Home Hints and Recipes

The Tango Set.

Every girl—under 50—tangoes now. If you know one whose birthday occurs this month present her with a tango set, which includes several articles she will take delight in using this summer. First and foremost in the tango set, is a fan—for summer nights are warm and the new dances are strenuous. One of the inex-

ensive paper fans with a flower design and sticks of carved wood will answer; or a gauze fan, spangled or plain. In either case the fan should depend from a long chain of white beads, tiny ones, like seed pearls.

A vanity pocket of flowered silk, containing diminutive powder puff, a bit of chamois to mop a perspiring brow, and one of the small, flat boxes of cake rouge, will be another item of the summertango set. Such a pocket should be rather flat, with an envelope flap and snap button fastening. Some girls saw a snap button to the outer side of the vanity pocket and also to the braziere, inside the loose bodice near the belt, so that the vanity case is always close at hand, yet quite invisible.

A corsage bouquet is another acceptable feature of the tango set. It is difficult to obtain cultivated flowers in the country or by the sea, unless one sends to town for them. Even then, violets, gardenias, roses and orchids are difficult to obtain in midsummer, when there is little market for these exotic blooms. So a corsage bouquet, fresh and dainty in condition—for raveled out violets, smudged gardenias and flattened silk roses do not add to the effect of an evening gown—will be most acceptable to any woman.

A pair of adjustable shoe trees, covered with shirred ribbon will complete the tango set. Satin slippers—even kid slippers will keep their shape and last longer, especially in summer. If shoe trees are slipped into them the moment they are removed from the warm, damp foot.

An Impromptu Vase.

One of the innumerable inventions as the outcome of necessity in the words of the old adage is an impromptu flower pot or vase covering made from blotting paper. Some-

times one may chance only to have a cup, even a bottle, a baking powder can or a tin pail, when a blossom or a bunch of wild flowers is at hand, as when traveling, in a bungalow, a summer boarding place or even at an office desk.

A piece of leaf green blotting paper cut tall enough to support the stems, pinned, glued or fastened in a cylinder with letter clips, and stood over any homely receptacle which will hold water becomes a pleasing flower holder, in effect.

Hence a few sheets of green blotting paper may not come amiss, if packed in the bottom of a trunk when starting for a summer outing.

Health and Beauty.

Olive oil is now being used to allay sunburn. It is applied the same as cold cream. It relieves the burning sensation and keeps the skin from blistering.

Mosquito bites may be rendered speedily painless by rubbing the place with a piece of soap slightly moistened to produce a lather, which is allowed to dry.

Never force children to eat when they are hot and tired; let them cool down a little first. For this reason an interval should always be allowed between work or playtime and the meal, and the nurse or governess must be instructed to bring the youngsters home at least twenty minutes before the actual meal time and in a leisurely manner. Hurrying on the "late for dinner" cry upsets both temper and digestion. If a child seems tired when it arrives, sponge its face and hands and let it lie down for a few minutes before the meal. If it falls asleep don't wake it; rest is more necessary than food at the moment and give a light meal later.

Warships Going to Gulf.

GALVESTON, Tex., Aug. 28.—An official statement from the British consulate here said three British warships had been sent at full speed to protect cotton and oil traffic in the Gulf of Mexico. Consul Perceval said:

"Our information is official and not from private sources."

WAY TO GET DYE SOUGHT.

American Textile Industry Needs German Product.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Every effort will be made by the United States government to reopen the way for importation of German dyes and chemicals, the lack of which threatens to throw a million American textile workers out of employment.

Representative Metz of New York, told Secretary Bryan that without these imported colors the government would be unable to print its stamps and currency, as the acid-proof pro-

ducts of the German plants could not be reproduced in this country.

A report to the state department from Frankford today announced that the Rhine was open from Frankfurt to Rotterdam, so it is hoped that shipments from the German plants to the United States can be made in Dutch vessels.

If necessary, Representative Metz may go to Europe as a special representative of the state department to arrange for the shipment of the chemicals.

French Surgery Better.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—Dr. Olexis Carrel of the Rockefeller Institute, New York, who is in charge of the hospital at Lyons, has written to Frederick R. Coudert here the following letter:

"The French wounded arriving here daily are in good condition. They have no fever and the manner in which their wounds are dressed and the state of the wounds prove that the surgical service at the front works in splendid good order.

"A number of German wounded also are arriving. They receive exactly the same care and attention as the French. It seems certain that the German method of dressing wounds is not so good as the French method, because most of their wounds are infected."

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 28.—The Canadian Pacific will resume trans-Pacific service on regular schedule October 15, when the Empress of India will sail from Vancouver for the Orient. The Empress of Asia and Empress of Russia are in the Orient, held by the British government for transports.

The Harrison line steamers will begin regular service between the Pacific coast and England through the Panama canal the latter part of September, making the voyage between Liverpool and Seattle in 47 days.

Improvement associations make a great mistake when they attack weeds just because they are weeds."
