Artillery so placed would have collapsed at the first shot. The truth is that the Germans deliberately attempted to destroy this masterpiece of French art from sheer archaeological jealousy."

the stained part across a basin and pouring boiling water, to which a little borax has been added, directly on it. Then wring it out, reverse the piece and pour more water on the other side. This plan is most effective.

Never starch linen that is to be stored for a long time; it is apt to crack and if left for many years will rot. Rinse the articles quite free from starch, dry and fold away, if possible in blue paper. The blue paper always keeps them from turning yellow.

To clean light woolen gowns beautifully use salt made quite damp, but not wet, applying it either with the hand or with a small brush and removing it at once by rubbing it lightly off with a Turkish towel.

It is said that dry bran is an excellent cleanser for dainty velvet flowers and woolen fabrics. Rub the soiled spots harder than the rest; then brush it all off with a towel.

Housewives will find that if they make kitchen aprons butcher fashion with long sleeves, they will be able to work at the sink without soiling the daintiest of gowns.

Should you spill hot fat on the floor or a wooden table, pour cold water upon it at once. It can then be more easily scraped off, not having had time to sink into the wood.

If the clothes boiler leaks while in use the hole may be temporarily stopped up by putting a handful of corn meal into the water. It will fill the hole.

Windows become dimmed quickly where soft coal is used as fuel. A good way to clean them is to rub with alcohol and polish with cheese-cloth.

Never wash marble with soap and water. Use ammonia in the water, if you would have a highly polished clean surface after your trouble.

IRISH TROOPS WANTED TO BE AT THE FRONT

MEN ANXIOUS TO FIGHT, NOT TO PATROL ANY OF THE ARMY DEPOTS.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—An instance of how anxious Irish soldiers are to go to the front was witnessed recently at Chelsea Barracks, where the Irish Guards were quartered. Late one evening some one spread the rumor that the Irish Guards were to be transferred to one of the depots. That evening was one of the wilder known at Chelsea Barracks. Then came the announcement that the rumor was true.

Immediately the Irish Guard set up the cry: "We want to go to the front. Our place is in France. We won't go to any depot." For more than an hour the yelling kept up. Then the officers made speeches telling the men to be patient that they soon would be off for the scene of fighting. Even after these promises a force of mounted police was established about the barracks to insure peace and quiet.

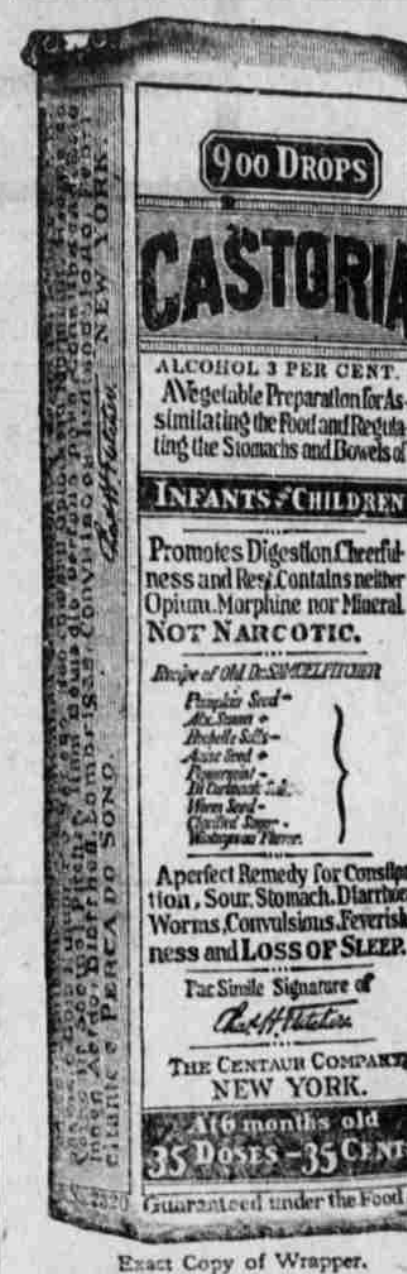

Bubonic Plague Perils Troops. LONDON, England, Oct. 1.—A dispatch to the Central News from Constantinople says that bubonic plague is causing ravages among the Turkish troops at Smyrna and other stations.

France Hunts for Soldiers. BORDEAUX, France, Sept. 30.—Minister of War Millerand has sent a circular note to the generals commanding the several districts of France, ordering them to start a vigorous search for all persons who have failed to respond for military service as required.

Pupils Urged to Aid Move. NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—A letter to the children of the United States asking them to sign a petition to the rulers of the warring nations in Europe and Asia asking peace was issued by the Children's Peace Committee, with the approval of the board of managers of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Teachers everywhere in the country are asked to read the committee's letter to their pupils and have the children sign the petition and return it to the committee here. The petition, addressed to the emperors of Austria, Germany, Japan and Russia, the kings of Belgium, Great Britain, Serbia and Montenegro, and the president of France, pleads with the rulers to call an immediate armistice and submit their

difference to The Hague tribunal and to promise to have all future difficulties adjusted in the same manner.

Immigration Cut by War.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—The European war has cut down immigration into the United States to the lowest point in many years. During this month only 22,000 aliens entered the port of New York. This compares with 108,564 this month a year ago. More American refugees arrived during the month than immigrants—about 35,000. Immigration had been falling off, however, before the war began. There was a noticeable decrease in June and July for which the immigration officers said they were unable to account.

Including inspectors, guards, medical officers and clerks, government employees at Ellis Island number nearly 600 persons, who are now comparatively idle.

Namur May Be Capital.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—The Ghent correspondent of the Daily Express has sent the following dispatch. "Persons arriving from Brussels say that the Germans are preparing to move the administrative headquarters of the military government of Belgium to Namur. This is taken to mean that the Germans are getting

ready for the next stand nearer their own frontier."
