Library News

Reviews of new books placed in circulation today:

Crawford—Thinking black. "The author, a missionary for twenty-two years in the long grass of Central Africa, reveals the workings of the black man's mind, with its superstition, subtlety, and logical drift; the gruesome customs, the native life, the horrors of Portuguese administration, and at times something of his own personal work. A man of reflection and scholarship, he writes brilliantly, with a strange, with pity interjections and striking phrases. Many good illustrations."

Gutierrez de Lara—The Mexican people: their struggle for freedom. "This book is deliberately given the title of 'The Mexican people: their struggle for freedom.' We know that to the average mind Mexico and freedom seem almost antithetical; that is why we wrote this book. The Mexican people have democratic traditions as grand, pure and sane as those of any race in the world. Like all peoples, they have suffered bitter oppression at the hands of their master class, but unlike the majority of peoples their weakness has made of them the peculiar prey of the foreign exploiter as well. For a hundred years they have maintained the bloodiest, most heroically abandoned fight for their liberties not only against their own master class but against that master class leagued with Spain, with the United States, with France and with England. We have long wished to tell of this struggle. It constitutes one of the most exalted dreams of the social progress. If by this book, wrought out amidst many difficulties, we shall awaken the spirit of brotherhood and understanding in the hearts of some for the battling proletariat of Mexico our work will not have been without reward."

Haakin—Panama canal. "The primary purpose of this book is to tell the layman the story of the Panama canal. It is written, therefore, in the simplest manner possible. The temptation to turn aside into the pleasant paths of the romantic history of ancient Panama has been resisted; there is no attempt to dispose of political problems that incidentally concern the canal; in short the book is confined to the story of the canal itself, and the things that are directly and vitally connected with it."

The book has many illustrations from photographs and Colonel Goethals, who read the chapters dealing with the engineering features, adds a note testifying to their accuracy and dependability. Also discusses the fortifications, tolls, permanent operating force, handling the traffic and the Panama-Pacific exposition. Good illustrations and map.

Reed—Everyday luncheons. One thousand salads. What to have for breakfast. "Those who enjoy Myrtle Reed's stories will be interested to know that she has written some very clever cook books under the pseudonym 'Olive Green.' The above titles are attractively printed and bound in blue checked gingham."

Vedder—Socialism and the ethics of Jesus. "An investigation with a three fold aim, namely, to sketch briefly the history of socialist principles and parties in modern times; to examine with sufficient thoroughness the fundamental principles of present day socialism; to inquire in what respects these principles correspond to the ethics of Jesus, and where-in the two differ. This volume is excellently written, logically arranged, and makes a well-rounded discussion from the standpoint of a Christian socialist."

Ward—Montessori method and the American school. "The author spent some time in Rome, making a special study of Montessori's work, and since her return has put many of its principles into practice in her own work as professor of kindergarten education at Iowa state college. Miss Ward takes up the method from the practical aspect of its application to American schools. She goes into the matter thoroughly, answering questions which every kindergarten and primary worker is asking. She makes connections between Montessori and the work of Dewey, Parker and other American educators. The many summaries, comparisons and questions make it suitable for normal work."

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 26.—Play began this morning on the Casino courts to decide the interscholastic tennis championship of the United States, with fully 7000 spectators in the stands. All competitions, as arranged by the National Lawn Tennis Association, will be the best three out of five sets.

UNIVERSAL EIGHT HOUR WORK DAY IN SPOTLIGHT

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 26.—A great deal of discussion is being devoted today to a discussion of a measure providing for the "universal eight hour day," in the state of Washington, which has been initiated by the socialist party.

The measure provides that eight hours shall constitute a day's work except in agricultural pursuits, where ten hours shall prevail when necessary to care for crops.

COL. MCCAIN CHOSEN FOR ADJUTANT GENERAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—President Wilson nominated Colonel Henry P. McCain to be Adjutant General with the rank of Brigadier General, vice Adjutant General George Andrews, to be retired.

MONACO RULER'S SON JOINS FRENCH CAVALRY

PARIS, Aug. 26.—Prince Louis of Monaco, son of the reigning prince of Monaco has been authorized to serve in the French cavalry as a lieutenant under the name of M. de Monaco.

LOUVRE RECIPIENT OF GREAT COLLECTION

PARIS, Aug. 26.—The Louvre received an art collection worth \$20,000,000, from the estate of Baron Schlichting, a Russian, long resident of Paris who died recently.

British Are Hard Pressed.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—"We have heard this morning from Sir John French, commander of the British forces on the continent," Premier Asquith informed the members of the house of commons, "that the withdrawal of this troops to a new position was successfully effected. It was not accomplished without considerable loss. They were hard pressed by the enemy, who, however, were shaken off."

It is not desirable to say anything more at the present moment, except that the Field Marshal reports that, in spite of hard marching and hard fighting, the British forces are in the best of spirits.

"He estimates the casualties at something over 2000, but we have not yet received any names."

Battle on South Border.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A dispatch to the Express from Ostend says: "A great battle has been in progress in the Province of Hainaut, on the southern frontier of Belgium, since Friday evening. French and British troops have been engaged in desperate conflicts north of Charleroi and Fleurus with Germans who crossed the Meuse at Huy."

"Saturday French troops which had spread from Lille met the German right in East Flanders."

Attack on Louvre Failed. LONDON, Aug. 26.—A Paris dispatch to the Standard says that the authorities at the Louvre have removed the Venus de Milo and other art treasures, gems and state jewels to the vaults.

They have also strengthened the roofs of all the picture galleries with sandbags and other protection against an aeroplane bomb attack.

King Sits on Powder Keg.

ROME, Aug. 26.—Reports are conflicting as to whether Prince William has abandoned Albania.

It was stated here that his leaving would cause no surprise as his situation already difficult before the outbreak of the war, must have become quite impossible, when, owing to the necessities of the international complications, Austria, Italy and the other powers were obliged to withdraw any support which helped to maintain him at Durazzo.

Americans Join Canada.

VALCARTIER, Que., Aug. 26.—With the arrival of about 300 troops from all parts of Canada, the mobilization camp here has reached a strength of approximately 15,000 of officers and men, more than one-half of Canada's over-seas expeditionary force.

Many in the ranks are militiamen from the United States. Some came from as far as New Orleans, Denver and San Francisco.

WOMAN GIVES COIN TO DIG ANCIENT CITY

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—An American woman, whose name he is not set at liberty to make public, according to announcement of the Rev. Dr. S. Edward Young, pastor of Bedford Presbyterian church, Brooklyn, has given an amount necessary to build a narrow gauge railway into the ruins of the ancient city of Antioch, in western Asia, and a sufficient sum to carry on these excavations that are expected to furnish new light on New Testament history.

\$50,000,000 IS VOTED BY CANADA FOR WAR

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 26.—A war appropriation of \$50,000,000 was put through the Canadian house of commons. There was no opposition or criticism.

The Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden, explained that the sum was required in financing the military organization which Canada has offered the British government and the vote was approved.

The proceedings occupied just one minute.

BOY SCOUTS OF FRANCE PUT UNDER WAR OFFICE

PARIS, Aug. 26.—The Boy Scouts of France, some thousands of them from nine to fifteen years old, have felt hurt because, although they were carrying messages for the Red Cross, they were not under orders from the war office.

Adolphe Messimy, the French war minister, has now taken them directly under his direction. They are still serving the Red Cross admirably in carrying messages, but they feel that they are in the military service as are their fathers.

NEHALEM FARMER IS DROWNED IN RIVER

NEHALEM, Ore., Aug. 26.—O. A. Lowman, 65 years old, was drowned in the river when a horse he was driving got stuck in the mud while making a ford. Lowman who was a pioneer, extricated himself and tried to swim to safety, but he evidently took cramps and went down. His body was recovered. The horse was lost.

TEITON WAR CAPTIVE ARE SENT TO ENGLAND

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A dispatch to the Reuter Telegraph company from Bruges says that eighteen German officers and 432 men prisoners of war have been sent away from that city via Dunkirk for England. When they left Bruges they were escorted by a dozen gendarmes with fixed bayonets.
