Among the guests of the Stewart Hotel in San Francisco last week were Miss Frances Smith of this city and her sister, Mrs. A. R. Sample.

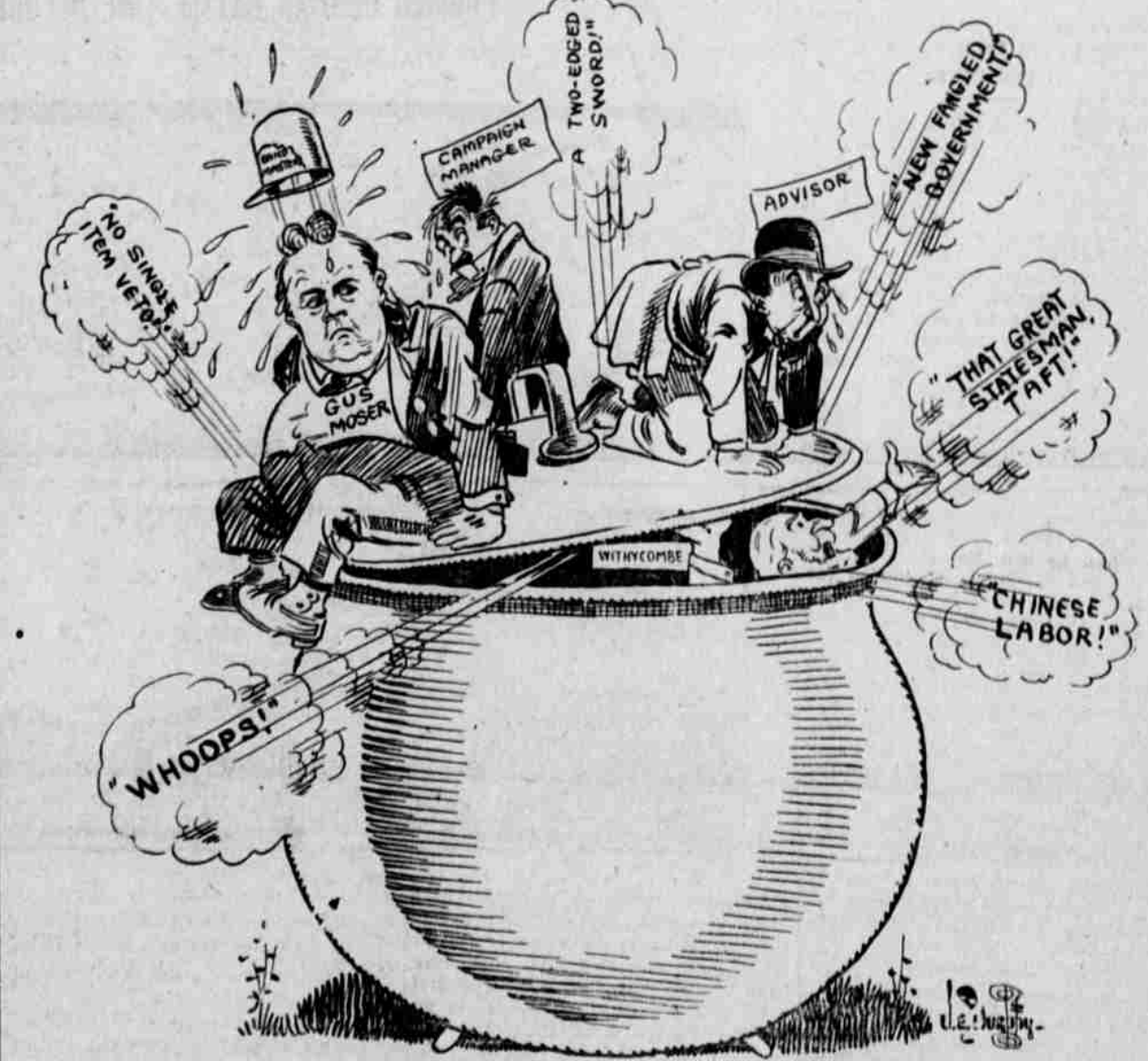

MAY ADD WING TO OLD PRINTERS' HOME

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Sept. 21.—That the board would decide to spend \$120,000 more for a new wing was the expectation today when the trustees of the Union Printers' Home began their annual meeting here. The board will be asked to decide regarding extensive plans for improvements formulated by John C. Daley, superintendent. The International Typographical Union convention recently voted to increase the per capita tax for the home from 15 to 25 cents a month per member but this will have to go to a referendum vote. This would add \$12,000 a month to the home's income.
