HIGH SCHOOL SOON TO GET READY FOR STATE DEBATE

GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP OF RAILROADS WILL BE SUB-JECT DISCUSSED.

Pendleton high school received the state debate question Friday morning and will begin immediately to prepare for the great contest at Eugene next spring. The question is as follows: Resolved: That the government should own and operate railroads acting as common carriers within and across the boundaries of the several states.

The question will undergo a thorough consideration in the class and will perhaps be used in the local try-outs, which will begin about the last of this semester and the first of next. There is a class of 15 at present in the school, all of which will appear in the coming tryouts.

An effort is being made this year to make debate one of the most interesting of the high school activities, and Principle Hampton, who is the local coach, is devoting all his spare time to the accomplishment of this end.

The question as submitted by the Oregon High School Debating League will be debated in all the districts of the state represented in this league and will become the question for the final debate for the state championship at Eugene next May.

Pendleton won the cup last year, and all efforts possible are to be made this year to carry off the championship for the second time.

ASHLAND TIDINGS DECLARES DR. WITHYCOMBE IS "SPINELESS."

ASHLAND, Ore., Oct. 24.—In a two column front page editorial, in its issue of October 20th, the Ashland Tidings, for 40 years a staunch republican sheet supporting republican candidates and policies exclusively, comes out strongly for Dr. C. J. Smith democratic nominee for governor of Oregon "because he stands boldly for the Oregon System, for statewide prohibition and strict law enforcement, and does not hesitate to announce his principles without innuendo or evasion."

Editor Greer denounces what he terms the political "corruption" and "machine" methods of local backers of Dr. Withycombe, who, he declares, literally tried to buy the editorial influence of the Tidings for Dr. Withycombe with a purse of \$50.

Of Dr. Withycombe the editorial says: "Withycombe is said, and we believe him to be, a spineless man. The evidence is too ample to be gained here, but he announces no principle, takes no stand, advocates no policy and preaches no doctrine that has not been censured by his managers and approved by the machine. He says nothing, advocates nothing. His managers have him gagged so that he pronounces "canned" platitudes by rote. His pronouncements are like sounding brass and tinkling cymbal, an uncertain tone of a weak man in the hands of a corrupt and powerful machine, that cuts out and antedated, reactionary patterns."

The Tidings two weeks ago came out for Frederick Holbster of North Bend for congressman from this district in opposition to Congressman Hawley.

## "FLYING SQUADRON" OF DRYS ARRIVES IN STATE

SPEAKERS START CAMPAIGN AGAINST WET ELEMENT AT PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 24.—Seven members of the Flying Squadron of America, composing the advance guard of speakers, arrived in Portland and the bombardment of the wets was commenced at the Rose City rink, East Morrison and East First streets. Dr. John H. Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian church presided at the initial meeting.

Local prohibitionists were out in force to welcome the dry champions, and the fight for state-wide prohibition is now on to the finish. Altogether, three groups of speakers are scheduled to make their appearance in six meetings will be held in Portland.
