### Rush to Recruit for the War.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—Throughout the British Isles enlistment continues unabated and a noteworthy feature is the high standard of the recruits. Students and young professional men are conspicuous in every squad seen upon the London streets. "It's a long way to Tipperary" now has become a fixed classic in this war, much in the same manner as "There'll be a hot time in the old town tonight" swept through the American army in Cuba during the Spanish-American war. Even the German prisoners interned in England have caught the fever and may be heard singing as well as they can.

## HUMANITY LEAGUE CONDEMNS KAISER

GERMAN ORGANIZATION DECLARES "UNCURBED TYRANT" WILL FAIL.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The German Humanity League has sent to the British Humanity League the following fiery denunciation of Kaiser Wilhelm's war against the world:

"We cannot at the hour refrain from sending a message of fraternal greeting to you who have foreseen and prepared for the carnage which must precede the inevitable overthrow of a military despotism too long tolerated by millions of toilers crushed by its infernal weight.

"Nakedly revealing himself, we see the uncured tyrant surrounded by his parasites now directing the most desperately selfish and selfish campaign ever waged against humanity. We know that the internal revolution now proceeding in our midst will depose the despot, whose insatiable egotism is drenching Europe with the blood of its workers and wage earners. This letter reaches you by the hand of a trusted Dutch comrade who is risking his life in the people's cause."

### Take \$40,000 Gem Thieves.

CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Two of the five alleged Chicago gunmen wanted for robbing Mrs. Nellie Clark, a Kankakee resort keeper, of diamonds valued at \$40,000, were captured in a cornfield three miles north of Mokena.

They declined to give their names, but eight diamond rings, said to be a part of the booty, were found on their persons.

A cross roads storekeeper brought word to Deputy Sheriff Rely that two suspicious looking men had come to his store and asked for food. From the description Rely recognized two men whom he came upon yesterday while searching for the bandits, and who overpowered and disarmed him. This time he was more cautious and crept upon the men and covered them with his pistol before they had a chance to take alarm.

Their three companions are believed to be in the same vicinity. Martin Nagle, a farmer living four miles north of Mokena, declares he saw them last night.

## 110 CHINESE ENTER AMERICAN COLLEGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25.—Ninety-five young men and fifteen young women, sons and daughters of the Chinese republic, arrived here recently from Hong Kong on the Pacific Mail liner China. Their expenses paid out of the Boxer indemnity fund the young Chinese, who have already acquitted themselves in preparatory schools at home, are to enter colleges in the middle west and east after a brief tour of California. After taking the courses in the American schools the party will return to their native land to teach the rising generation in China.

## WISCONSIN CONVICTS ARE USED ON ROADS

SYSTEM WORKS SUCCESSFULLY AFTER STUDY OF PRISONS IS MADE.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Wisconsin can now be numbered among the states successfully employing their convicts in road work.

Two years ago, E. Stagg Whitin, a representative of the National Committee on Prisons and Prison Labor, made a careful study of the prison system of the state, at the request of Governor McGovern and the state board of public affairs. In his report, Dr. Whitin recommended that all prisoners who can be placed on their honor should be employed out of doors in quarrying stone, clearing stump lands, and building roads.

In his message to the legislature, which followed the receipt of Dr. Whitin's report, Governor McGovern

draw attention to the successful road work in Colorado, and suggested that the legislature empower the board of control and the highway commission to try the experiment of working a limited number of convicts on the roads in the northern part of the state reporting the results of the experiment to the next session of the legislature.

The legislature of 1913 followed the suggestion of the governor and authorized the board of control and the highway commission to employ such convicts as they deemed suitable in the road work.

The summer of 1914 saw two camps established, one near Waupun and the other at Taycheedah. At the Waupun camp two and a half miles of road is now under construction, and when completed will connect Waupun and the village of Chester. The road is fifteen feet wide and of the best possible macadam construction. The men are under the honor system, wear the neat khaki uniform, and live and work exactly like a hired crew, the only guards being two unarmed experts in road building.

The success attendant upon this work points to its fullest development and to the reconstruction of Wisconsin's prison system along the lines suggested in the report made by the National Committee on Prisons and Prison Labor.

## HEROISM IN BELGRADE.

The fighting on a gigantic scale in France and between Austria and Russia has obscured a theater of war equally as dramatic if not so colossal. A cable indicates that the Austrians are still fiercely assaulting Belgrade, the capital of Serbia, and that the determination is fixed not to surrender as long as one house or one Serbian soldier is left.

An appealing feature of this particular situation is that women, too, are reported as participating in the defense of Belgrade. The fires of patriotism must be burning at a fiery heat to bring mothers and wives and daughters and sisters to the trenches, side by side with the men. It is dramatically fitting that such

tense conditions should obtain in the little Balkan country that furnished the provocation for the war that now engulfs Europe. And it is not difficult to understand the tenacity with which the Serbians are contending.

Their very national existence is in the balance. There is little question that should Germany and Austria triumph, the latter country would be permitted to "benevolently assimilate" Serbia. Nowhere is this contingency better realized than in Serbia itself. The incentive to battle is therefore, found both in the instinct of self-preservation and in the political and racial hatreds that exist between the two countries.

Heroism never shows to better advantage than when cast upon a small and concentrated stage, with vital interests and not merely sordid ambition at stake.—Atlanta Constitution.

## JAPANESE CENSORS STRICT IN CAMPAIGN

PEKING, Sept. 26.—Of the progress of Japan's operations against the

Germans at Kiao Chao practically nothing can be learned here, even in official quarters, owing to the strictness of the Japanese censorship.

Chinese government functionaries themselves near the scene of the campaign are not allowed to send out anything concerning Japanese reverses, delays, or even slight losses. There has been no objection to the filing of news telling of the victories by the mikado's forces, but only such vague references to regiments and warships are permitted that it is impossible to tell what is meant.

## Memorials Ready for Paris Entry.

BORDEAUX, Sept. 25.—The Petit Gironde has published a dispatch from Verdun setting forth that French soldiers near that point found a valise belonging to a Prussian officer containing little iron crosses strung on black and white ribbons and bearing the inscription, "1814-1914." These presumably were to have been distributed to German soldiers after the entry of the German army into Paris.
