BOSTON, Oct. 8.—A 12-pound baby girl, who is already a great-aunt, whose father had two great-grandchildren before she was born, whose sister is a grandmother and whose brother is a grandfather, made her appearance in South Boston on Sunday evening.

The stork left this remarkable youngster at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin H. Rich, and she is, according to her delighted father, "just about the prettiest young one you ever saw."

Patrolman Rich, who for several years has been on night duty at City Hall, will be 74 years old in November, and his wife is 35.

Mr. Rich's first marriage was in 1862, and his wife was Miss Evelyn Dyer, of Maine, who died several years ago. Four children were born, three of whom are still living and two of them have reached the estate of grandparenthood. In 1912 Mr. Rich married Miss Ellen McDonough of this city.

Mr. Rich's mother died last year at the age of 94 after she had become a great-grandmother.

MOVIES IN CHURCHES.

Home Hints and Recipes

To Tint Curtains.
To tint curtains cream color mix a bowl of cream starch and another of white. Add a small quantity of the cream starch to the white before each curtain is starched. This makes the curtains all the same tone, which would not be the case were they put directly into the cream starch.

Stained China.
Your cups stain probably because you drink very strong tea. The best way of removing these unsightly marks is to rub them well with a moistened cloth dipped in salt. Powdered bath brick will remove those of long standing which will not yield to the salt treatment.

Oven Space.
If, when baking layer cakes, etc., you have a space too small for another pan, place a can with ends melted off in the space and set the extra pan on it. The heat will reach the baking article just the same.
