ANOTHER RABBIT HUNT TO BE AT HERMISTON

Another big rabbit shoot will be held tomorrow near Hermiston, according to Arthur G. Means of Umatilla, who is here today and who is planning on attending the shoot. It will be held on the Herbert Strahm place across the river, the same place where one was held during the fore part of the week and at which about 2500 of the long-eared pests were killed.

Means attended the previous shoot and declares the sport was the best he has ever had. Shotguns were used, the men, about 25 in number, keeping in line in order to avoid accidents. The lay of the land near the Strahm land is such that a few horsemen can drive the little animals right to the hunters who thus enjoy the sport without wearing themselves with a long walk. Shells are furnished at 40 cents a box so that the shoot will not bankrupt the hunters.

Countries Centure Allies.
PARIS, Aug. 29.—The English and French censors appear to be as busy on news passed by one or the other of the allies official news bureaus as on the dispatches of the newspaper correspondents.

The British censors stop parts of official communications issued by the war office in Paris and the French censors appear to have delayed, on two or three occasions, announcements made in the house of commons regarding the situation of the armies.

The French censorship, however, seems less severe than that in England on news originating in France.

Unseen For Kills Sentry.
MONTREAL, Aug. 29.—Sixteen-year-old Gordon Bettes, private in the Fifth Royal Highlanders, was shot in the eye and killed by an unseen assailant while on sentry duty at the canal at Soutlanges.

Soldiers at Soutlanges guarding the canal have been fired on repeatedly during the last few days.

TERRIBLE MASSACRES ARE REPORTED IN INTERIOR CHINA

SHANGHAI, Aug. 29.—Conditions of disorder in interior China such as did not characterize even in the revolutionary period preceding the Manchurian overthrow two and a half years ago were reported today by foreigners who arrived here from Hankow and other up-country points.

Throughout Honan, Hupoh, Shanxi, Szechuan and Anhwei provinces, they said brigandage is rampant on such a scale that cities even of 200,000 and 300,000 population are unsafe from attack. Scores of smaller towns have been sacked. Frightful massacres have been perpetrated and loot worth millions have been carried off.

Bodies of troops aggregating 25,000 or 25,000 in number are in the field against the outlaws and there have been dozens of skirmishes and a few tolerably respectable battles, in which the bandits have held their own as often as they have been beaten. No quarter is shown on either side, the victors invariably beheading their prisoners and in some cases torturing before killing them.

Opponents of the President Yuan Shi Kai's government are said to be endeavoring to be encouraging the bandits' activity, to be supplying quantities of arms and ammunition and to be doing their utmost to weld the numerous bands into a single force for another revolution.

In southern China revolutionary agents are busy in the vicinity of Canton and piracy on the West river has reached such proportions that even foreign shipping is endangered.

\$400,000 Raised in Hour.
LONDON, Aug. 29.—A Boulogne dispatch to the Standard says that the town of Tournai, capital of the department of Hainaut, Belgium, occupied by the Germans, was compelled to pay an indemnity of \$400,000 within an hour the burgomaster being held as a hostage until the money was paid.

German military officers also imposed a fine of \$200,000 on the Belgian town of Charleroi.

HAY FEVER SEASON OFFICIALLY OPENED

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Through-out the length and breadth of the land, the official hay fever season will open tomorrow to the accompaniment of approximately 635,427 sneezes. (That's the number of hay fever victims who are said to suffer annually in the United States).

There may have been numerous hay fever sneezes heard previous to today, but these were merely desultory sneezes. They were, so to speak, the advance guard of the forces which will open with the heavy artillery of sneezes tomorrow.

By some strange fate or law of nature which as yet is not explained the victims of this obnoxious malady some times after the date, according to many victims, they are attacked. It is about the time when the pollen from dandelions and other growths begin to float through the air, and it is the presence of these all but invisible tiny particles in the atmosphere that causes the hay fever. Only after the first frost do the majority of sufferers get relief from constant sneezing and other uncomfortable effects of hay fever.

ARMED AUTOS WIPE OUT GERMAN SQUAD

LONDON, Aug. 28.—A Central News dispatch from Amsterdam says that a large detachment of German cavalry suffered virtual annihilation in the suburbs of Malines, Belgium, Friday afternoon. They were met suddenly by a squad of Belgians in motor cars armed with machine guns. Most of the Germans were killed. A handful surrendered.

Stiffening Curtains.

One good tablespoonful for flour for each curtain is sufficient. Mix the flour to a thick paste with cold water; then put in the tub and pour on as much boiling water as required for rinsing the curtains.

Iron Pongee Dry.
To iron a natural colored pongee so as to preserve its beauty, iron it only when it is perfectly dry and with an iron only moderately hot, as nothing scorches quite so easily as silk. Do not sprinkle pongee, as the water spots never iron out.

EUROPEAN WAR BENEFITS CITY IN CALIFORNIA

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 29.—Proof that California will benefit commercially from the European war was given when the C. A. Smith Lumber company of Oakland received signed contracts from Japanese paper mills for several hundred thousand dollars worth of wood pulp.

The C. A. Smith company has a process of extracting pitch from pine timber and making it into wood pulp. The Asiatic market heretofore has been closed to Americans, as all pulp supplies were secured in Finland. When the war began, the Finnish ports were closed to the Japanese and their wood pulp supply was cut off. In this emergency they turned to the Oakland firm, with the result that in the future the millions formerly spent every year in Finland will now come to California.

This is by no means the only big order that the war has brought to Oakland from the Orient, and which California would not have secured except for the European hostilities. The last Toyo Kisen Kaisha liner to sail for Japan carried the following Oakland made goods on rush orders: Thirteen carloads of roofing, valued at more than \$20,000.

Twenty sets of tire shoes, steel studded and designed for armored army trucks. These were made on a cabled rush order under the special direction of a Japanese naval officer.

Carload of ink, also a Japanese government order.

The Oakland company that sold the roofing is now working on a second order larger than the first, which will be shipped as soon as possible.

Cassett's Trial by Jury, Hal Parr's the Masquerador, and the Montpelier Stable's Pixey, also were thought to have good chances.

The owners who have been racing here for the month past will have a few days rest while they ship their horses to Saratoga for the race meet which will be held there as a part of the New York fair. The Saratoga races are set for September 3, 4 and 5.

There will be one stake well worth the winning at Saratoga. This is the state fair stake for which \$5000 has been added by the owners' fund. It is a weight for age event at a mile and a quarter, and should settle finally the much mooted question of the best horse of the season, according to racing experts.

Purses of from \$400 to \$500 have been offered for each of the remaining races, of which there will be six daily.

Cables Go By America.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—All the official government correspondence between Great Britain and Japan is passing through this city, in code cable messages.

Originally the route for such messages is from London to St. Petersburg, from St. Petersburg to Vladivostok, across Siberia, and from Vladivostok to Japan.

New the route is from London to New York to San Francisco overland, thence by cable to Guam, thence by Japanese cable to Tokyo. Some of the code messages run 300 words and more in length and the correspondence is brisk.

WOMEN'S PEACE PARADES HELD IN MANY CITIES

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Women in a dozen cities throughout the country today paraded as a public protest against the European war, and as a plea to the heads of the warring nations to arbitrate. More than 1,000 women were expected to be in line in the New York parade which was arranged under the direction of Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch. It was also under the direction of Mrs. Blatch that women's organizations of other cities arranged their parades of peace.

CONDEMNATION SUIT SHOWS HOW LAND HAS INCREASED

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 29.—A condemnation suit for the purchase of land needed by the United States for an addition to the Oakland postoffice has emphasized the great increase in the value of Oakland property during the last year.

United States District Attorney John W. Preston has ordered suit brought against the three owners of property in the rear of the present Oakland postoffice building. This land is 190 by 150 feet, and some time ago the government appropriated \$115,000 for its purchase. At the time of the appropriation, that price was considered a fair one, but the deal was not closed.

Recently the government again took up the negotiations on the same price basis. But the owners insisted that so rapidly had business property in Oakland advanced during the last few months that the land was conservatively estimated by experts to be worth \$150,000, and they held out for that price, which is almost \$1000 a front foot. Other property in the same vicinity has sold for this price and higher, and the owners declare they will fight the condemnation proceedings to the highest court.
