## Home Hints and Recipes

**Household Hints.**  
It is annoying to find the boiler leaking after the washing is begun. If the leak is not large it may be stopped by dropping into the boiler a handful of cornmeal. The suction of the water oozing through the hole draws the meal to that place, the meal swells and is drawn into the leakage and stops it so that the work may go on.  
If walnuts or any other kind of nuts are packed in layers of sand and kept in a cool place they will keep fresh for an indefinite period. Soak them in warm water for an hour before using if you would have them peel as if they had just been gathered fresh from the tree.  
When meals must be kept warm, take a deep baking pan and half fill
