FORMER N. Y. CENTRAL PRESIDENT ON TRIAL

CHICAGO, Oct. 20.—W. C. Brown, former president of the New York Central lines, and Thomas O'Gara, head of the big coal company that bears his name, were to be placed on trial here today before Federal Judge Landis, charged with violating interstate commerce laws. Brown was indicted on the charge of permitting the giving of rebates to the O'Gara coal company and O'Gara was accused at the same time of accepting the favors. The trial was originally set for the first of October but Brown's attorneys were not ready to proceed.

CITY ICE BOX LATEST BLOW AIMED AT H. C. OF I.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 20.—Municipal Cleveland has developed a new municipal quirk to reduce the well known high cost of living. It's the municipal ice box, a huge refrigerating plant at one end of the city owned markets. Cleveland housewives can now buy fruit, vegetables and eggs at summer and autumn prices. At a very small cost these commodities can be stored in the municipal ice box and when mid-winter finds prices of food stuffs almost to the sky line

they can be taken out just as good as new. The municipal cold storage is a new idea originating with J. M. McCurdy, superintendent of the plant. Many housewives have already formed clubs to take advantage of the city's offer.

4000 Russians Captured.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—This was the text of an official message to the German embassy from Berlin:

"In the French war theater there are no important developments to report."

"In the district of Suwalki, in Russia, the Russians kept quiet yesterday. The number of Russian prisoners taken near Schriewitz has increased to 4000 and more guns have been taken. The fighting near the south of Warsaw is continuing."

Jews Hanged at Radam.
BERLIN, Oct. 19.—The Berliner Tageblatt says it learns from reliable sources that the Russians at Radam hanged three Jews, despite the fact that their innocence was proclaimed by others.

The German agricultural council has issued the declaration that this year's crop will be sufficient to support the country until next year's harvest.
