AN IRONY OF THE WAR.

If the troops comprising the armies of the European nations now at war obeyed the orders of all those who have a right to command them it is interesting to reflect on the possible consequences. As a result of the complementary custom observed by European armies, the beginning of the war finds every European ruler holding high commissions in the army of every other ruler. Thus, the German Emperor is an officer in the navy and army of every country now allied against him.

The Kaiser heads his list of military honors with the titles of General-in-Chief of the German army and Admiral-in-Chief of the German fleet. He is colonel of eight Prussian regiments, one from Mecklenburg, two from Saxony, two from Wurttemberg, one from Baden, one from Hesse and two from Bavaria. He is a Field Marshal in the Austrian army.

In addition to all this the Kaiser is Admiral in the British and Russian fleets. If he could exercise his commands at this time he would no doubt find a way to settle the difficulties in the North sea in short order, but it is to be feared that Vice-Admiral Sir John Jellicoe, though inferior in rank, would hardly yield place to the German Emperor should that monarch appear suddenly in a Zeppelin and demand that he receive command. What else he might do if he only could may be indicated by the fact that the Kaiser is an Admiral in the navies of Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Greece; Field Marshal of the British dragoons, and Captain General of the army of Spain.

The German Crown Prince is Colonel of seven Prussian, two Saxon, two Bavarian, one Wurttemberg, two Russian, one Austrian and one British regiment, and a Major in the Spanish army.

The Emperor Francis Joseph is a Field Marshal in the Prussian and British armies, General in that of Sweden, Honorary General in Denmark, and Captain General in the army of Spain.

The Czar of Russia is Colonel of thirty-two regiments in his own army and an honorary staff officer in twelve others. He commands three regiments in the Prussian Guards and one each in the armies of Hesse, Bavaria, Great Britain and Spain. Besides this he is an Admiral in the na-

vies of Great Britain, Denmark and Sweden.

The Czarina is Colonel of four regiments in her husband's army and of one in the Prussian Guard.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—William Matuchiwaz, 3348 Luelia avenue owns six geese, and Mrs. Helen Ulasaki, 3339 Mackinaw avenue a neighbor, owns four geese. This morning six eggs were laid in a lot and each claimed the eggs. A dispute arose and Mrs. Ulasaki called James Ross, a boarder at her home, to her assistance.

Ross went to the home of Matuchiwaz and ended the argument by pushing him through a window. Matuchiwaz was not severely injured, but neighbors witnessing the struggle, called the south Chicago police.

Thomas Ibberson, motorman of the limited, sustained internal injuries and may die.

PIKES PEAK HIGHWAY BOOSTERS START TOUR

COLORADO SPRINGS, Mo., Aug. 17.—Hoping to prove that the "Pikes Peak Ocean-to-Ocean Highway" is the most practicable and attractive automobile route across the continent a big sociability automobile run from Colorado Springs to Salt Lake City began today. Several scores of automobilists, representing the country as far east as Indiana left here early today and will reach the Mormon capital on August 23, in time for the great international carnival, The Wonders of the Wasatch.

This run is the last leg of an automobile tour which began at Terre Haute, Ind., on August 6 and brought numerous motor enthusiasts here by way of Springfield, Ill., St. Joseph, Mo., and across the Kansas plains. The distance covered by the run when completed will be 1750 miles, making one of the largest motor events of the year. To mark and log the Colorado and Utah divisions of the Pike's Peak Ocean-to-Ocean highway, a pathfinding car left here three weeks ago and made the run to Salt Lake City.

The Pike's Peak Ocean-to-Ocean highway association was organized last March at a meeting held in St. Joseph, Mo. Despite the fact that it is the newest of all the transcontinental routes proposed, it's promoters are confident that they can demonstrate that it is the best because it is open for traffic today. The directors of the association held a meeting at St. Joseph June 26 and at that time reports were received from all sections showing the roads in excellent condition for immediate travel. From Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Colorado and Utah, enthusiasts reported an enormous amount of work done in construction and development of roads in anticipation of heavy travel.

"A mass meeting of protest and a boycott is one of the effective measures which I think of," said Miss Margaret Doherty of the Illinois Equal Suffrage association. "It is almost as bad as having war in our own country to have these starvation effects of war in high prices on necessities."

Baby Food Prices Soaring.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—Babies throughout the city are confronted with the danger of a famine owing to the advance in prices of the imported prepared baby foods. The increases in some cases are 133 per cent. 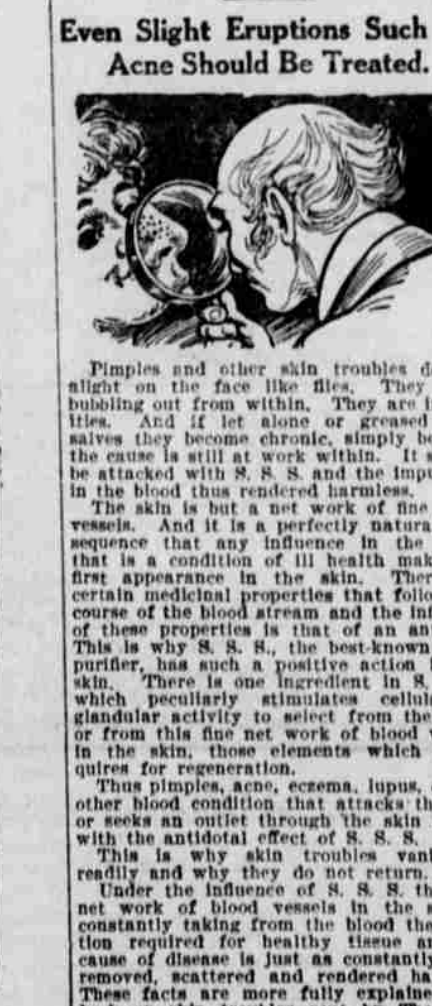
