Home Hints and Recipes

Boiled Eggs.

Hard boiled eggs lend themselves to a variety of ways of decoration. For boiled fish or that covered with sauce the following is suitable: Hard boil two eggs, then divide each in half carefully, taking out the yolk. Cut a little white off the bottom of each cup, so that it may stand well, then fill them with chopped parsley.

When the fish had been dished up place the yolks in a gravy strainer, then press them through with a wooden spoon; they will fall like a shower of golden dust upon the fish. In conclusion be careful to send the fish to table really hot.

CATHOLIC WOMEN FORESTERS MEET

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—The Women's Catholic Order of Foresters opened its annual national convention in the Hotel La Salle here today. Eleven hundred delegates were present, representing 70,000 members of the organization in 32 states.

Archbishop Edward Quigley, high chaplain of the order, was the principal speaker at the opening session. Other speakers were the Rt. Rev. Alexander J. McGavick, auxiliary bishop of Chicago, and Very Rev. Francis X. McCabe, president of De Paul university. There will be a solemn requiem high mass at St. Mary's church tomorrow morning, in memory of deceased members of the order.

Indian Lives Over Century.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Aug. 25.—Case, aged 112 as near as he could figure, said to be the oldest Indian in southern California, is dead.

CRACK GOLFERS PLAY FOR WESTERN TITLE

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 25.—Some of the best amateur and professional golf stars of the country were among the entrants when play started today in the western open championships to continue for two days over the links of the Interlachen Country club. Cash prizes amounting to \$735 were to be distributed among the winners. Coming one week after the national event at Midlothian, the tourney here attracted many of the prominent stars who competed at Midlothian.

Play is at seventy-two hole medal competition, thirty-six holes to be played today and the same tomorrow. The winner will receive \$300 in cash and a golf medal emblematic of the title. The second prize is \$200, the third prize \$100, the fourth \$65 and the fifth \$50. The players making the lowest score for any round of 18 holes will receive \$25 in cash.

War Affects Radium Production.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The European war has for the present at least, totally closed the European market to American radium ores. As is well known, the uranium ores of Colorado and Utah are sold exclusively for their radium content, so little use being known for the uranium that the ores can not be sold for their content of that element. The closure of the European market leaves but one known buyer, so that while the war lasts and probably for some time afterwards the market will be restricted and without the benefit of competition.

Had the bills introduced in congress been passed, the United States government would probably also have been in the market as a buyer, and the miner might have had at least the choice between two purchasers.

Dies at Age of 118.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 25.—Capt. Goddard Ezekiel D. Diamond, who, according to his own statements, was 118 years old, died here. He claimed to have been born in Plymouth, Mass. in 1796. His father was a veteran of the war of 1812 and he himself served in the civil war, enlisting in St. Louis in the commissary department.

His longevity he attributed to his consumption of much vegetable oil.

POPE PIUS IN THE VATICAN WITH OTHER PRELATES



One of the last acts of Pope Pius was the issue of this proclamation to Catholics all over the world:

"At this moment, when nearly the whole of Europe is being dragged into the vortex of a most terrible war with its present dangers and miseries and the consequences to follow, the very thought of which must strike every one with grief and horror, we whose care is the life and welfare of so many citizens and peoples, cannot but be deeply moved and our heart wrung with the bitterest sorrow. "And in the midst of this universal confusion and peril, we feel and know that both fatherly love and apostolic ministry demand of us that we should with all earnestness turn the thoughts of Christendom thither 'whence cometh help'—to Christ, the Prince of Peace, and the most powerful mediator between God and man. "We charge, therefore, the Catholics of the whole world to approach the throne of grace and mercy, and more especially the clergy, whose duty furthermore it will be to make in every parish, as their bishops shall direct, public supplication so that the merciful God may, as it were, be wearied with the prayers of His children and speedily remove the evil causes of war, giving to them who rule to think the thoughts of peace and not of affliction."

GERMAN IS READY TO SAIL.

Vessel Reported to Have 10,000 Tons of Coal Cleared for Norway. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 25.—The North German Lloyd steamship Brandenburg took out clearance papers for Bergen, Norway, and will sail for that port. There has been much activity aboard ship for several days and it is said that 10,000 tons of coal has been delivered to her. This has been placed even in the state-rooms and on deck.

The captain explains that this big supply is necessary because it will require two months to steam to Bergen. It also is said that enough provisions have been taken on board to feed the crew for a year.

Mystery surrounding the ship has led to many conjectures concerning her future. It is reported she will try to deliver the coal to German warships cruising in this vicinity or else will proceed to Germany and become a hospital ship.

FRENCH COURTS JUST EVEN TO THE GERMANS

PARIS, Aug. 25.—The French military authorities and the prefect of police, Celestin Hennon, are exercising generous discretion with respect to the Germans and Austrians now in Paris. Many of those who have resided for a long time in the city will be allowed to remain with their families instead of being quartered in western and southern France. The public prosecutor, A. Monnet, requested the criminal court to acquit a German named Vogt, who had been arrested on suspicion of being a spy. The charge was not proved. "Justice in France must be applied," said M. Monnet, "even toward our implacable enemies."

Methodist Clergymen to Meet

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 25.—More than 200 Methodist clergymen and laymen from all parts of California will gather in Oakland for the week beginning September 23, to attend the state conference of the Methodist

Episcopal church. The Oakland convention, which is the first one in thirty years to be held outside of Pacific Grove, will hold sessions in the First Methodist church, Bishop F. J. McDonald of Denver presiding.

"The Oakland convention will be greater in scope and attendance than any previous state convention," says the Rev. George White, pastor of the First Methodist church. "Many of the world's greatest orators and missionaries will participate in this gathering."

BIG NEW CITY HALL WILL BE DEDICATED

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 25.—Oakland's new \$2,000,000 city hall will be formally dedicated on Admission Day, September 9.

The building has been nearly four years in the course of construction, and is considered by experts to be one of the finest municipal buildings in the country. Several of the city departments have already taken possession of their permanent quarters and those now housed in the city hall annex will be moved at once.

The dedicatory exercises will take the form of a band concert, addresses by prominent men and an inspection of the building by the public.

DANGER MONEY ASKED BY CREW OF A LINER

LONDON, Aug. 25.—The sailors, firemen and stewards of the Atlantic transport line steamer, Minnewaska when about to leave London with 250 passengers for New York, went on strike and demanded "danger" money on account of the risk they were taking in crossing the Atlantic. The trouble was arranged and the boat sailed.

Hunter Fatally Injured.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 25.—Ralph Stahl, 40 years old, a rancher, was shot and fatally wounded while hunting.

WORKING TO IMPROVE COMPENSATION LAW

SCHNECTADY, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Discussion of further improvement of the workmen's compensation law, and the best means for defending it from any possible hostile legislative attacks was the important work before the annual convention of the State Federation of Labor which opened here today. Delegates representing all the unionized trades from every section of the state were present when the convention was called to order in Red Men's Hall.

Early Copper Discovery.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The Grand Gulch mining region of Mohave county, Arizona, is the subject of a short report by J. M. Hill, of the United States Geological Survey, published as Bulletin 589-D. Copper is the mineral which has resulted in the development of the district, and, according to Mr. Hill, the original Grand Gulch ore deposit was discovered about 60 years ago, although it was probably known to the Indians before that time. Since 1906 it has afforded a continuous production, and the total output is estimated at \$500,000. Mr. Hill's report is the result of a few days' examination of the geology of the region and the mines, which he briefly describes with accompanying sketch maps. A copy of this report may be obtained on application to the Director United States Geological Survey, Washington, D. C.

Men Stenographers Test.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—A shortage of men stenographers in Uncle Sam's civil service last caused a general examination today in all principal cities to fill "holes" in the departmental service. Entrance salaries are from \$70 to \$75 a month. Many bureau chiefs here still refuse to have women typists.

Suffrage Bill is Lost.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 25.—Parliament has rejected a bill to extend woman suffrage.

PRICES ON DRUGS SOAR AS RESULT OF THE WAR

LOCAL DRUGGISTS FEEL EFFECTS OF GENERAL ADVANCES ON GOODS.

More than any other line the drug business is affected by the European war and according to local druggists wholesale prices on almost all lines have advanced from 10 to 300 per cent. Chemicals are particularly affected as the bulk of such articles come from Europe, largely from Germany.

Here are some instances showing how the drug market has been affected.

Peroxide, a commonly used product, is advanced 50 per cent in price. This because peroxide is made from barium salts which are found chiefly in England and Scotland. Canary seed which comes wholly from Germany has advanced 300 per cent. Synthetics and oils used in perfumes come chiefly from Switzerland and are all advanced in price. Aspirin which is used for headaches and rheumatism comes from Germany and since the war started has advanced 50 per cent. Russian oil which comes from Russian territory has advanced 100 per cent. Toilet articles have been generally advanced 50 per cent. Carbolic acid is up 50 per cent in price. The remedy 606 has been advanced 25 per cent. Opium and cocaine, which comes from the orient not from Europe are advanced 50 per cent. Citric acid, which comes from Sicily, has advanced 100 per cent in cost. Cream of Tartar which comes largely from France is up 50 per cent. Camphor which is secured from China and Japan has risen 50 per cent. Glycerine, though made in the United States, is up 20 per cent. Gum tragacanth which is secured from Asia has advanced 200 per cent.

Wholesale houses have all advanced their prices even with reference to stocks on hand. This advance is excused on the plea that when the war is over there will be a decline in prices and that those with stocks on hand will then suffer losses through the decline.

Iowa Postmasters Meet.

AMES, Iowa, Aug. 25.—Postmasters of all Iowa third and fourth-class offices met here today for a four day annual convention. They were also enjoying "leave with pay."
