which at the present is the most crit-
ical part of the line was "satisfac-
tory."

Cavalry encounters, he added, con-
tinued uninterrupted.

In Paris, the reorganized aviation
corps was showing increased activity
in patrol duty to prevent further air-
raid on the city.

The initiation of a fresh strong of-
fensive movement by the allies against
the German right in northern France
was reported this afternoon in a Bor-
deaux official announcement.

Operations were being pressed by
the allies in the Hazebrouck and
Bathune regions, it was stated. The
Germans, it was admitted, had occu-
pied Lille.

In the center, the statement con-
tinued, the allies were advancing con-
siderably in the region of Berry-Au-
bac and also along the river Meuse
and in the Argennes. They were al-
so reported to have advanced from
Verdun toward Metz, driving the
Germans before them.

In the south, the situation was said
to remain unchanged.

Prince Dies from Wounds.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 13.—Prince
Oleg, son of Grand Duke Constantine,
succumbed to his wounds today. He
was wounded in action against the
Germans.
