ONE YEAR DAIRY COURSE OFFERED BY O. A. COLLEGE

In addition to the four year degree courses in dairy manufacturing and dairy production the dairy department of the Oregon Agricultural College will offer this year a one year course in dairying.

The one year course is provided especially for those who have had no opportunity to pursue their public school courses beyond the eighth grade, or who from necessity or choice desire upon completing the work of this grade, to obtain as quickly as possible a working knowledge of the science of dairying. The courses are designed to provide the largest amount of practical information and training that one can be given in one year.

The courses are so arranged that the student may specialize in either dairy manufacturing or dairy production.

The Pacific Northwest, on account of its even temperature and abundant growth of forage crops, is peculiarly adapted to dairying and the rapid growth of this industry is creating splendid opportunities for young men in the various fields of dairying. The one year course in dairying will fit students for such positions as butter-makers, cheese-makers, creamery helpers, testers, operators of creameries and cheese factories, managers of dairy farms, and for official testers in cow-testing association work.

Dairy Production Course
In this course special emphasis will be given to the breeding, feeding, care and management of dairy cattle, judging of cattle pedigree work, growing of forage and soiling crops; diseases of dairy cattle; organization of cow-testing, bull and community breeders' association; dairy accounting; dairy mechanics; dairy bacteriology; the composition of milk and cream and the testing of dairy products; the operation of the hand separator; farm butter-making; the construction and arrangement of dairy barns, milk houses and silos.

Dairy Manufacturing Course
Instruction will be given in this course in all phases of creamery work such as the receiving and grading of milk and cream; pasteurization; the preparation and use of starters; the ripening and churning of cream packing and marketing butter; location, organization and construction of creameries; creamery refrigeration and creamery management; and other studies designed to fit the student to manage and operate creameries. The course in cheese making will include practice in receiving and sampling milk; the use of the various tests for acidity, ferment, etc., the making and curing of cheddar and other varieties of cheeses. The course in ice cream making will include practice in selecting and grading of cream standardizing and preparing the mix for the various frozen products, and the freezing, packing, bricking, molding, coloring and sale of the various frozen products. The creamery course will include a course in dairy mechanics, dairy bacteriology, the judging of butter and cheese, creamery accounting and the testing of dairy products.

The instruction work will be given in the new dairy building, erected and equipped especially for instruction and investigation in dairying. The equipment is such as to permit the handling of milk and cream in a commercial scale, thus giving the student practice under actual factory conditions. On the first floor, are offices and manufacturing rooms, the latter including a boiler room equipped with a 15 h. p. internal furnace boiler and a 10 h. p. Jewel automatic steam engine, a farm butter making room, in which are found hand churns, butter workers, and the various types of separators found on the market; a churn room, which is equipped with modern ripeners, combined churns, various forms of butter molding appliances, refrigerating machine, cooling room, and ice cream freezer; a market milk room, with milk cooler, bottle filling machine, and bottle washer; a cheese room, which is equipped with cheese vats, automatic pressure cheese press, and other equipment used in the cheese factory; a cheese curing room, and a reading room.

On the second floor are located recitation rooms, and advanced and general laboratories. The latter will accommodate two hundred students in sections of forty each, and are equipped with a full line of appliances for testing milk and milk products. In the advanced laboratory will be found moisture tests, salt tests, curd tests and various other forms of apparatus suited to the needs of the advanced student. A circulating hot water system connects the wash sinks in all the laboratories. Both steam and electricity are used for power purposes.

The college dairy herd consists of thirty-five head of high-producing dairy cattle of the Jersey, Holstein-Friesian, Guernsey, and Ayrshire breeds. These cattle are housed in a modern dairy barn.

To enter this course a student must have completed the eighth grade course of study and be at least 18 years of age.

ANOTHER ARTESIAN WELL NEAR ATHENA

On the Vie Harris place, south of Main street, one half mile, at a depth of 280 feet Athena's second artesian well was struck Friday morning, says the Athena Press. The drill, which had been hammering away in solid rock formation for several weeks, broke through into a soapstone strata and the water gushed out from the top of the drill hole.

The drill is now down close to 300 feet and the flow of water is slightly salting. The water is cool, of pleasant taste, and bears evidence of having mineral properties. This well produces an artesian flow at a depth of over one hundred feet less than the well of the Athena Land and Trust company, which was also bored south of Main street.

The bore of the new well is 5 and 5-8 inches and Mr. Harris will sink still deeper in hopes of striking a still stronger flow. He has experienced considerable difficulty in sinking the well. It was started with a smaller hole and then rammed out, necessitating considerable time and extra expense. However, he now feels that he is fully repaid.

Mr. Miller, who has had long experience in well drilling, and who has struck several artesian wells, firmly believes that in this vicinity somewhere will be uncovered a strong subterranean water pressure, and when once encountered, there will be a gusher for the man fortunate enough to own the land on which it is located.

The topography of the country hereabouts, and the rock formations are the indications which Mr. Miller bases his judgment upon.

Home Hints and Recipes

How to Clean Your Panama Hat.

In the September Woman's Home Companion a contributor tells, as follows, how to clean your Panama hat: "You can clean your Panama, soiled from the summer's wear, in a few moments before putting it away in the fall.

"Select a hot, sunny morning for the cleaning and provide yourself with a nail brush and any good white soap, ammonia, glycerine and hot water. White soap is advised, as it does not contain so much alkali as the heavier soaps; ammonia has excellent bleaching qualities, and the glycerine makes the hat supple and glossy when dry and clean. Use a deep basin that will admit of immersing the entire hat. Make a suds with the soap and water and rub the hat gently with the brush, inside and out. Now and again dip the hat beneath the water and examine it for any spots or stains.

"When it is clean rinse it in fresh water of the temperature in which it was scrubbed. In this rinsing water put the ammonia, about a tablespoonful to each gallon of water. Rinse thoroughly so every part of suds is removed. Now measure a tablespoonful of glycerine to each quart of the next and last rinsing water. About two quarts of this last water will suffice.

"Dip the hat up and down in this mixture and pour some of the glycerine water over it. Fold a Turkish towel and lay the hat on it in the hot sunshine, pat it into shape with the fingers, and when almost dry turn it over so the sun can reach every side. When dry it will be like new again."

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—Coal prices were expected to soar here in a few days. With the supply getting short, due to the limited shipping from Australia and British Columbia, anthracite, now selling at \$15 per ton, was expected to go to \$20.

Girls in Silent Debate.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—Persons who pass George Knab's restaurants in the Loop district see two factions of women in bitter argument. One faction parades in front of the restaurant doors with placards. "With your assistance we will win our strike at Knab's," pinned to their waist. They are the waitresses who joined the union's boycott of the Knab restaurants May 1. The others walk aside by side with the striking women and flaunt placards inscribed: "Knab's waitresses are paid union wages or more and work union hours or less. Has Knab the right to select his own waitresses? That is the only matter in dispute."

"We want to attract the attention of the public," said Mr. Taylor. "We believe that if the true situation were generally known there would be no discrimination against Knab."

Drug Evil Held Worse. NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Sheriff Griffenhagen, who attended the convention of the American Wine Growers' Association, told the wine men that he had not seen one intoxicated person in New York in a year.

In a speech at the annual banquet of the wine growers Sheriff Griffenhagen said that the besetting sin of New York is drugs. In the 1890 convictions in this city in the last year, he said, 35 per cent were for the drug habit and only 20 per cent for intoxication. He predicted that New York never would go dry and urged the wine growers to stand together against the "ignorant element" that is trying to destroy the wine trade.

HERMISTON, Ore., Aug. 15.—Fifty men gathered at Dr. B. G. Monkman's "Wenak" ranch last evening in a social convale in response to an invitation from the doctor. It was the social event of the season from a man's point of view and continued until midnight.

At 8:30 p. m. ten automobiles assembled at the Henry Hitts resort down town and conveyed the crowd to the ranch one and a half miles out. After that the telephone receiver was down and no reporters were present. Fried chicken, salads, cheese, rye bread, etc., were served in profusion. A company of ten male voices rendered music. A few speeches were made. Some played cards, others took a midnight plunge in the canal nearby. Men came from all over the project and the occasion was declared most successful in forming new acquaintances and renewing friendships of the citizens who are most of the time engaged in the serious business of developing a new country.

Bobcat Bounty Removed.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 14.—Announcing that the money could be used to better advantage, the state fish and game commission removed the bounty on bobcats. The bounty has been \$1 a scalp and the state has paid out about \$6000 so far this year. Commissioner Duncan said a large part of the animals had been caught in the southeastern part of the state and that the hunters benefited other states as much as they did Oregon.

The removal of the bounty on bobcats has no effect on the bounties on cougars and wolves, the commission announced.
