PARIS NOW IN GRIP OF STRICT MILITARY LAW

PARIS, Aug. 22.—Paris is beginning to accept the conditions of living that have come into being since war was declared and in some respects life in the city is today more comfortable than it was during the first days of mobilization.

While there still is little movement on the streets after dark, conditions in this respect are improving. Some of the subway lines now are permitted to run up to 8:30 p. m. and the tramways up to 10 p. m.

In the daytime the streets of the capital are quieter; such tranquility has not been known before in years. The reason is that more than one-half of the vehicular traffic has disappeared.

The governor of the city has reiterated his instructions to the effect that no one may keep a stock of absinthe in his residence. Any one suspected of drinking absinthe in secret is liable to have his domicile searched.

The military law as it is administered in Paris is much more severe in its ethical judgments than is customary in the gay city. The military censors, besides preventing the sale of drinks in bars, have also issued an order against gambling, while the programs of the moving picture theaters must be submitted in advance and pictures of doubtful morals are carefully excised.

The great park at St. Cloud, which was the scene of a German bombardment in 1871, has been turned into a pasture by the military authorities and 20,000 or 30,000 cattle and sheep are to graze in the historic grounds.

COAL SHORTAGE EXPECTED.

Advance in Price May Result From Exodus of Miners to War.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 22.—Coal prices during the coming fall and winter probably will advance from 50 to 75 cents a ton to the consumer in Spokane, over present quotations as the indirect result of the European war. Hundreds of foreign workmen are leaving the mines which supply Spokane and going east with the hope of joining the armies of their native lands.

A general stringency in the supply of coal will occur throughout the Northwest as the result, predicts F. A. Dawes, president of the Western Fuel association. Seven coal districts serve this section, of which Spokane is the clearing house as well as for the Northwest.

More coal is distributed from this point than from any other city in Washington, Oregon or Montana. At present the operators are compelled to lessen their output at a season when ordinarily the mines are worked to the limit.

Snake Bite Is Fatal.

BURNS, Ore., Aug. 22.—William T. Wiley, aged 45, met death Sunday night at his homestead near Princeton, 40 miles southeast of Burns, as a result of being bitten on the hand by a rattlesnake Saturday.

The reptile struck him between the thumb and forefinger of the right hand and he had no medical assistance until nearly 32 hours after the occurrence.

Mr. Wiley was a barber by trade and had taken up a homestead near Princeton, where a wife and two daughters survive.

LAWRENCE'S STRIKE MAYOR SUCCEEDS TO OPERATION

LAWRENCE, Mass., Aug. 22.—Mayor Michael A. Scanlon, who was the city's chief executive during the big textile mill strikes in 1912, died today, following an operation on his head. He was serving his second term. Mr. Scanlon was born in Halifax, N. S., forty-three years ago.

Ten days after he took office in January, 1912, a strike started, under the leadership of the Industrial Workers of the World, which soon made idle 20,000 workers, most of them non-English speaking.

Clashes between mobs and the soldiers and police were frequent, resulting in the deaths of two persons and the subsequent trial and acquittal of Joseph J. Ettor and two other strike leaders on murder charges.

Coming in the middle of an unusually severe winter, there was much hardship. Hundreds of children were sent to other cities to be cared for. Hearings on conditions in Lawrence were held before a congressional committee, and the city became the center of sociological investigation. In March the strike was called off, the workers winning many of their demands.

One of the closing incidents was a parade of Industrial Workers of the World, in which a banner was borne with the inscription: "No God, No Master." On Oct. 12 a counter demonstration was made under the direction of Mayor Scanlon in which 30,000 men, women and children marched through the streets, each one bearing an American flag.

An effort to recall Mayor Scanlon failed and he was returned to office. His exertions during the labor troubles greatly weakened him.

STRANGE SHIP SIGHTED.

Beaver Passes Unusual Looking Craft off Hecla Head.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22.—Standing 20 miles off shore and steaming in a general northerly direction, a strange vessel was sighted by the steamer Beaver at 6:30 p. m. Wednesday off Hecla Head. First Officer Parker, of the Beaver, who was on watch, said that the stranger was in sight for over an hour and while at first she stood in toward the Beaver, apparently her identity was established and she again stood seaward. To all appearances the vessel was a coal burner and, while small, the fact she had a boom-rigged aft and a fagg forward distinguished her from a coaster.

The Beaver was on a course about 15 miles off the land the stranger was abreast between four and five miles when nearest, yet no signals were exchanged. Mr. Parker did not believe she was a whaler and her general appearance excited curiosity.

Off Cape Blanco a school of whales porpoises and small salmon was sighted and the number of leviathans was variously estimated at from 60 to 100. The weather had been fair up to that time, but for about six hours after passing Blanco there was a heavy northwest sea and seasickness increased accordingly. There were 264 passengers on the ship.

There were more than fifty vessels of all types from the large ocean going gasoline cruisers and the schooner yachts to the smaller cabin motor boats and sailboats. Commodore Arthur W.
