CHICAGO WHEAT IS WEAK

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Wheat closed 1-9/16-7c lower. The tone of the trade changed to bullish, and as there was considerable short interest and as the big export houses were on the buying side of December at the outset, the market moved up briskly. Since the strong swell it has been hesitating trade, with frequent soft spots. Duluth reported the big houses in a scramble for durum wheat at higher prices, the southwest report bids of Tuesday night bring very little in the way of country offers. Winnipeg worked 18 loads the first hour. Seaboard messages now are estimating export sales in all positions at 75 boatloads. Outside markets are weakening with Chicago.

Jura Tunnel Is Finished.
BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 29.—A five mile tunnel through the Jura mountains from Montiers, France, to Grenchen, Switzerland, was pierced after three years of uninterrupted work. The tunnel will shorten railroad communication between Paris and Berne and Paris and Milan.

The cost of cutting the tunnel was \$5,960,000. Of this sum the Eastern Railroad of France contributed \$2,000,000.
