NEWS OF FARM AND RANGE

Sold Hogs Here—W. H. Sawyer was in town yesterday from his ranch near Gibbon and while here sold some hogs in the local market. He sold at a price of seven cents.

Boats Reduce Rates—Bad feeling between owners of the three steamboat lines running between Portland and The Dalles is now said to have reached a point where an advertised rate war will be the next step in the competition for the business of the upper Columbia. The trouble, which started with the advent of The Dalles-Columbia line operating the steamer State of Washington into the field, has grown till now it is rumored about the waterfront that heavy cuts are to be made in freight rates immediately.

The bone of contention so far has been centered about the securing of the wheat hauling business to Astoria for the Astoria Flour mills. It is said that the wheat has been moved for \$1.50 a ton.

Want Wire Worms—Specimens of wire worms from all parts of Oregon are wanted by entomologists of the agricultural college, who are making a comprehensive study of these pests with a view to their control. In order to apply remedies most effectively it is necessary to know the time of year at which the pests assume the different life forms, e.g. pupa, larva and adult, in different parts of the state. In order to secure this information it is necessary to have insects sent in from various sections of the state, and the collections should be accompanied by a report of the time and place of capture.

Will Sort Sheep—Dan P. Smythe and his brother, Gus Smythe, left this morning for their summer where in the mountains where they will spend several days sorting sheep.

Heavy Rain Falls—Umatilla county was pretty well soaked by a heavy rain that fell last night. The rain, and more like it, is needed as the farm lands are still pretty dry and not in good condition for fall work. Light showers have fallen during the day and indications are that more rain will be received during the night.

WOUNDED AVIATOR ELUDES PURSUERS

LONDON, Oct. 2.—How a British aviator who had been taking observations over the German lines in northeastern France saved his life when attacked by one of the kaiser's aeroplanes was described by the official information bureau here.

"He was in a single seater monoplane," said the bureau, "and being fully occupied with his steering and consequently unable to use his rifle, headed for our lines when a German biplane ascended to attack him.

"The German craft which carried a pilot and an observer, circled about, trying to get within pistol shot, and finally getting directly above him, succeeded in wounding him.

"The Briton, however, managed to get within our lines and was taken to the hospital.

Another British aviator threw a bomb among the enemy's cavalry, killing several soldiers and stampeding the horses.

British Ships to Resume

SEATTLE, Oct. 2.—Confident that the North Pacific was free of hostile warships, the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship company, which suspended its service between Seattle and Prince Rupert, B. C., soon after England declared war, announced today that service would be restored Sunday when the stamship Prince George, which was commandeered by the British admiralty for use on this coast as a hospital ship, will be returned to its coastwise run.

Further evidence of confidence in British shipping circles was shown by the sailing today of the Royal Mail liner Monmouthshire for London, via the orient, with a cargo of 9000 tons of flour, canned salmon and miscellaneous freight.

England Will Explain.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—It was learned from an official source that Sir Edward Grey and Ambassador Page either today or tomorrow would hold a conference in London on the questions arising over England's intention of seizing goods which would be classed as conditional contraband.

Sir Cecil Spring-Rice called at the State department today and explained that cargoes of copper shipped to the Krupp gun works in Germany, via Holland, had been diverted to England. It was believed the copper would be used in the construction of torpedoes. Payment in full value for the cargoes has been remitted to the American shippers.

"HAPPY CANYON" A SUCCESS WITH NET BALANCE OF \$875

ENTERTAINMENT FOR CROWDS AT ROUND-UP FINANCIALLY GRATIFYING.

"Happy Canyon" was a financial success as well as a success as an entertainment of the Round-up crowd. The first meeting of the general committee held since the close of the festivities was held yesterday afternoon and a report made by W. L. Thompson, financial manager, showed that the show had cost approximately \$5000 and that the receipts had been sufficient to leave a net balance of approximately \$875.

The cost of initial entertainment was, of course, heavy, the carpenter bill alone being nearly \$1200. The seats and the town will be left as they are so that this cost will be saved next year. The O.-W. R. & N. Co. has showed not only a willingness but a desire to allow the pavilion to be used for "Happy Canyon" as long as there is no fair held.

The committee, profiting from the experience of this year, will put on a much better show next year and will carry out the frontier town idea even further than it was this year. "Happy Canyon" is not an institution for revenue-making, its first purpose being to entertain the Round-up crowds during the evening, and to that end the general admission price will be kept at 25 cents even though a five dollar show is prepared.

Any surplus that the entertainment makes will find plenty of uses, as there are repeated demands made upon the Commercial association. However, the idea of President Tallman and the balance of the committee is to use the revenue in purchasing furnishings and equipment for new club rooms.

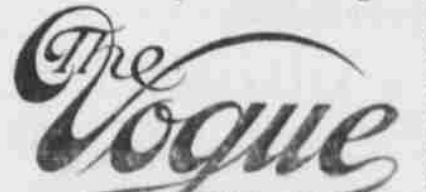
