Quake Damage Is Great.
PARIS, Oct. 20.—Great damage was done by the earthquake Saturday the villages of Kaparelli and Pyri, near Thebes being destroyed, according to a dispatch from Athens. At Thebes the shocks were accompanied by subterranean rumblings. The Grecian province of Boethia suffered most. Twenty distinct shocks were felt there. The number of casualties is not known. Provisions and tents are being hurried for those who have lost their homes.

In Athens the movements were felt for 20 seconds. Several houses were wrecked and the foundations of many were shaken.

Another dispatch says the railway stations on the Larissa line suffered much, and much damage was done at Piraeus. Atlanta and Cheliki experienced severe property losses. Cylades, Euboea and the Ionian Islands.

WHEAT SHOWS A DECLINE

Chicago Market 1 3-8 to 1 7-8c Lower Even Though Foreign Markets Are Advanced.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Wheat closed 1 3-4@1 7-8c lower. Prices went to \$114 3-4 for December and \$129 3-8 for May under late selling by tired holders in the local trade. These prices are practically 1 5-8c under close Monday. As the market has been advancing most daily for the past 10 days with strong upturn Saturday and Monday the profit taking and reaction of yesterday is to a great extent natural and expected. The English cables news was strong again claiming American offers over night strong and Canadian offers scarce. Cash markets in all quarters relatively firm, fine map, absence of public buying orders and profit taking cause of reaction.

Cash corn steady to higher at some outside market. La Salle street bought May early. There was less snap in the oats trade with the December off to 49 5-8c, May 52 3-4c and fractional rally in both months. New York claims London acceptances of all offers over night.
