INDICATIONS NOW POINT TO LARGER ATTENDANCE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Aug. 24.—That 142 letters of inquiry from prospective students were received by the registrar on one day last week, is taken as an indication that the higher standard of admission to the Agricultural College is in no wise going to decrease the attendance. Indeed this number of inquiries is a record for the College, and coming as it does so early in the season, indicates that the attendance will be greatly increased during the coming school year.

Included in the letters of inquiry were 22 containing credentials for admission. Such credentials are generally not received in large numbers prior to September first, at which time many school principals return from their vacation and make ready to forward students' certificates of eligibility. Another indication of the public's approval of the higher standard of admission is the increased number of transfers from other Colleges and Universities.

While the majority of the credentials are from different counties of Oregon, 12 other states and three foreign countries are represented in the day's mail. The states from which credentials are sent are as follows: California, Washington, Idaho, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arizona, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Montana, Minnesota, Illinois and Ohio. The foreign countries represented in the list are Canada, India and China.

Liner to Race Enemy.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—Japan's declaration of war against Germany has not altered the sailing time of the Toyo Kisen Kaisha steamer Shinyo Maru. The big liner is scheduled to sail for Japan with 200 passengers and with more than 2000 tons of merchandise in her hold. It is probable that the ship will steam not to Nagasaki, where she will be overhauled thoroughly. Passengers for more distant points will be transferred there, it is said. It is considered probable that the Shinyo Maru and other ships of the same line will be utilized by the Japanese government as transports or auxiliary cruisers.

U. S. GUNS HELP BRING PEACE IN SAN DOMINGO

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Peace plans, supported by the guns of American warships and a regiment of marines, have been agreed upon by the warring factions in the dominion republic. News of the special peace commission sent to the island by President Wilson came to the state department and the Dominican legation, though no details of the agreement were announced.

It is announced that provisional president will be named to succeed President Bordas, whose authority has gradually weakened before the revolutionists since the revolt which lost Puerto Plata to the government early this year.

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San Girt Shoot On.

SE AGIRT, N. J., Aug. 24.—Selected sharpshooters with rifle and revolver, representing the organized militia of New England and Middle Atlantic states and the District of Columbia and the United States Infantry, Cavalry and Marine Corps, will compete in the twenty-fourth annual San Girt shooting tournament which opened today on New Jersey's range. Other organizations entered are Rifle Association of America, the New Jersey Rifle Association, the New York Rifle Association, and the American Association of International Rifleman. The matches will end September 2. The winners will be followed September 3-4 by Divisional Competition A of the national matches, heretofore since 1908, held as a unit here or at Camp Perry.
