The constituent parts are—for a whole man: One jigger of gin, one jigger of French vermouth. Pour over large blocks of ice. Punch the bar spoon hard between the lumps and keep it going for one minute—no more.

Those who require the lemon peel, either twisted or macerated with the muddler, belong to the sons of Germany and not the children of peace.

The consoling thought attends that in a few weeks New Jersey and Folsom street will be turning out "French" vermouth with a slight change in the label.

And few are those who shall know the taste that comes between.

RARE COLLECTION OF FOSSILS IN DANGER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—The priceless Sny skulls and other fossil evidence of prehistoric man, now stored in the Liege Museum, are in danger of being destroyed by the terrific bombardment which the plucky little Belgian city has been undergoing for days.

Professor John S. Merriam, head of the department of geology at the University of California, has fears that the canonading of Liege may reduce the museum to ruins and carry with it the most interesting relics of prehistoric humanity that has been dug up in Europe.

The Sny skeletons are famous. They are regarded by scientists as excellent fossil proofs of the theory of evolution, as they are one of the "missing links," which geologists and zoologists have been seeking ever since the days of Darwin.

Hands Clashed in Duel.

FREELING, Va., Aug. 14.—Two men climbed historic Cumberland mountain recently and fought a duel that probably will result in the death of both. The participants were Jas. "Blackhead" Vanover and Anderson Estep, who had been friends and neighbors since childhood. While they fought each held the other's left hand.

There were no witnesses to the duel, which is said to have been fought because Vanover objected to the attentions of Estep to his (Vanover's) sister, a pretty young woman.

The men, both of whom belong to well-to-do families, met here after coming into town to buy farming supplies. Persons who saw them in conversation on the street did not notice anything out of the ordinary. Within a few minutes the men rode out of town. They went to Cumberland mountain, near Osborne's Gap, and fought. Vanover was shot through the body twice and Estep was wounded three times in the shoulder and arm. After the fight the duellists returned here. There is little hope for the recovery of Vanover.

Austrian Ship Has Explosives.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—A dispatch from Rome to the Daily Chronicle says the Austrian steamship Bayern, laden with dynamite and live projectiles, is reported to be trying to penetrate the Adriatic Sea. It is suspected her mission is to replenish the munitions of the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau.

Three Killed in Wreck.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 14.—Three persons were killed when a train plunged through a railroad bridge near the Canadian military camp, Valcartier.

The Bridge was Damaged during the Night and a man whom the authorities suspect in the plot was shot to death as he was running away.

A guard who saw the man hurrying off challenged him. When the man refused to halt, the guard fired.

Police Stop War Film.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—The police closed a moving picture house and arrested the proprietor on a charge of inciting a riot, because pictures were shown purporting to represent the Franco-Prussian war.

Hotel managers throughout the city have ordered their orchestras to play no national or patriotic airs, not even Hungarian dance music. Repeated clashes among offended guests taught the managers that absolute and impartial suppression was the course of wisdom.

Germany's Greatest Super-Dreadnought Moltke

Home Hints and Recipes

To Reduce Weight.

(By Abigail Moore in Chicago News.)

For reducing flesh about the abdomen and strengthening there, throwing the medicine ball is one of the best exercises. The action of the internal organs, kidneys, liver and intestines, which can be exercised artificially, is stimulated and circulation regulated. For persons who live the sedentary life such exercise is not only good, but essential to health.

Ten minutes upon rising in the morning is all that is necessary to give the exercises in order to bring the body to par and keep it there. To start with, the ball, made of leather, should weigh about five pounds, never more than seven and a half. The following directions are by Dr. Francis Heckel:

A. Throwing the ball forward, using both hands: stand erect, holding the ball in front of the face between the hands, but not grasping it.

1. Spread feet wide apart, bend trunk forward and swing the ball between the knees as far as possible.

2. Suddenly raising the body and swinging the arms forward in line with the shoulders, project it.

3. Then, with trunk erect, holding the ball high above the head and fling it forward, bending downward with the action.

B. Throwing the ball obliquely: Hold ball lightly in both hands on one side of the body and hurl it by

swinging the arms forcibly forward, which motion swings the body in the same direction. Then hurl it as you would a spear. Repeat this movement, starting at the other side with the other hand.

"When," explains Dr. Heckel, "the ball is thrown upward from a stooping position the abdominal muscles contract and stiffen, counterbalancing the rising of the body as it comes to upright position. Throwing the ball obliquely the muscles about the waist and loins are called into play, and throwing the ball from downward the upper and lower parts of the body together, exercising the muscles of the abdomen."

Box for Shoes.

A great convenience for the neat safekeeping of shoes is a six-sided box with a cushioned cover that makes it a comfortable seat—and so makes it suitable for a small bedroom, says the Washington Herald.

The inside of the box is fitted with six pockets, one on each of its sides, each big enough to accommodate a pair of shoes. The central space between the shoes can be taken up by rubbers and shoe polishes.

Flowers in Vogue.

As the season advances, single flowers or bunches of them are used more and more for trimming various articles of the toilet, says the Newark News. For gowns and wraps quite as much as for hats are they in demand; for undergarments they were never so popular. The dainty buds made of chiffon are especially pretty for lingerie.

French Accuse Germans.

PARIS, Aug. 14.—The following official statement was issued:

"A wounded French cavalryman at Mexieres declares he saw a German cavalryman shoot a wounded Frenchman. He says he heard five or six other shots and saved himself by feigning death.

"The Germans are wearing uniforms taken from Belgians killed in battle."

Offenders to Go Free.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Three New York detectives who went to Europe to bring back persons indicted here, were returned without their prisoners. Word to this effect has been cabled to two of the officers in Paris by the state department in Washington. It was explained that extradition had been suspended during war times.

War Halts Work in Mines.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 14.—President Robert E. Harris of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal company, Ltd., announced that as a result of the unprecedented financial situation created by the war, it had been decided to close a portion of the plant at the Wabana (Newfoundland) mines. The blast and open furnaces at Sydney mines, Cape Breton Island, have been temporarily stopped.

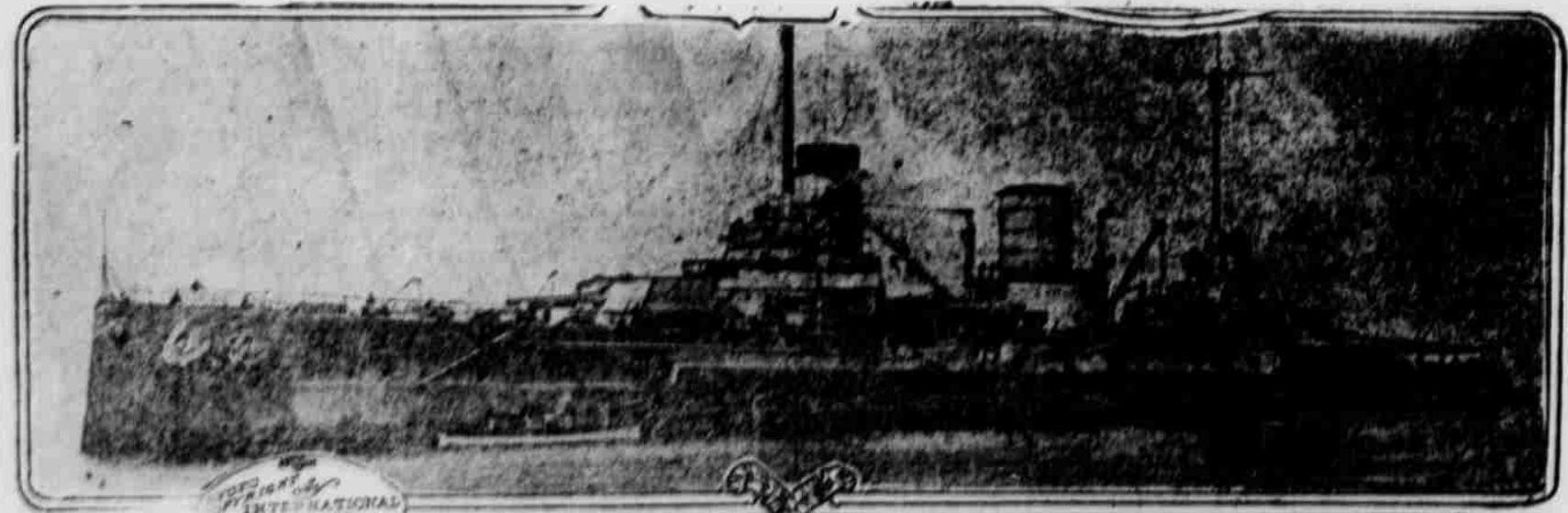
