TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20.—State Forester Elliott announced that regardless of published stories to the contrary, the loss by forest fires in the state has been small. "There has been no real damage, to speak of so far this season," he said.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—Through a delicate operation, surgeons removed a round tin whistle, about the size of a quarter, which lodged in the throat of Oscar Lee, six years old.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20.—Triplets—two girls and a boy—were born here to Mrs. Herbert Seibel, on the birthday of her daughter, Alice, aged five. All three are lusty.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20.—Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion that all registration books in the various counties shall be closed 15 days before the regular election.

SEATTLE, Aug. 20.—To back up President Wilson's offer of mediation Seattle citizens of foreign nativity representing the countries at war have organized into a cosmopolitan peace league. They will circulate petitions addressed to their home countries pleading for the acceptance of President Wilson's offer.

SEATTLE, Aug. 20.—Swiss officers belonging to the regular army or reserves have been ordered to return to Switzerland or be considered deserters, according to instructions received by Local Consul Wettrick.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Word was received here that the Peruvian destroyer Teniente Rodriguez was the first warship to pass the Panama canal.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—The government's investigation of the increase in the price of foodstuffs since the war began in Europe, is progressing rapidly. Special agents are interviewing merchants in various lines. A special grand jury was expected to be called to consider the evidence secured, in the near future.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The boat scheduled for late this month between Gunboat Smith and Young Ahern of New York, has been indefinitely postponed.

CONSUMPTION OF COTTON AND ITS DISTRIBUTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Cotton consumed during July was 448,563 bales, exclusive of lint, compared with 462,942 in July last year, the census bureau announced today. Consumption for the eleven months ended July 31 was 5,193,659 bales against 5,050,971 last year. Cotton on hand July 31 in manu-

facturing establishments was 904,414 bales compared with 957,561 a year ago and in independent warehouse 424,216 compared with 281,739 a year ago.

Exports were 126,173 bales against 140,710 last year and for the eleven months, 8,905,415 against 8,543,794 year ago.

Imports were 22,743 against 9,492 last year and for the eleven months 233,129 against 219,580 a year ago. Cotton spindles active numbered 30,678,955 against 30,922,654 a year ago.

Linters consumed was 23,452 bales against 24,750 a year ago and for the eleven months 281,607 bales against 276,376 last year; on hand in manufacturing establishments 82,928 bales against 72,398 a year ago and in independent warehouses 33,444 against 29,148 a year ago.

Linters exported 8644 bales and for the eleven months 258,996 bales.

CLINGS TO TROPHY AS ARM IS AMPUTATED

PARIS, Aug. 20.—Here are three remarkable stories of the wounded published in the "Matin" as coming from their special correspondent on the field:

General Von Delmiling, in command of an army corps was wounded by a bullet which pierced his tongue. He is in a hospital. A soldier of the line was severely wounded and lost consciousness, but still grasped firmly the spike of a Prussian helmet. He was taken to a hospital, where it was found necessary to amputate his arm. It was impossible to make him relax his grip on the trophy of war. The arm was cut off with the hand still holding the helmet.

Another soldier was wounded in the heel, but absolutely refused to let go of the epaulet which he had torn in a hand-to-hand struggle with the shoulders of a Prussian officer.

GERMAN FLAG CAPTOR TO RECEIVE REWARD

PARIS, Aug. 20.—A reward of \$1000 and perhaps double that amount awaits the French soldier who captured the first German standard taken at St. Blaise. Paul M. Charnier, flagmaker of Paris, a fortnight ago deposited with the cashier of Le Matin \$1000 as a reward of this feat.

Mme. de Plunket, widow of a former director of the Palais Royale Theater, in a letter to the newspapers reminds them that her husband shortly before his death in 1892, bequeathed to the city of Paris \$1000 to the French soldier who should capture the first flag of Germany in a war of revenge.

At that time the city refused the request and Mme. de Plunket now expresses the hope that the reason for the refusal now no longer exists and ask the authorities to dispose of the \$1000 by awarding it to "the hero who took the German flag at St. Blaise."

Home Hints and Recipes

TESTED RECIPES

Fried Cucumbers

Peel two large cucumbers, slice in half inch slices and place in ice water for three-quarters of an hour. Drain carefully and roll alternately in beaten egg and cracked meal. Fry in boiling fat, drain, season with salt and pepper and serve.

Halibut a la Nelson

Cook halibut thoroughly, shred it and add to it one tablespoonful of butter, a dash of pepper, juice of one lemon and one cupful of tomato juice. Let it simmer 10 minutes. Add one cupful of bread crumbs and table-spoonful of jelly powder or Jello. Mold it in deep, small molds, serve it topped with hard-boiled eggs and garnish it with parsley.

"Happy Eliza"

Chop one dozen figs, six apples sliced but not peeled, add one pound granulated sugar. Add two quarts of water and boil rapidly for 15 minutes. Strain and cool. Serve over crushed ice, with a slice of orange on top.

Fanny Crosby, the blind poet and hymn writer, has been left an annuity of \$500 by a wealthy woman of Pennsylvania.

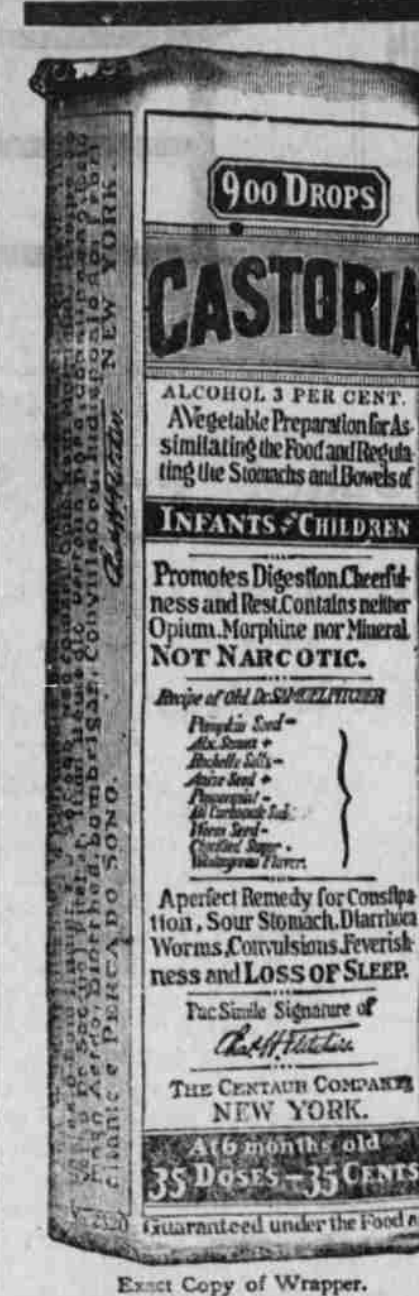

ber. One is that she must use no more flour than the recipe calls for and the other is that she must keep the dough as cold as possible. A good point is to have all the ingredients cold and to put the dough, after it is mixed, in the refrigerator for half an hour.

Paint Cleaning. The best way to clean white paint is to take a soft flannel cloth, dip it in warm water, wring out, and then dip it in a saucer of clean bran. The friction of the bran will remove any stain without injuring the paint. Soda should never be used on enamel, as it destroys the gloss.

A WIVES' UNION.

Paris already possesses an organization on the lines of the wives' union. It is proposed to establish in London in order to control the cost of living. The baker extracts 15 cents from them for a four-pound loaf of household bread, and as much as 20 cents in some districts, while better quality bread is never sold at less than 6 cents a pound. Other necessities of life are equally dear in proportion. In a manifesto issued when the League of Parisian Consumers was formed to fight these high prices it is stated that the dearth of food is not due solely to high tariffs and octroi duties. The average Parisian shopkeeper wants to retire from business at the age of 40 or thereabouts, and bleeds his customers as much as possible. If tradesmen could be persuaded to keep in harness a little longer they would, it is thought, be content with smaller profits.

Dictates of Fashion. Hunting coats are seen in young girls' linen suits. Some of the new cloth capes have little vests of brocade. Shoulder shawls are being crocheted of silk and wool to look like scarfs. Tassels finish the ends. A very small sunshade, with a very long handle, is one of the most graceful parables of the season. Contrasting linings in gorgeous patterns and colorings impart a smart touch to the modish cape in its varied manifestations.

A clever designer has introduced a waistcoat which is worn over a blouse of white batiste or sheer linen. Both back and front are alike and it is fashioned of flowered material.

The fashionable fan at present is made of white peacock feathers mounted on tortoise shell. Others are of natural colored peacock feathers or eagle feathers.

The waistbands of the directoire are in vogue again, and almost all day and evening dresses show it in one form or another. Flared shawls with the ends weighted by heavy fringe are used to supply a dash of chic to costumes of dull coloring. Purples which are reminiscent of the eighteenth century, of crocheted

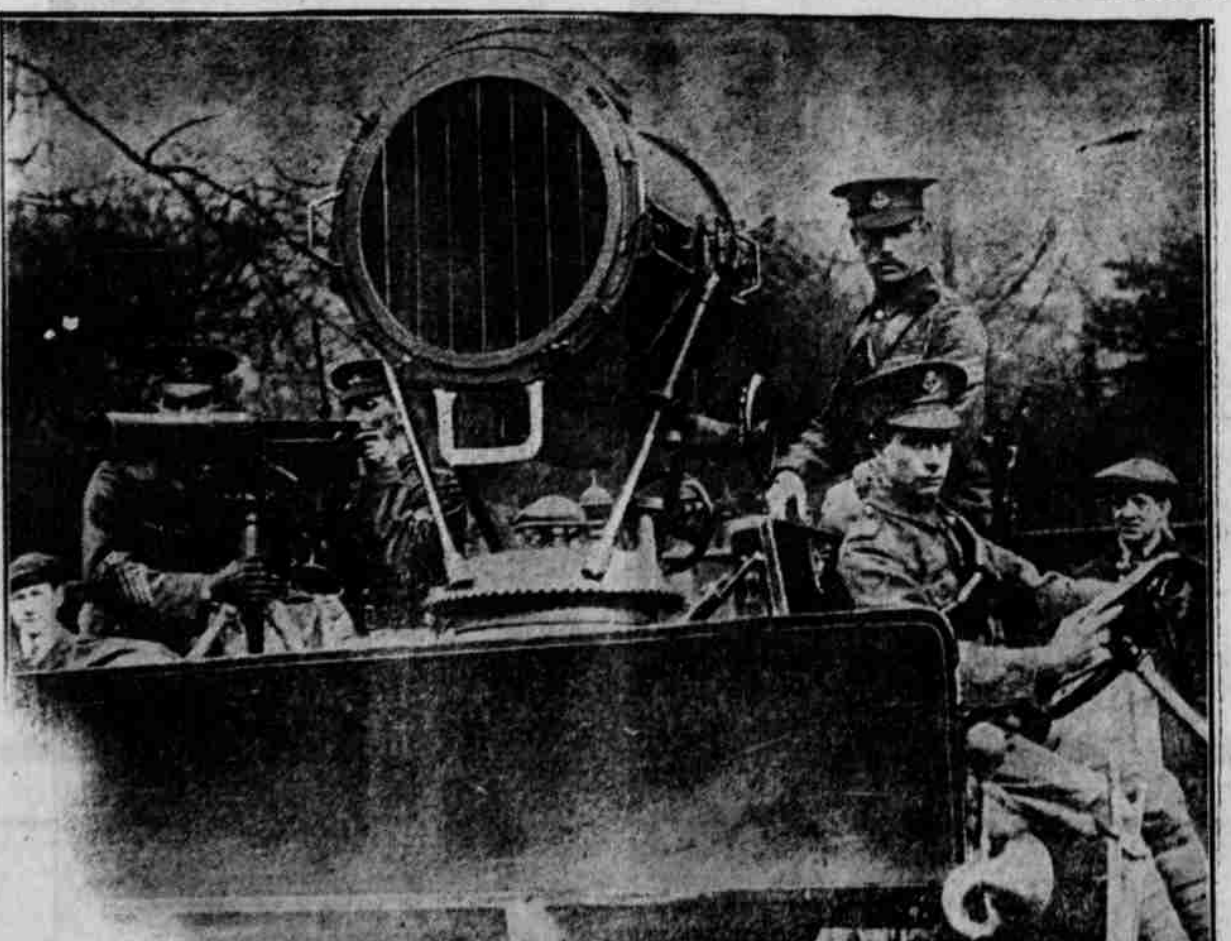

GERMAN RAPID FIRE GUN READY TO SHOOT WITH AID OF SEARCHLIGHT



The German army is equipped with many automobiles bearing rapid fire guns and searchlights for use on the enemy at night. These indicate, as has already been proved by the night attacks on the Belgian, that the Germans purpose using more than twelve hours a day for their fighting. The powerful searchlights will locate an enemy's camp many hundred yards off. The rapid fire gun, which is the best the Krupp factory has turned out, can fire many bullets a minute into the sleeping troops of the enemy.
