END OF DURKEY WILL CASE IS SEEN

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 23.—With the recent death of Mrs. Harriet Blaisdell of Champaign Ill., the once nationally famous Durkey lost will case has suffered a relapse, from which it may never be revived, according to prominent attorneys here today.

Mrs. Blaisdell was a direct descendant of Colonel Durkey. For year her husband, an attorney, haunted officials circles in Washington, until he became physically and mentally weakened by the strain and died. Funds ran low, although the goal, had it ever been achieved would have meant more than \$25,000,000 for the heirs, of whom Mrs. Blaisdell was the principal. The heirs sold shares in the case, there being not one state in the union in which some shares were not sold. J. J. Hill of St. Paul is one of those directly interested, since the case was founded upon the allegations involving the Northern Pacific Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads. During the legal wrangle lasting in all 55 years, the Durkey will was found providing for Mrs. Blaisdell. According to the heirs, the government still has this \$25,000,000 awaiting the arrival of its legal owner.

Mrs. Wilson Memorial Up WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—A movement to build a memorial to Mrs. Woodrow Wilson in the form of a model block of sanitary houses in the slum district of Washington has been started by Mrs. Archibald Hopkins, who interested Mrs. Wilson in sum work here; Mrs. Ernest Becknell, wife of the director of the American Red Cross, and other prominent women.

The plan is to raise money for the block by subscriptions from the women of the country and to call it the "Ellen Wilson Memorial Block."

Spain Appeals for Goods. MADRID, Oct. 23.—Anglo-Spanish trade is suffering severely by the great delay to which all postal correspondence is subjected owing to the war, and the British chamber of commerce here has addressed an urgent request to the Spanish and British governments to expedite the proposed establishment of a regular service of fast steamships between Bilbao and Southampton or any more convenient port.

The chamber has also pointed out that, in view of the tremendous increase in the demand for English manufactures of many kinds, due to the impossibility of getting supplies from France or Germany, the English press and Chambers of Commerce should be asked to make it known that there are many openings for trade with Spain and that manufacturers should lose no time in getting into touch with Spanish importing firms and with English merchants and exporters having trade relations with Spain.

Liner Refuses to Budge. BAR HARBOR, Me., Oct. 24.—Captain Charles Polack, commander of the North German Lloyd liner Kronprinzessin Cecilie, which has been here since she returned to American waters more than two months ago after being almost in sight of British shores, voiced objections to any summary transfer of his ship to Boston by order of the federal court.

"I will not budge an inch," Captain Polack said, to John H. Wilson, United States marshal for Maine, "until I receive further notice and an official guarantee. I must have an absolute guarantee that my ship will be safe from attack from vessels of belligerent nations; that the United States will furnish adequate convoys and that my people will be immune from capture and imprisonment. I must look out for them."

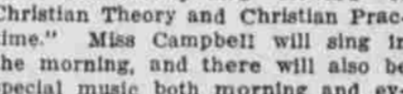
