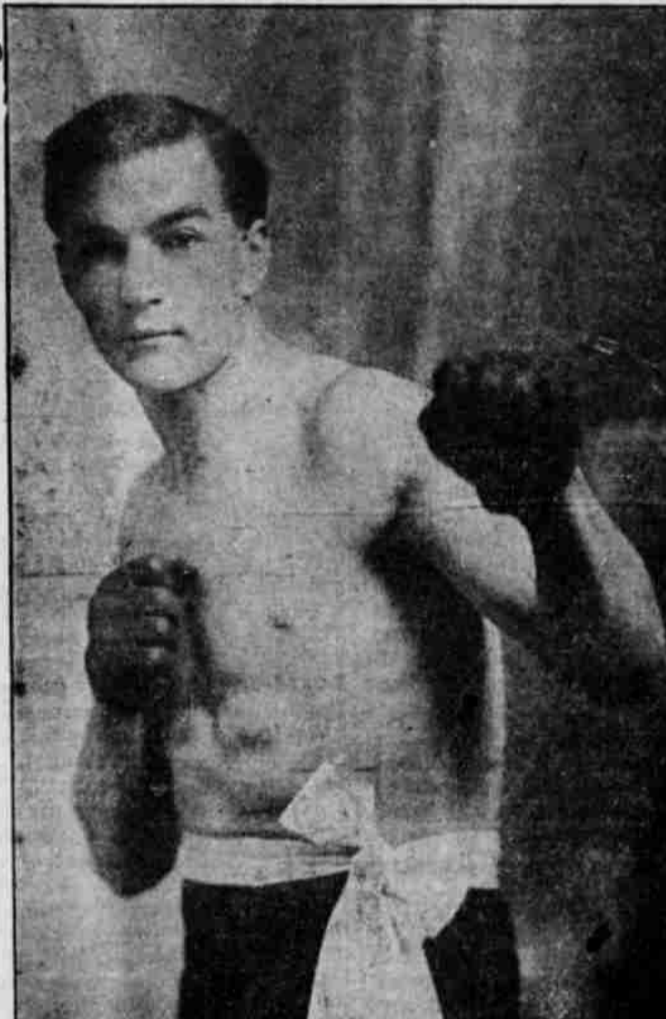

FROM THE PEOPLE

TWO WORKING CLASS MEASURES

Portland, Ore., Sept. 21.
 Editor The East Oregonian:
 In all round fairness to your readers, who hail from every walk of life, I trust you will allow me space for this description of two working-class measures now on the official ballot for consideration next election day, "Proportional Representation" (YES) No. 348, (NO) No. 349.

This plan of proportional representation creates a state wide district for voting, through the use of stickers of writing the name of the candidate on the ballot; which name appears only in the district where nomination is made and limits the vote in all districts to a choice of but one in districts where more than one name appears.

By the use of stickers in a state wide district, minority parties are permitted to conserve their votes by concentrating them upon some nominee to their particular liking, as to party principles, etc., any where in the state.

The two principal objections, in our campaign for this measure, have been found to be, first, that such a variety of ideas would tend to obstruct legislation (a God-send were it so), and the second, that logrolling would come through each faction agreeing with the other to get their measures through. It is plain to be seen that these objections contradict each other, as both objectors claim opposite results from the same cause. Their argument is therefore not worth considering.

If men and women who receive the sixty highest votes over the entire state are to represent the people it is quite certain that better legislators and better legislation will follow.

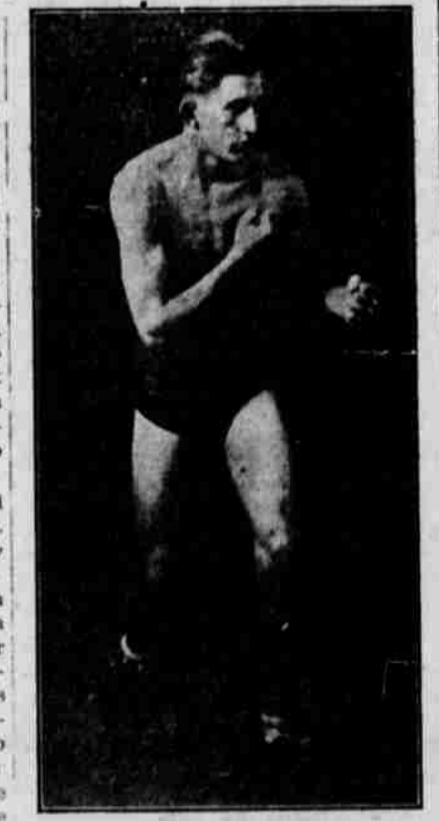
The change from voting for one nominee instead of from two to twelve in districts that have more than one is not so radical as to confuse the casting of an intelligent ballot by any one. In fact in all districts where one nominee appears on the ballot (as in the case in many districts, voters will not necessarily need to be informed of the change this amendment will make to vote intelligently, unless they be of a minority party and wish to conserve their vote by voting for a friend or party nominee in another district. The placing of an X mark before the name of the nominee or the writing of the name on the ballot of a nominee chosen from another district simplifies rather than complicates the manner of voting.

No district will fail of its representation for the reason that minority party votes will concentrate in districts that have more than one nominee and proportional representation will come out of these districts; leaving local districts with but one nominee their regular representative.

Minority representation, like minority reports in committee work should reach the people for their consideration. It is the function of the majority party, always, to manage and govern while the function of the minority is, always, to revolutionize or change. Good results must follow such representation in the assembly.

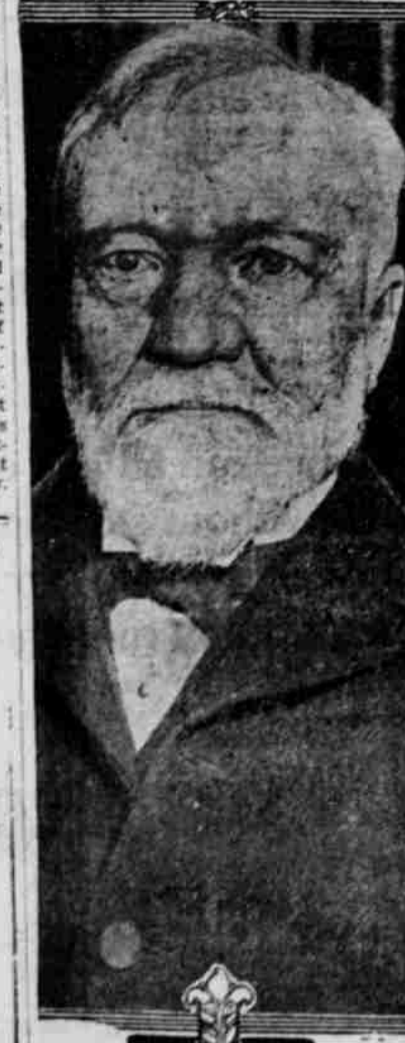
