R. Alexander, G. W. Bradley and Dr. T. M. Henderson, three of the six Pendleton Odd Fellows who attended the funeral of the late J. P. Medernach in Portland yesterday morning, arrived home on No. 6 this morning. The other three, J. M. Bentley, R. F. Kirkpatrick and M. A. Ferguson, will return later. The funeral of Mr. Medernach was very simple, in conformity with his expressed wishes before death. Harry Medernach, only son of the deceased, also came up from Portland this morning to look after the estate.

Willamette Valley Fog.

Residents of Pendleton this morning arose to find a fog such as has made London famous and the Willamette valley notorious, settled down over the city. It was a heavy fog and with a very damp one but lifted by 10:30.

Smith's Chauffeur Here.

Almece Tardiff, formerly of this city but now of Portland, arrived this morning on No. 6 to secure Dr. C. J. Smith's car which was left here recently. He started in it for Portland this morning. Mr. Tardiff is acting as chauffeur for Dr. Smith on some of his campaign tours.

Adams to Have Band.

Adams will soon have a town band of eighteen pieces, according to A. H. Kirby who is in the city today looking after the securing of instruments for some of the younger members. Mr. Kirby and Lawrence Lieuallen are the men behind the band and expect to develop one that will be a credit to the little town.

Suit to Quiet Title.

The Western Land & Irrigation Co. has commenced suit against Carl J. Heinrich and O. H. Grandahl to remove a cloud against the title of land secured from Heinrich which a claim against it by Grandahl constitutes.

Local Motorcyclist Wins.

Clarence "Red" Williams who worked last summer for Long Bros. in this city, was one of the star performers Sunday in the motorcycle races held in La Grande. Riding a Pope he won the ten mile event and also made the best time in the trials for a track record. He also qualified for the finals of the five mile race but was prevented from entering by engine trouble. The track was heavy and several near-serious accidents occurred.

Leaves Estate to Son.

By the will of the late J. P. Medernach, all of his property, real and personal, descends to his only son, Dr. Harry Medernach of Portland, who arrived here this morning. The estate is of considerable value, the bulk of it being real property in this city. Dr. Medernach may take personal charge of the Orpheum theater for the time being and will probably be joined here soon by his wife and daughter.

Fit Up New Offices.

Work of remodeling and fitting up the offices of Dr. E. O. Parker and Dr. H. H. Hattery in the Belts block is now almost completed and the physicians will have a suite of offices as fine as any in the city. The room formerly used by Dr. Parker as a reception room is now his private office and the three rooms running east complete the suite, the two center rooms being thrown together as a reception room and the back room being Dr. Hattery's office. The room formerly used by Dr. Parker and Dr. Ringo together has been turned over to the exclusive use of Dr. Ringo.

Hay Suit Being Tried.

Today a jury in the circuit court is listening to evidence from which it will decide whether or not Chris Bowlers and O. D. Gibson owe C. P. Bowman \$2490 for hay they purchased from him. The alleged debtors claim they had an agreement with Mr. Bowman whereby they would not be compelled to pay for damaged hay and they allege that a great portion of the hay was damaged. In all they purchased about 1200 tons from Mr. Bowman and have paid him only \$2500. J. A. Fee and J. B. Perry represent the plaintiff while Frederick Steiwer of this city and J. C. Hurst of Walla Walla are acting for the defendants.

Woman Belligerent Fined.

For assaulting Mrs. Sarah Tindel, Mrs. Bonnie Barnes was this morning fined \$5 in police court. The case against her and her husband, H. R. Barnes, on a charge of disorderly conduct was continued. Testimony in the case showed that Mrs. Barnes, in response to an injunction from her husband to "go out and wallop her one and tear her can off," smote the other woman one blow that would have done credit to a white hope, knocking her down and discolored one of her eyes badly. Mrs. Tindel and the Barnes live in the same rooming house at 301 South Main and the row supposedly started over a glass bucket hung on a post by Mrs. Tindel and objected to by Barnes who kicked the bucket around to the accompaniment of swear words. Barnes also claims Mrs. Tindel classified his wife obnoxiously.

Stolen Auto Recovered.

Dr. F. W. Vincent, manager of the Pacific Light & Power Co., last night recovered the little Maxwell auto which was stolen from the gas plant on the morning of October 4. It was found alongside the road about three miles this side of Walla Walla where it had been abandoned by the thieves when the gasoline supply became exhausted and they were unable to get any more from a farm house nearby. A man by the name of Alexander reported it to the Athena marshal and Dr. Vincent had it brought down last evening. The rabbit had been melted in the crank shaft and a little other damage done. The wrenches and other tools in the linemen's box had been stolen but Dr. Vincent believes some one took these after the auto had been abandoned. If the thieves are apprehended, Dr. Vincent intends prosecuting them vigorously.

A marriage license was issued today to James H. E. Scott, well known Milton attorney, and Minnie Lane Gregg, also of that city.

In order to give laboring men a chance to register for the November election, County Clerk Saling has decided to keep the registration books open at the noon hour tomorrow and until 7 o'clock in the evening. He will also keep the books open at the noon hour Thursday but must close them finally at 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Saunders to Be Paroled.

W. A. "Shorty" Saunders, who stabbed a man in Pilot Rock several months ago while drunk, was this afternoon sentenced to the penitentiary from six months to ten years but Judge Phelps promised to parole him upon the condition that he would leave whiskey alone. M. L. Hutchinson this afternoon pleaded guilty of obtaining money under false pretenses and will be sentenced Thursday.

AT LEAST 1 SUBMARINE OF GERMANY BADLY DISABLED

RUSSIAN CRUISER SAID TO HAVE DAMAGED CRAFT FOLLOWING ATTACK.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 13.—At least one of the German submarines responsible for sinking the Russian armored cruiser Pallada in the Baltic on October 11 was believed to have been disabled in the fight by the cruiser Bayan which was scouting with the Pallada at the time the latter was lost.

That the Pallada's entire crew perished was admitted. Its full complement was 568 men. Details of the exact scene of the engagement are lacking.
