#### WHEAT AT STANDSTILL IN PORTLAND MARKET

#### GRANT COUNTY STOCKMAN SHIPS CATTLE TO OMAHA MARKET.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21.—(Special)—Wheat is the same as on Saturday. Bluestem \$1.03; forty fold, 96c; club, 94c; red Russian, 90c; red five, 90c.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—(Special)—Wheat closed slightly lower than the opening. At the close, September, \$1.13 1-2, December, \$1.13 1-2; May, \$1.20 5-8.

Cattle to Omaha—Illustrating the tendency on the part of cattlemen as well as sheepmen to ship their stock east because of the low prices offered in the coast markets is a five car shipment of fine beef cattle made from here to Omaha yesterday. The cattle belong to a Mr. Cummings and were driven in from Mt. Vernon. This is by no means the first shipment east as a number of big shipments were made during the summer from eastern Washington and eastern Oregon. Just a few days ago some heavy shipments were made from Idaho, one shipment of 15 cars being reported.

Market Still Inactive—The local wheat market still continues inactive with the best quotation 85 cents for club. There is almost no selling because of the fact the terminals have been temporarily choked with grain due to the inadequate shipping facilities.

Army Horses Sent East—J. D. Huston, well known horsebuyer, today shipped from Pendleton 85 head of saddle horses which are designed for army use. Mr. Huston declares Umatilla county has an unusually large number of good saddle horses.

#### DEPUTY SHERIFF GETS HIS MAN AS LATTER OPENS FIRE

#### EX-CONVICT FALLS BEFORE BULLET OF WALTER CARSON OF HEPPNER.

HEPPNER, Sept. 21.—Deputy sheriff Cason of Morrow county and marshal of Ione shot and instantly killed Charles Earheart, aged 46, an ex-convict from the Oregon penitentiary, in front of the Palace Hotel when the latter pulled a gun on the officer and cried: "Your game's up; I am going to get you."  
 Earheart, who had been drinking, shot twice wide of his mark, and before he could turn a third barrel, Cason quick as a flash, drew his revolver and, with one shot in the breast Earheart fell dead.  
 Earheart often had threatened the life of Cason, who, as marshal of Ione, arrested him the night of July 8, 1908, for "shutting up the town." At that time Earheart injured several persons, and for his escapade served five years in the Salem institution. He formerly was a saloon-keeper at Ione. Here he has been doing nothing, but of late had been drinking heavily. Earheart had no family.

#### FAMOUS SCULPTOR ARRIVES HERE TO STUDY INDIANS

#### PROCTOR, OF NEW YORK, WILL ALSO ENJOY SEEING ANNUAL ROUND-UP.

For the purpose of studying the cowboys and Indians who gather here for the Round-up, A. Philmister Proctor, celebrated New York sculptor, arrived in Pendleton yesterday from Portland where he has been for some time. Not only will he attend the Round-up, but if he succeeds in finding suitable accommodations for himself and family, contemplates remaining here until spring to pursue his studies.  
 Mr. Proctor is perhaps the foremost sculptor of animals in America and he has won a great deal of renown by his bronze work of cowboys and Indians. He won the grand prize at the Paris exposition with his statue of the Indian chieftain and his pony. He is the author of "The Bison" on the bridge at Washington, D. C., of "The Tigress" at the Princeton library, of the colossal "Pumas" at the entrance of Brooklyn Park and many other noted works.

He spent the summer among the Sioux Indians. He is very enthusiastic over the Round-up and finds his visit here already inspirational. Today he is out in the cow and sheep country with Dan P. Smythe and plans later to spend much time on the Umatilla reservation. Mr. Proctor is a guest of the Pendleton while here.
