomes a rolling plain."

"Fort Seraling, which latest press dispatches declare that the Germans have attacked, is at Seraling about nine miles south of Liege. It is the big iron and coal town. All the country thereabout teems with factories."

Austrians Over Border Lake. ROME, Aug. 12.—Eight Austrian regiments are reported to have crossed Lake Constance en route for Alsace.

An Austrian fleet of 12 battleships and 16 torpedo boats is said to be going at full speed toward the strait of Otranto, which connects the Adriatic with the Indian sea. The probable purpose of the fleet is to give support to the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau, which have been reported in that vicinity.
