POINTS FROM WHICH GERMAN ZEPPELINS MAY ATTACK LONDON



Many military experts have thought the purpose of the Germans in taking Antwerp was to sweep on to the English channel and there find a base for an attack of Zeppelins on London. If they take the north Belgian cities like Ghent and Ostend they may move on to the French coast and eventually take Dunkirk and Calais. The trip from Calais across to London would be very short and it is likely if the Germans came into possession of it there would be a panic in London.

With the failure of the first great German rush toward Paris, when the Kaiser's masses were repulsed in the battle of the Marne and driven back to the present lines, military and naval experts predicted that the next

great German strategic move would be made against London. To make this move with any effectiveness a hold on the Belgian coast, while not perhaps essential, was at least highly desirable. This desideratum has now been attained, and it is reported that German submarines and torpedo boats are being transported from Kiel in pieces, like a torn-down summer cottage, to the Belgian coast.

None of the great ships of the Kaiser's navy has so far been engaged, submarines, destroyers and small cruisers having borne the brunt of what naval action there has been in the North Sea. The recall of the marines to Kiel and the provisioning of the fleet are taken by some of the experts to denote that the time has arrived for a combined attack by the

sea, submarine and air forces of the Kaiser on the English coast.

Dispatches from Amsterdam quote an unnamed German aviator as saying that Germany's aerial invasion of England will be made in February. While there may be occasional raids before that time, the general assault by Zeppelins and aeroplanes, he says, will not begin until then because Germany will not be ready earlier. Forty-six Zeppelins will then be ready, it is said.

This aviator is quoted as saying that Germany is building 200 aeroplanes of a new and very large type, especially for the attack on London. These machines, he says, will be capable of carrying 1000 pounds besides the aviator and bomb thrower. Aviators are now being trained to operate them.

STATE GRANGE GIVES POINTERS TO VOTERS

VIEWS ON SOME MEASURES TO BE UP IN ELECTION ARE PRESENTED.

To the Voters of Oregon:
On behalf of our several organizations, the undersigned beg to recommend the following action on ballot Nos. 302, 350, 355 and 357.

We recommend voting Number 302, No. again, as we did in 1912, because it creates the new and unnecessary office of lieutenant governor, and also it makes the man who is elected president of the next senate the lieutenant governor for the next four years. The salary is a trifle now but of course that will be increased if you create the office.

On Number 350, we advise voting Yes, because it abolishes the state senate. That body may have been useful in the early days as a check on hasty action by the house of representatives, but since the people obtained the referendum power the senate is only an obstruction. No state or nation has ever created a senate after the people obtained the initiative, referendum and recall. The only excuse now offered for the senate is that it makes the work of the house of representatives more difficult. But the people of Oregon want every public officer to do useful work all the time and not merely to prevent some other public officer from doing something.

If the senate is abolished there will not be half so much opportunity and temptation for log-rolling, legislative delay, fraud, failure, extravagant appropriations, and general inefficiency, as there is now when all the responsibility is divided between two houses.

On Number 355, vote No., because it repeals the presidential primary law, it adds another general election every two years, at a cost of \$200,000 and is intended to restore the old party convention with its machine and political boss system. This bill takes from the people the vital power to choose their own political party candidates for public office, and will give that power to the schemers and tricksters.

No Number 357, vote No., because it abolishes majority rule in voting for tax amendments to the constitution, and requires a two-thirds vote to make tax changes if this amendment is adopted. Respectfully submitted, C. E. SPENCE, Master of the State Grange.

Art Gems Are Locked Up.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—All the museums of Paris have been closed since the beginning of the war, and as far as possible, the chief treasures have been deposited in iron cases in vaults, a precaution that has proved to have been only too well advised.

One of the aeroplanes that flew over this city dropped a bomb when it was immediately above the Louvre, but fortunately the aviator did not allow sufficiently for his forward velocity, and so the explosive fell into the Seine close by. The Bibliotheque Nationale had a still narrower escape, which was recounted by one of the librarians.

With three others he saw one of the aerial visitors drop a bomb when over the manuscript room, and the missile only missed the building by 12 yards. This aviator afterwards was chased and caught by one of the French air patrols, and was found to be a man who had lived for years quite near the famous library, showing that the attack on the unique collection of valuable manuscripts was not accidental.

The new highway being built via Falls City and Siletz is to cut the distance to Newport by 14 miles.
