Home Hints and Recipes

Digress of Fashion. Skirts will continue short, reaching only to the ankle.

The general effect of fullness is shown in skirts and coats.

Sleeves will be both long and short and tight and puffy. The armhole will be large for a small sized one.

Fringe is a modish trimming and sometimes appears on the bottom of silk crepe skirts, as well as on sleeves and mash.

While straight, severe effects are shown, plaited skirts, underskirts and tunics and plaitings of several inch widths for trimmings are important details of fall fashions.

Remember that the left handed shoulder is the place now for the little artificial flower that adds such an air to every frock. A velvet hat trimmed with a single flower on the left side, with the hat flower duplicated at the neck gives a very smart effect.

To Remove Ink Spots. Ink spots may be removed from white or light colored goods by saturating the spots first with milk and then with turpentine. Roll the cloth up for about half an hour, after which wash out in clear water and

you will find that the spots have disappeared.

For Ferns. When your Boston fern begins to droop feed it cottonseed meal. It is the best fertilizer there is.

Use Flour. When filling cracks in the wall with plaster of paris, the plaster will not set so quickly if one part flour is added to three parts of the dry plaster. Thoroughly mix before wetting.

Immigration Inspector Murdered. VANCOUVER, Oct. 22.—Dominion immigration inspector W. C. Hopkinson, while acting as interpreter in a court here was shot and instantly killed by Mowla Singh, a Hindu. German Batteries Silenced. LONDON, Oct. 22.—It was reported that British warships and a naval brigade on shore on the Belgian coast put six German coast batteries out of commission, the Germans losing 1600 artillerymen.

Roumanian Pies Charged

PETROGRAD, Oct. 21.—The Ministry of the Interior reports is receives information that there exists in Roumania a secret society controlled by Germany, the purpose is to influence public opinion through the press. The society is said to have a capital of \$4,000,000.

The minister of the Interior says also that devastation followed the Austrian invasion of the Russian governments of Lubin and Khotin. In these governments 4250 houses were burned with a loss of \$1,500,000.

Opera Prize Awarded

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—The \$10,000 prize offered by the National Federation of Musical Clubs for the best grand opera written in English has been awarded to Professor Horatio Parker of Yale, who composed the music, and Brian Hooker of New York, who wrote the book. The opera name is "Fairyland."

Under the terms of the competition, in which 54 operas were entered, the production will be made at Los Angeles next summer. The authors three years ago won a prize for their opera, "Mona," which was said to have been an artistic, but not a financial success.

Telephone Probe Opens

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The public service commission today took up its investigation of the rates of the New York Telephone company. The hearing had been scheduled to start Oct. 8, but it was found necessary to postpone it until today. A petition, bearing the names of several hundred subscribers of the telephone company has been filed with the commission, asking that the present rates of the company be lowered as they are excessive.
